Oklahoma Images

Social(ist) Security

It seems like every newspaper, news magazine, blog and television pundit program I encounter these days is squawking about Socialism. Referring to the new New Deal stimulus package recently authorized by Congress, "We're all Socialists now" seems to be the oft-repeated mantra. I'm not going to discuss here whether we are or are not now Socialists nor whether we should be. I'm not even going to mention the irony that a Socialist country is financing our two wars and our bailouts.

The last time we were in economic straits this bad, Oklahoma's leadership came to the similar conclusion that stimulus plans smacked of Socialism and they fought Franklin Roosevelt and the New Deal as often as possible. In fact Governor Murray tried to submarine FDR's nomination in 1932 and Governor Leon "Red" Phillips called out the state militia to halt dam construction, while Lyle Boren did what he could do in the Senate. Oklahoma became so cantankerous that she joined Louisiana as the only other state to have its federal programs directly administered from Washington. Funny how we became the poster child for the Depression.

I decided it might be fun to take a look at what "Socialism" brought to Oklahoma City. The most important benefit we received was the development of the old east-west railroad lines. Long called "that damned right-of-way" by Charles Colcord, the Rock Island and part of the Frisco lines ran along what is now Colcord Avenue, between the two Leadership Square towers, behind the Skirvin and into Bricktown. These cross-town lines divided the city for many hours a day and northsouth traffic came to a standstill.

After decades of fighting railroad lawyers, the city finally got the tracks moved south. This left lots of prime land open in the city which was intended for public use, but the collapse in oil prices also collapsed the public purse. Enter the Public Works Administration. They built the only real City Hall Oklahoma City has ever had complete with a nice plaza and fountain in 1937. Because there was no building in the entire city that could hold more than 2000 people, the PWA built our city the Municipal Auditorium as a nice bookend to City Hall. By that time we had let our county courthouse become so dilapidated that it was condemned by the Fire Marshal, so we also got our current county courthouse through the PWA as well.

There are many more "Socialist" footprints all over town including Taft Stadium, and parts of Will Rogers Park and the Zoo; but don't admire them too long — better dead than red.


Here we see the Frisco Station on the site of our current City Hall.

Run

by Ann Patchett

Ann Patchett's novels weave webs of unlikely human connections across genders, ethnicities, and generations. Her most recent work, *Run*, traces a single day in the life of a sprawling Boston family, but it encompasses decades of frustrations, missed opportunities, and shreds of hope in its sweeping story.

The Doyle family's widowed patriarch is a former mayor of Boston whose promising career was ruined by a son's indiscretion. Two other adopted sons frustrate his vicarious desires to reclaim political glory, and the weight of his unmet expectations threatens to break the fragile family bond.

Run shifts perspectives to show the points of view of the father, his adopted sons, and his prodigal biological son who returns in the middle of the pivotal 24 hours. An unlikely pair of extended family members is also introduced, while the absent figure of the lost mother and wife haunts the memories of her living relatives.

The novel's Boston neighborhoods are as

complicated and conflicted as the Doyle family itself, as worlds of privilege and poverty are separated by a few city blocks that might as well be the span of an ocean. As Patchett reveals longheld secrets that have wounded and separated the characters, she fills in a portrait of a family that is ultimately bonded by far more than biology and blood.

Ms. Patchett will be the featured speaker at the annual Literary Voices[™] dinner on April 14, with the proceeds benefitting the Library Endowment Trust. She will also be appearing at the Downtown Library the morning of April 15 to discuss her writing and sign copies of her books.

This title is also available in large print and as an audio book.

Nemesis: The Final Case of Eliot Ness by William Bernhardt

With *Nemesis* William Bernhardt enters the land of the historical crime novel. This is one of those books you take home and figure you'll spend three or four nights on, after work, after supper, after a TV show or two. Then you start it, and you finish it in two nights, tops.

In the mid-1930s, when Bernhardt's book begins, Eliot Ness, of Untouchables fame, has become the Director of Public Safety in Cleveland. He's hired to clean up the kind of messes he was used to—mobsters, crooked labor leaders, juvenile delinquency, traffic disorganization—which he did well.

Then an even bigger problem comes along, a cop's worst nightmare—a serial killer who's grotesque enough to hack his victims to pieces and Reviewed by Doug Bentin

spread them around, and smart enough to leave no clues.

There really was such a killer in Cleveland in the '30s, the Torso Killer. Dismembered and headless corpses, male and female, were found in vacant lots, in lakes, or neatly left in brown paper packages tied up with strings.

Beyond the solid characterization, well-crafted dialogue and relentless plot, Bernhardt has also drawn a Dickensian picture of American heartland hard times during the Great Depression.

It Only Takes a Moment by Mary Jane Clark

It Only Takes A Moment is a novel about a parent's worst nightmare—the kidnapping of a child. In this suspense thriller a national television news anchor, Eliza Blake's daughter, turns up missing from her summer day camp. Eliza calls upon her news network friends to help her find her child.

After days of not hearing from the kidnappers, Eliza is desperate to get any kind of information. Eliza turns to a young woman who claims to have seen Eliza's daughter in a dream. This woman comes to offer her help as a psychic investigator. The FBI agent in charge of the case is very skeptical of the woman's skills. Eliza and friends chase across the Eastern United States searching for clues found only in a woman's dreams. Eliza races against time finding the location where her daughter, Janie, is held captive.

This is a fast paced novel that readers will want to keep reading until turning the last page. Ms. Clark weaves her characters in a cunning plot that keeps you guessing at which one of the suspects is truly guilty. Solving the case is not only finding the child but also knowing the shocking motives behind the kidnapping. It is a story that could be on any front page newspaper about a family next door. The author shows the main character gains strengthening courage as she searches for her missing child.

I would recommend this for adult mystery and suspense reading fans. Enjoy a good book!

Unlocking the Secrets of Your Childhood Memories by Dr. Kevin Leman & Dr. Randy Carlson

I'm such a skeptic. When I read that as few as three of my childhood memories could reveal the way I see the world today, I thought, "Yeah, right. I don't believe it." But I kept reading.

In their book, Drs. Leman and Carlson use a few of their early childhood memories to demonstrate that the personality traits they have today are traits they remember exhibiting as young children. Leman loved being the center of attention, making people laugh, and getting his own way. He still enjoys those same things. Carlson remembers being picked on by his older brothers, feeling embarrassed by his mistakes, and comforting himself with food. Today he is an overweight perfectionist who avoids taking risks.


They claim that the most useful memories are the earliest ones, and the more, the better. The memories must involve specific events and be a person's own memories rather than family stories Reviewed by Phyllis Davidson

about them. He or she must focus on the clearest part of the memory and attach feeling to that part.

Leman believes that childhood memories are even more reliable than birth order as an indicator of why people are the way they are. The authors use dozens of examples from their case files to illustrate how early memories are misleading their clients.

Why? Because those memories are lying. The events were interpreted by a very young child; yet people still believe what those memories are telling them. The authors help their clients see their memories from a more rational, adult point of view to help them change the self-talk that is hurting them.

Once Again, to Zelda: The Stories Behind Literature's Most Intriguing Dedications by Marlene Wagman-Geller

Who the Hell is Pansy O'Hara? The Fascinating Stories Behind 50 of the World's Best Loved Books by Jenny Bond & Chris Sheedy **Reviewed by Jana Hausburg**

I love literary minutiae. I wish I had perfect recall so I could impress at parties with fascinating details about Virginia Woolf, H.G. Wells, or Ian Fleming, but truth be told, once I read a tidbit of interest and vow to remember it, I promptly forget it. (I'm certain my party-going friends are relieved.) So when these two books came across my desk to be cataloged, I knew they'd find their way on my reserve list.

The first, by Marlene Wagman-Geller, recognizes that behind every book dedication there is an interesting story. For example,

- Valley of the Dolls was dedicated to Josephine, Jacqueline Susann's poodle.
- Ayn Rand's lover was hailed in the dedication to Atlas Shrugged, along with her husband.
- One of the most cryptic dedications in literature may be the poem at the beginning of Lewis Carroll's Alice's Adventures in Wonderland.

Curious? I hope so.

The book by Jenny Bond and Chris Sheedy focuses on brief biographies of 50 authors, including quirky facts such as:

- When stacked, the manuscript for Gone With the Wind was taller than its author.
- You think reading War and Peace is a chore? Try writing it out by hand at least 7 times, like Leo Tolstoy's wife Sofya did.
- The Cat in the Hat, by Dr. Seuss, used only 236 individual words in a 1,600 word story.

Both books are quick reads and provide an entertaining glimpse into the lives of writers and the people who loved, supported and inspired them.

A cataloger for the Metropolitan Library System since 1995, Jana Hausburg has the daunting task of cataloging library books before they go on the shelves of your local library.



Echoes From The Dead by Johan Theorin

One foggy night in 1972 on the Island of Oland, Sweden, a small boy named Jens disappears after wandering away from home. Neighborhood searches fail to find any signs of the boy. Perhaps the child got lost in the fog and wandered into the sea and drowned? As a result of the uncertainty about her son's death, his mother Julia Davidsson becomes paralyzed with grief and alcoholism and is unable to keep a steady job.

Twenty years after the boy vanished without a trace, Gerlof Davidsson receives a packet in the mail containing a small leather sandal which he believes belonged to his grandson. Is Jens still alive after all these years and not dead as many supposed? Gerlof and his friend Ernst have

a theory about what happened to Jens which involves Olander native Nils Kant who fled the country during the war accused of murder. The only problem with thinking that Kant was somehow involved with Jens' disappearance is that Nils was supposedly dead at the time that the boy disappeared. With the reappearance of the sandal, Julia and Gerlof are determined to find answers and begin following a trail of clues that leads to a totally unexpected conclusion in this mesmerizing tale.

MEET ANN PATCHETT

From the very beginning, with the publication of her first novel in 1992, The New York Times was describing Ann Patchett's work as "generous, fearless, and startlingly wise."



ince then, Patchett has published four more novels, including the phenomenal bestseller *Bel Canto*, two works of nonfiction, and has guest edited "Best American Short Stories" in 2006.

Ann Patchett will be the speaker at the 7th Annual Literary Voices[™] Author Dinner, sponsored by the Library Endowment Trust, on Tuesday, April 14, 2009 at the Oklahoma City Golf and Country Club. Tickets are \$125 per person for the dinner and the talk.

The following day, Wednesday, April 15, Patchett will speak at the Downtown Library, 300 Park Avenue, from 10am to noon. "Author Confidential: A Conversation with Ann Patchett" is free and open to the public. She will share insights from her writing career and answer questions from the audience.

Ann Patchett believes that the book and its reader form a special individual relationship. "Reading, no matter what book clubs tell us," she wrote last year, "is a private act, private even from the person who wrote the book. Once the novel is out there, the author is beside the point. The reader and the book have their own relationship now, and should be left alone to work things out for themselves. Chances are I can explain, in the course of a Q&A, a novel's dissatisfying ending or a character's cloudy motivations, but who's to say I'm right? Once the book is written, its value is for the reader to decide, not for the author to explain."

Patchett is a Los Angeles native who was raised and still lives in Nashville, TN. Her first novel, *The Patron Saint of Liars*, was named a Notable Book for 1992 by The New York Times and was made into a movie starring Ellen Burstyn and Maggie Gyllenhaal in 1998.

Subsequent novels include *Taft*, *The Magician's Assistant*, and *Run*, but it was her fourth book, *Bel Canto*, that won the National Book Critics Circle Award and the PEN/Faulkner Award. It is also in development to become a motion picture.

The New York Times wrote about *Bel Canto* that it contains "'Patchett doing what she does best — What gives this novel its power is Patchett's flair for sketching the subtleties of her characters' behavior." "The New Yorker" continued the praise by observing that "Patchett's tragicomic novel about an opera diva kidnapped by South American rebels — a fantasia of guns and Puccini and Red Cross negotiations — invokes the glorious, unreliable promises of art, politics, and love."

Patchett enjoys meeting readers and recently recalled an experience with one at a book signing. A mother brought a shy young girl to meet the author. They didn't get to the head of the line until 10:00 that night, and Patchett commented on the lateness of the hour on a school night. "And it's going to be a lot later before she gets to bed,' the mother said. 'We've got a four-hour drive back to West Virginia tonight. I knew you would tell her something she needed to hear, something she'd always remember, and you did. You're her favorite writer, you know. She's going to be a writer, too."

Southern Oaks Library

Constructed in 1975, the Southern Oaks Library at 6900 S. Walker is one of the busiest locations in the Metropolitan Library System. Southern Oaks is the farthest south of any of our libraries and so serves the needs of the north Moore area as well as south OKC.

Last year over 350,000 items were checked out from SO, a number equaling that of the year before and making the library the third busiest in the system, trailing only Edmond and Downtown. With a collection of around 90,000 items, on average every item is checked out four times a year.

Southern Oaks is approximately 17,000 square feet, 12,500 of them dedicated to public service areas.

Manager Randy Wayland heads a team of nine librarians and 13 full time employees—and you can always get Randy's attention if you want to talk to him about collecting comic books. As busy as they are at Southern Oaks, there's always time to think about the important things.
