📚 Systemwide Strategic Updates

Our library system is undergoing significant strategic planning and improvements.


- Why it matters: These updates are crucial for the future direction and services of our libraries, ensuring we continue to meet the needs of our community.
- Strategic Planning: We are working with a consultant to analyze our data and information, focusing on the future direction and services across the entire library system.

Advocacy: I just returned from Washington, DC, where a group of library directors met with members of Congress and their staff.

• We discussed how federal funds support library services statewide, sharing data from their districts.

Naloxone Vending Machines: The Oklahoma Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse is transitioning from distributing Naloxone via vending machines to direct mail and other methods.

- The Commission has asked us to investigate other ways we might provide lifesaving prevention materials going forward.
- The vending machine at Ralph Ellison was picked up last week.



The Metropolitan Library Commission has approved the <u>final budget</u> for the fiscal year July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025.

- Why it matters: The budget ensures sustained library operations and improvements through Oklahoma County Ad Valorem Tax (Property Tax imposed on Oklahoma County residents) funding.
- It covers all salaries and benefits, including a performance-based increase of up to 3% and a 6% increase in health insurance expenses.
- It also includes capital improvements and operational expenses throughout the library system and funds for the new Edmond Library.

What's next: All updates are now reflected in our accounting and budgeting system, Sage Intacct.

• Planned purchases for the year can now be submitted.

- January: Winter Reading and Dolly Day on Jan. 16.


Programming Breaks: Regular programs should not be paused.

Facilities, Security & IT Updates

Security upgrades: Security has completed the installation of the new camera systems at four locations (VI, RE, SO and WA). Security will be adding the Surveillance and Audible Deterrent System (Talk-down system) at three locations (CH, RE, and SO) this month.

Facilities Update: Surplus items, including kitchen furniture, copiers, cameras, and couches, were recommended for disposal at the Sept. 19 Commission meeting.

Branch-specific news:

- Village Library: Roof replacement coordination and pricing.
- Midwest City: A new chiller is set to be installed in November once the weather cools down. The library will stay open during the work.
- Edmond Kiosk: A beautiful window wrap was installed last week, increasing visibility of the book vending machine in Mitch Park.
- **Ralph Ellison Library:** We're waiting for a price quote on shelves for the Ralph Ellison Library so we can plan the installation and a short closure. We have a meeting soon to discuss bids for roof repairs. We'll also be getting new furniture.

IT Update:

- IT is replacing voice routers at several branches to improve emergency calls, faxes, and paging. Next up: network switches and wireless access points.
- We are making plans to transition to electronic notifications for holds and other updates, moving away from physical mail.

Russell Cobb is coming to Del City and Downtown OKC!



Special Collections Librarian Jennifer Green is collaborating with former Oklahoma Gazette publisher Bill Bleakley to enhance our Community Archiving initiative.

Why it matters: The archival copies of the Oklahoma Gazette from 1978 to 2016 enrich our Special Collections, preserving local history for future generations.

- Papers from the first issue (Oct. 15, 1978) to the last issue under
- Bleakley's ownership (June 29, 2016) are now part of our collection. • Future additions may include photographs and other archival
 - records from the newspaper.

Did you know: SCR is the official keeper of MLS history, maintaining a chronology of events and a birthday roster for our libraries.

Collection Services and Development: The Collection Processing Department has added books by local young authors, ages 5-12, from a program at the Edmond Library. Since July 1, they've ordered 5,000 new titles and processed 34,720 books for the collection.
