Summer Reading is a tradition that **fosters community unity and promotes reading for enjoyment for all ages**, forming a vital part of our literacy support strategy. The goal is for everyone in the community to be part of a reader community, engaging in various literacy activities such as book clubs, journaling, discussions, and sharing reading experiences on social media.



The Read it Forward recipient is the Latino Community Development Agency, with delivery in early fall. Guests' summer reading helps reach the goal of 12 million points and supports the community.





Earning Points

Participants use Beanstack to track Summer Reading progress, with minutes read converted to points. The program promotes reading and diverse activities for all ages. Reading earns one point per minute, activities earn five points each, with a goal of 600 points for a prize. Tailored activities encourage exploration and literacy development. Logs outline activities, and the adult log resembles Book Bingo. Beanstack simplifies sign-up and logging, with recent updates improving usability. Paper logs are always accepted, too!

Prize Pick-up

Prize pickup for the Summer Reading program begins on June 1 and remains open until August 15 to ensure equitable access. The program runs from June 1 to July 31 annually, with pre-registration opening by May 15. Participants who achieve 600 points, equivalent to 10 hours of reading, earn their choice of prizes: 2 youth books, an MLS tote bag, or 1 adult book. Readers reaching 600 points are entered into drawings for wireless headphones and other prizes, with separate drawings for different age groups at each library and grand prize drawings systemwide. Additional reading beyond 600 points earns extra entries into the drawings and contributes to the community goal.
