
April is the month for author visits to MLS libraries, and our two featured authors are both top-notch prize winners.



Don't bother looking for this fine Doric edifice. You won't find it anywhere in the city. In fact, you can't even stand on the ground it was built on without getting mowed down by six lanes of traffic.

ut then, it always did get the respect of a red-headed stepchild.

In 1905, the congregation of the First Baptist Church in Oklahoma City had finally tired of their cramped quarters near Second and Robinson. The congregation had grown with the city and, being an evangelistic bunch, they staved off overcrowding by seeding three new churches on the edges of the city. But the city had grown too rapidly for the original Baptist building and a new building would have to be built.

But where to build? Some members wanted to move to the edge of the city where there was plenty of room to grow, but others felt that Eleventh Street was just too far to travel. The city had grown so much that the only land available in the center was an overpriced lot on the northeast corner of Third and Broadway, but the more practical members of the congregation pointed out that streetcars, horses, and those newfangled automobiles rumbling past the church on the city's busiest thoroughfare would make Sunday morning sermons in the air-cooled church quite impossible to hear. Pastor Henry Porter carried the day, though. He liked the idea that his new church would


be placed amid the saloons, pool halls, and seedy hotels on Broadway. "We can reach the people," he said.

"May the temple stand until Jesus comes."

That sounded good to the deacons and thus the Baptist White Temple was built and dedicated in September, 1907. Unfortunately, unless Jesus came in 1910 and the news has yet to reach Oklahoma, the good Reverend Porter was a little ambitious in his hopes for the temple. again outgrown its building. Compounding the matter, the tiny lot left no room to expand the building. And, yeah, the nay-sayers were right all along. The grinding hum and clang-clang-clanging of the trolleys was just too much to bear when the windows were open. And it probably didn't help that the other denominations were building huge magnificent churches along North Robinson.

So, in 1911 a new church was completed. It offered plenty of space and a lot big enough for expansion. It's still the First Baptist Church building today and stands at Eleventh and Robinson. The Baptist White Temple was renamed the Masonic Temple and was used by the secret society until 1925 when it was razed and a four story Western Union office building was built on the site. Today, the crazy intersection of Third, Broadway, and Gaylord crosses the site.

Larry "Buddy" Johnson has been with MLS since 1998. Not only a librarian at the Downtown Library, he is the brilliant mind behind the Oklahoma Images database which is a collection of pictures and essays that illustrate the history of central Oklahoma.

The Oklahoma Scranimal

If you heard that former Oklahoma Attorney General and State Representative Larry Derryberry had written a book, you might expect a heavy tome full of legalese. Not so! Derryberry's true talent lies in making up entertaining stories and telling them to his grandchildren.

It all started when his grandson started asking Papa Derryberry to tell stories. Then someone gave him a little electric keyboard as a gift. Soon he was setting his stories to music, and The Oklahoma Scranimal was created—and then re-created—by an Oklahoma tornado that scrambled up the five farm animals breakfasting in Papa Derryberry's red barn. The horse, cow, sheep, pig and duck got all stirred together into one Scranimal that sported parts of each of the five.

Publishing & Enterprises using instructions in the back of the book. You'll enjoy Derryberry's mellow voice as he sings the story accompanied by the six famous Oklahomans featured on the front cover. Your challenge will be to decipher which of the six portrays each animal. The book was designated an official book of the Oklahoma Centennial.

When Mrs. Harry Derryberry decided to give her son the rhythmic name of Larry, she probably didn't dream that she was planting the seeds of musical authorship, but I think she would be proud. The book is verryverry charming.


Limitations

by Scott Turow

A veteran Court of Appeals judge asks his old friend and colleague a fundamental question in Scott Turow's most recent legal thriller, Limitations: "Who are we to judge?" The tormented Judge George Mason has heard sordid echoes of his own past in a controversial case on which he must rule, and deeper questions arise from it that lead him to question both his professional fitness and his very identity.


Turow's portrait of troubled Judge Mason is the latest in his acclaimed line of flawed but sympathetic characters who people the fictional Midwestern world of Kindle County. Longtime readers of Turow will recognize Judge Mason from Personal Injuries, as well as recently installed Chief Judge Rusty Sabich from his first novel, Presumed Innocent.

Turow's legal professionals are often as morally conflicted as the suspects and criminals with whom they deal. In Limitations, Judge Mason and his associates confront a case of sexual assault



Limitations is a brisk, episodic thriller, originally published in installments in The New York Times Magazine. Its swift pace and urgent presenttense narrative are an interesting departure from Turow's best-known novels. Judge Mason is ultimately forced to ponder the nature of crime in an individual's isolation and inability to understand the larger significance of his actions, a syndrome from which he finds even judges are not immune.

The Most Dangerous Game starring Leslie Banks, Fay Wray, and Joel McCrea

In last year's movie *Zodiac* there were several mentions of the 1932 film *The Most Dangerous Game*. It's adapted from a frequently-anthologized short story by Richard Connell about Count Zaroff, Leslie Banks in the movie, who lives on an island and delights in rescuing shipwrecked sailors so he can turn them into human prey and hunt them. Eve Trowbridge (Fay Wray), her dipsomaniacal brother (Robert Armstrong), and stalwart hero Bob Rainsford (Joel McCrea) wash ashore on day, and Zaroff wines them, dines them, and prepares to mount their heads in his trophy room.

There are currently six editions of the movie available but MLS owns the latest and only one that contains both the original black and white print as well as a colorized version prepared under the keen eye of special effects legend Ray Harryhausen. The movie was produced and

directed by the team that was making King Kong at the same time. Kong was shot during the day and Most Dangerous Game was shot after hours on the same sets. Fans of Kong will enjoy spotting familiar jungle locations as well as watching Wray and Armstrong play opposites to their most famous characters.

This was Leslie Banks' debut film in America. Best know in his day for playing Captain Hook on stage, his only other significant movies were the two he made with Alfred Hitchcock, *The Man Who Knew Too Much* in 1934, and *Jamaica Inn* in 1939. Count Zaroff is an iconic villain and I think you'll enjoy Banks in the role.

The Anatomist: A True Story of Gray's Anatomy by Bill Hayes


Ever since I was introduced to the skeleton at my chiropractor's office, I've been intrigued by the idea of donating my body to science. I'm a supporter of organ donation, and the idea of having my body picked clean and displayed in a high school biology class is kind of cool. It's a different kind of immortality, to be sure, but hey, I'd be making a contribution to scientific knowledge!

The Anatomist explores the development of the classic medical text known to all medical students

who have taken a gross anatomy class, and details the efforts of Henry Gray and artist/collaborator H.V. Carter in getting the book published. It is a blend of history, science, and good, old-fashioned sleuthing. Gray proves to be elusive, but Hayes comes across Carter's journals, stored at the Wellcome Library in London, which provide a fascinating insight into the development of Gray's Anatomy.

Not too squeamish? Then you should enjoy reading about Gray, Carter, and others who made it their life's work to illuminate the workings of the human body.

A cataloger for the Metropolitan Library System since 1995, Jana Hausburg has the daunting task of cataloging library books before they go on the shelves of your local library.



Bonjour, Babar: The Six Unabridged Classics by the Author of Babar by Jean de Brunhoff

If you have the chance to read books to little ones, here's why I recommend the Babar series:

- The language is rich with descriptive words.
- In the stories, manners are the norm and reinforced throughout each story.
- Images are full of activity and colored with bright primary hues.
- The original Jean de Brunhoff Babar stories are geared toward 4-6 year olds while the later Laurent Brunhoff stories are recommended for PreK-3rd.

Written from 1933-40, the elephant society reflects old world morals and includes a few politically incorrect references. Concerned parents would want to preview the stories and may find opportunities for teaching moments in those few out-of-date references.

In the Boston Globe, author Thomas Gagen notes in his article titled "Babar's Enduring Appeal," that "Babar, the storybook elephant created by the artist Jean de Brunhoff, reached the venerable age of 75 this year (2006). France issued a commemorative stamp to celebrate

what has become an epitome of French culture and a major export earner. But there hasn't been much notice in the United States except for an undercurrent of belief that Babar is too sexist, racist, or imperialist for children today. An overly scrupulous reader can find all sorts of messages in the 30 or so Babar books published since 1931, but the basic themes as laid out in the first Story of Babar, are enthralling, innocent and reassuring."

Kevin Henkes, in the Introduction to *Bonjour*, *Babar*, writes, "These (Babar) books are full of adventure and fantasy, but they also deal with the stuff of real life. And I'm convinced children long to see both the dark and the light sides of human experience reflected in their books just as much as adults do, perhaps more."

St. Lucy's Home For Girls Raised by Wolves by Karen Russell

I was thrilled and enamored with the pinprick subtlety of all the goodness chocked into these short stories.

I read a few when they first appeared in the New Yorker, and Russell's so good that I didn't immediately catch on that some of her plot elements actually were not to be found on God's green earth (like the gigantic crab shells that a pair of young brothers rent to use as sand dune toboggans, or the slightly Uzbekistani tribe that sings the avalanche down every year). The title story, in particular, is full of brilliant ideas put into a familiar structure that manages to be the


best of both worlds, reading like a historical rendering of cultural acclimations that never were.

For readers who positively adore Kelly Link and Jonathan Lethem, but sometimes get the yearning to delve into a collection just a smidge less on the fantastical side, I recommend St. Lucy's Home.

Scott Turow Makes "A Case For Writing"

fter he makes his appearance at the Library Endowment Trust's 6th Annual Literary Voices™ Author Dinner on April 17, bestselling author and attorney Scott Turow will be speaking for free to anyone interested in "A Case For Writing."

Many people do not know that Turow was a student of literature before he became an attorney. He earned a master's degree in creative writing from Stanford University and then taught writing there.

Tiring quickly of the purely academic life, Turow



then considered the writer's life full time. He wanted to write but couldn't find the right formula.

"Popular fiction as it existed then," he told an interviewer, "was just plain dumb, and literary fiction was either abstruse, or unbelievably boring."

He found out what many a beginning writer had learned before him—earning a living by writing alone is a tough ticket.

"I realized I wanted to write and practice law when I realized I wasn't going to support myself as a writer. In 1974 I had the choice of teaching, going to Hollywood for a studio staff job, going into advertising, or going to law school, with the promise that

I'd find some way to continue to write. I chose the latter path."

So he packed his bag, entered Harvard Law School the following year, and, on the way to

becoming a highly successful criminal lawyer, published his first book in 1977. The book was One L: An Inside Account of Life in the First Year at Harvard Law School.

As Turow learned the ropes and continued to rise as an attorney, he kept his eyes and ears open to

the people who inhabit the world of law offices and court rooms. Something he overheard one day set

> him to thinking and the result was the international bestseller *Presumed Innocent* in 1987. A successful movie version starring Harrison Ford as prosecutor/hero Rusty Sabich (who returned in Turow's latest thriller *Limitations*, reviewed in this issue) followed three years later.

To find out more about Turow's venture as a lawyer/writer, join us for a free talk on Friday, April 18 at 10:00am, in the 4th floor 46 Star Room of the Downtown Library, 300 Park Avenue, as he makes "A Case For Writing." The session will include


time for questions and answers, and copies of his books will be available for purchase and signing.

This free conversation with Turow will follow his appearance the night before as the Guest Speaker at the annual Library Endowment Trust's Literary Voices™ dinner. The fundraising event will be held at the Oklahoma City Golf & Country Club. Tickets are \$125 per person for the dinner, or \$250 per person to attend the dinner and a private reception with Turow.

Selecting The



Materials Selection Manager Janet Brooks

very library staff member plays an important role in linking the public to the library material it needs and wants, but not many people know what the process is that locates the best material among the thousands of book, CD, and DVD titles that are published each year.

Best

That's where the Metropolitan Library System Materials Selection team enters the picture. The 11 staffers in the Materials Selection office are responsible for finding the items you want to check out.

"A surprising number of things we buy," said Materials Selection Manager Janet Brooks, "come from customer requests. People find out about something they think we should buy and let us know. Most of the requests come to us via the MLS website, www.metrolibrary.org."

Janet estimates that her office receives 300-400 requests for all media formats each week from the public.

"We can't buy it all, of course, but we get what we can within budget constraints if it meets our selection criteria. For instance, we've just begun building a core collection of feature films on DVD. We try to get the established classics, winners of major awards,



movies that are literature-based, and the ones that are on film industry 'Best Of' lists."

But suggestions from the public are not the



only source of potential purchases. Twice each year the Selection team visits each library in the system. Library staff gets a chance to chat with the Selectors to let them know what kind of material each library needs. One library may be experiencing a run on Young Adult novels, and another may need new titles in the science section. Selection follows need.

"We also use the statistics the library generates," Janet said. "We can find out exactly how many times a particular item has been checked out, and what the demand is for particular subjects.

"And we talk among ourselves and take advantage of staff's specialized knowledge."

Once the Selectors understand the kind of material that is needed in each location, they turn to "review media" to find individual titles. They read Publisher's Weekly, Library Journal, The New York Times Book Review, and other sources of reviews of books, CDs and DVDs.

"We will also buy the same title in more than one format. Take for instance Scott Turow's book *Presumed Innocent*. We have it in book form, but we also have it as an audio book, for people who like to listen to books while they drive, and we have the movie version on DVD. We also have several Turow audio books available for download from our emedia collection on the website.

"Another example would be Pride and Prejudice. We have

a classic like *Pride and Prejudice*. We have many editions of the book, including large print, plus the two latest movie versions on DVD, the book on CD, a movie soundtrack



on CD, and even a study guide on DVD.

We're replacing our video cassette collection with DVDs, but we still have the BBC

Television production on VHS."

Materials selection is a challenging process, but it's very worthwhile and provides a lot of fun for the people who do it.

"We're the ones," Janet said, "who always know the answer when someone asks us, 'What's new?"

Askew, Rilla. *The Mercy Seat.* FICTION/ASK

With echoes of William Faulkner, John Steinbeck and the Book of Genesis, Askew's first novel follows the Lodi family as they leave Kentucky and move west to Oklahoma. Law trouble, ill health, and bad feelings plague the family, held together by the strength and courage of 11-year old Mattie. One reader enthused over "Askew's rich, gritty detailing of frontier life."

Askew, Rilla. *Harpsong*. FICTION/ASK

Called by one reviewer "an anthem to the human spirit," this novel is set during the Dirty Thirties in Oklahoma and tells the story of 14-year old Sharon Thompson's hobo travels with harmonica-playin' Harlan Singer as they go cross-country and meet the best and worst folks hard times bring to the surface.
