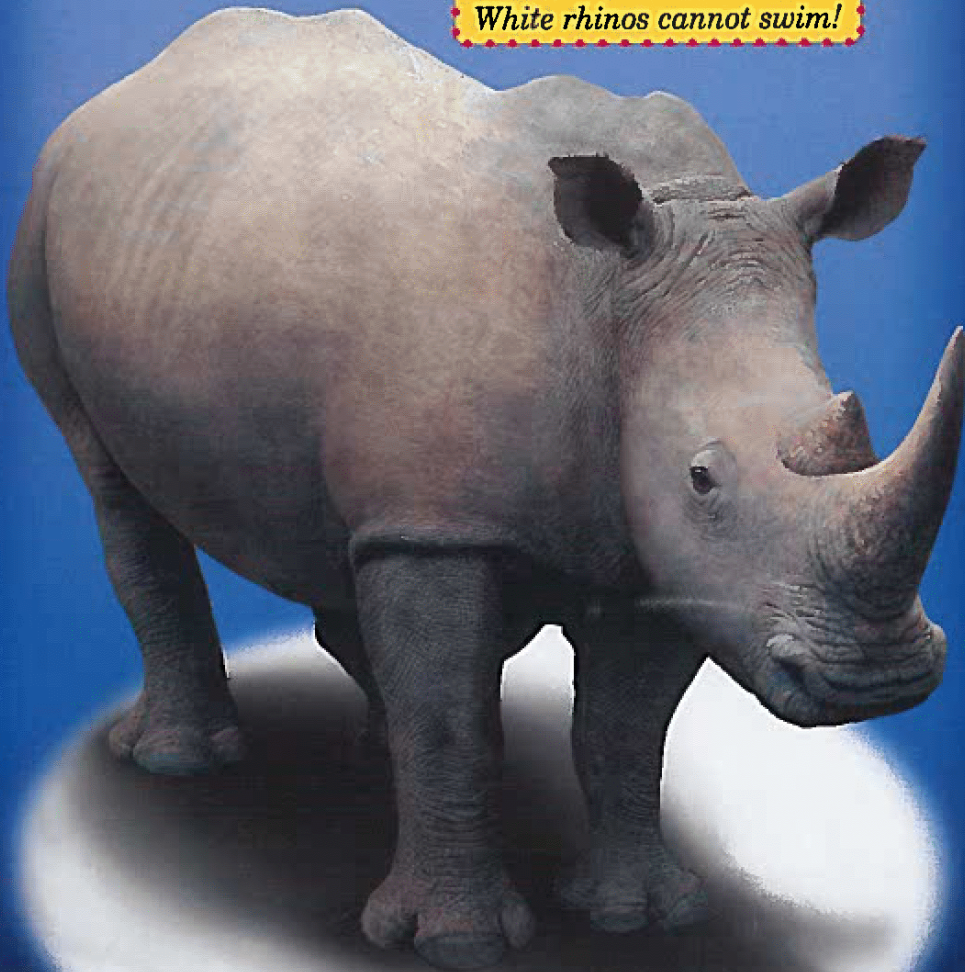


MEET A RHINO

Rhino is a shortened version of rhinoceros, which means “nose horn.” They certainly do have horns. This is a white rhino.

DID YOU KNOW?

The white rhino is the second-largest land mammal. Only elephants are bigger.

MEET A HIPPO

Hippo is a shortened version of hippopotamus. Hippopotamus means “river horse.” From now on, we will call them rhino and hippo.

FACT

Hippos are mammals.



DEFINITION

A mammal is a warm-blooded animal with fur or hair that gives milk to its young.

RHINO WEAPONS

A rhino's best weapon is its size. It is huge! Rhinos stand six feet high at the shoulders and weigh 8,000 pounds.

The rhino's horn is made of keratin. Keratin is the same material your hair and fingernails are made of.

HIPPO WEAPONS

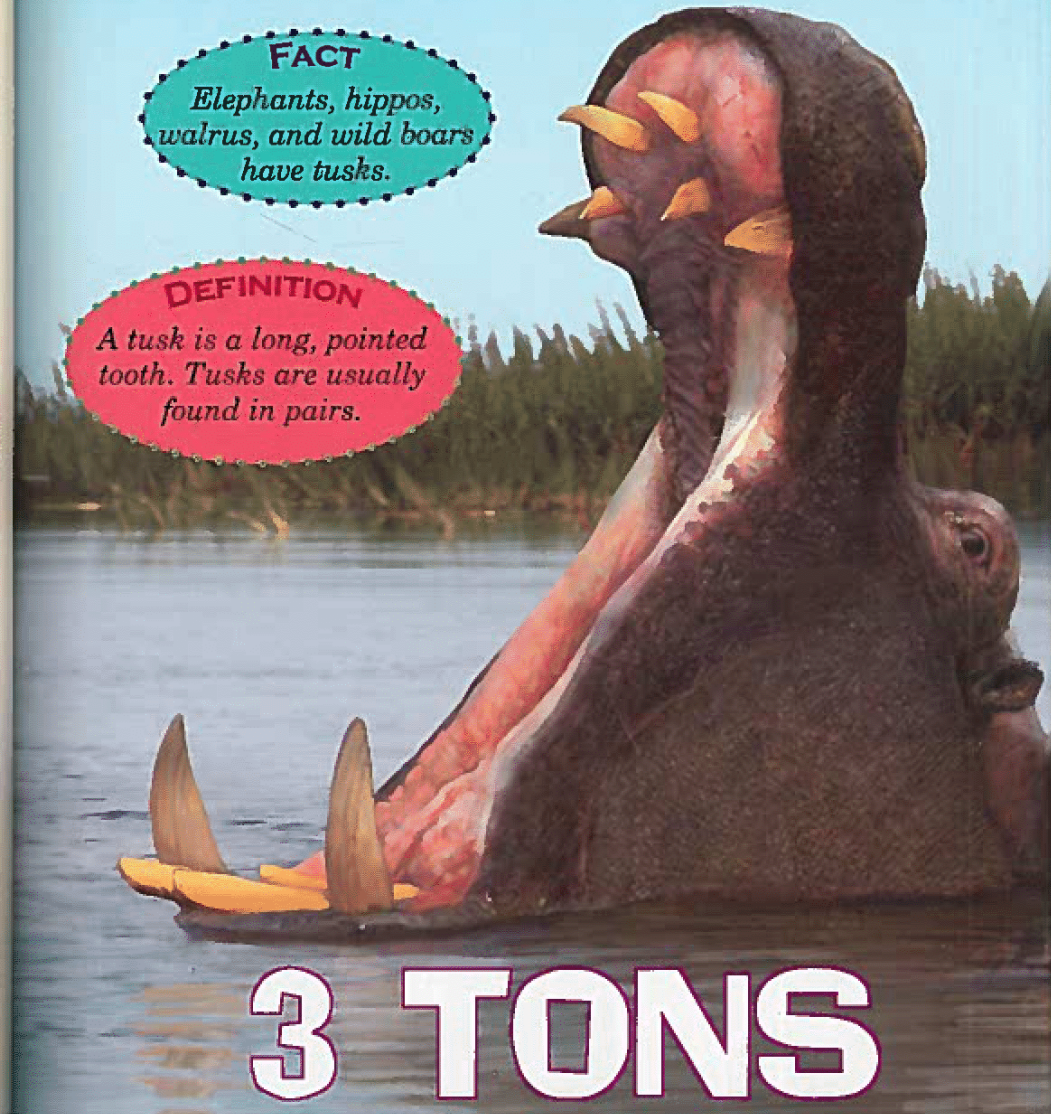
The hippo's best weapons are its huge teeth and strong jaw. It has six big front teeth on its upper jaw and four teeth plus two long tusks on its lower jaw. It chews with its back molars.

FACT

Elephants, hippos, walrus, and wild boars have tusks.

DEFINITION

A tusk is a long, pointed tooth. Tusks are usually found in pairs.

RHINO SPEED

In short bursts, a rhino can run 30 miles per hour.

A rhino can easily outrun a human.

A rhinoceros can gallop like a horse.

HIPPO SPEED

A hippo can run about 18 miles per hour. A hippo has no interest in running a marathon. It's not designed for long-distance running.
