



Off The Rails

It looks like lofty oil and gasoline prices are the newest amendments to Ben Franklin's shortlist of life's certainties. As one bus stop philosopher was overheard saying recently, "Some day this petroleum-fuelled utopia had to end. 'S time for folks to start livin' right." She was not talking to anyone obviously present and she did not actually board the bus, but that doesn't make her words any less wise.



Three years ago I cut my daily commute from 40 miles to 10 and started carpooling. On days I don't carpool, I make every attempt to ride the bus to work. So I'm getting by alright. Except on those bus days. One day, it took 11 hours to put in my 8 hours after factoring the walk to the bus stop, the wait, and the 45-minute, 5-mile bus ride each way. During my lonely 35-minute wait for

the trip home, I got to thinking about the old Oklahoma Railway Company and its electric street cars.

The ORC has been the stuff of romantic nostalgia in the city for some time and it's still the darling of railfans. At the

street car system's peak of ridership, most homes in the city were within a short walk of a rail stop and cars hummed by every 12 minutes. Colleges, schools, major employers and recreational and entertainment venues were all well-served for a nickel a ride.

At the time of the ORC's demise in the late 1940s, critics said the private venture was never

profitable and couldn't operate without public subsidies. That might sound right to many on first hearing it, but I'll wager that Anton Classen and John Shartel would disagree with the profitability argument. They became millionaires using their street car franchise to sell thousands on the idea that they could live in the suburbs and ride the rails to work. And you'll have a hard time

convincing me that the billions spent constructing roads aren't public subsidies of a transportation system.

It's folly to think that oilsoaked Oklahoma City could have ever resisted the national trend

national trend toward the private automobile, but on that long workday last week, a street car clanging by every 12 minutes would have seemed like a luxury.




Loving Frank: A Novel by Nancy Horan

autobiography.

I admit I didn't know much about Frank Lloyd Wright other than Oklahoma proudly celebrates him as the architect of the Price Tower in Bartlesville. Last year, I cataloged a book about the death of his mistress, Mamah Bouton Borthwick. Her sensational murder sparked my interest in Wright. Curiously, there's very little information available about his relationship with Mamah (pronounced May-mah) other than the brief account he gave of her in his own

The appeal of Horan's historical novel lies in years of research, giving voice to a woman who left behind a husband and two children in order to be with the man she loved. Both were ostracized and attacked by the press, and Wright's reputation and career suffered. The two tried to live quietly in Taliesin, a home built by Wright in Wisconsin,



and struggled to be accepted by the community. There, Mamah worked in her garden and translated works by Swedish feminist Ellen Key.

The novel begins with the commissioning of the Cheney house in 1903. A powerful attraction draws the lovers together, and Mamah struggles with the consequences of her clandestine affair. The sufferings of her children, sister, and husband weigh heavily on her. Her inner struggle is also emotionally exhausting. Seeking to find a place within the intellectual world that calls to her and to be with her soul mate, the choices Mamah makes lead her on a doomed path from which there is no escape.

Devil May Care

To celebrate the 100th anniversary of Ian Fleming's birth, another shot has been taken at reviving Fleming's famous spy, James Bond. Mainstream novelist Sebastian Faulks has produced the ridiculously titled *Devil May Care*, and the book plays out like a James Bond's Greatest Hits album, trotting out all the 007-cliches. If the novel had really been written by Fleming, Bondistas would have condemned it as being just too formulaic—but since Fleming has been dead for 44 years, *Devil May Care* can be cut some slack for being a sweet, nostalgic ride.

Unlike earlier Bond pastiches, this one is set soon after the action in *The Man With the Golden Gun*. The Cold War is still pretty chilly and villainous Dr. Julius Gorner wants to set the Soviet Union at Britain's throat, hoping Shakespeare's "Sceptered Isle" will drop to 3rd World status.

The book is fun, easy to read and just as easy to forget.

They identify with her because she isn't perfect and she gets in trouble.


In this installment, Junie B. gets in trouble for calling her nemesis, May, a dumb bunny. However, she's the one who feels dumb when she wins the dubious honor of wearing a bunny costume at an Easter party hosted by rich Lucille. The giant bunny feet hinder her search for the

golden egg, which will entitle the finder to a playdate to swim in Lucille's heated swimming pool.

The books may not appeal to those who already know how to read well, but even adults may find listening to the episodes as audiobooks very entertaining. The reader, Lana Quintal, has the voice of a first-grader and brings the stories to life so vividly you can almost see the action. Junie B. is a great choice for road trips and might even open discussions about such topics as, well, name calling.



While she is discovering romance among the typewriters, Mma Ramotswe helps a penitent man locate two women whom he once wronged so he can apologize and make amends.

You may want to start at the beginning of the series with The No. 1 Ladies' Detective Agency, Tears of the Giraffe, and Morality for Beautiful Girls. I highly recommend the audio book versions because of the exotic reading talents of Scourby Award winner, Lisette Lecat.

One of the most popular destinations on your Metropolitan Library System's website, www. metrolibrary.org, is the Oklahoma Images section. This is where we get the photos that inspire Larry Johnson's monthly "Oklahoma Images" articles.

But there's another area on our website that is of interest to readers of "Oklahoma Images," and that's the Oklahoma Folklore Collection. There, hundreds of Oklahoma memories are available.

The Oklahoma Folklore Collection is the result of an effort by the Metropolitan Library System in the late 1940's and early 1950's to collect and preserve the stories, memories, and songs that make up Oklahoma's rich folk tradition.

MLS Researcher Stuart Williamson worked with the Folklore Collection as his contribution to Oklahoma's centennial celebration.

"Clarence Paine, who was an avid historian and director of the library system in the late 1940s, contacted Bob Duncan, a radio folk singer and song writer, and they collected folklore from around the state," Williamson said.

"In the early 1980s," Williamson added, "the
Inasmuch Foundation looked for a special project with
which they could help the library and it was decided
to try to get the collection online by Oklahoma's
centennial year. Librarian Larry Johnson, who
has since published the book 'Historic Photos of
Oklahoma City,' cataloged the photo collection, which
had never been done before, and put everyone online at
our website."

Some of the most interesting pieces in the collection are the cowboy songs that were written by range riders and homesteaders and have never been professionally printed or recorded.

"Right after our wedding we started homesteading,
And raising the golden grain,
But then this young lassie got wicked and sassy
And traded our sunshine for rain.
Now I'm an old father with children to bother,
And still I sing this refrain.
The years they keep dragging and the missus keeps nagging
And I wish I was back on the range."

The person who submitted this lyric said of it that it "was written in Texas by a cowpoke who seemed to be in trouble with the law, and that's about the only history I know of."

Getting tired of a constant diet of best sellers and book club hype? Want to take a look at what librarians read? Here are two favorite books as selected by MLS staff.

Steinmeyer, Jim. Charles Fort: The Man Who Invented the Supernatural.

Do frogs, stones, and fish really rain from the sky? Do ghosts exist? Are there really monsters in lakes and fairies at the bottom of the garden? Charles Fort, a newspaperman and failed fiction writer of the early 20th Century thought he knew. Fort spent decades collecting reports of such things from newspapers and magazines and published them all together in four books beginning with The Book of the Damned in 1919, and a good part of the world has been taking them seriously ever since. This is the fascinating tale of Fort's life.

Oates, Joyce Carol. Wild Nights! Stories About the Last Days of Poe, Dickinson, Twain, James, and Hemingway.

FICTION/OAT

Writing in the styles of her subjects, Oates presents us with five quasi-short stories based on incidents in the waning lives of five significant American writers. I don't know any other contemporary writer who could pull this off so successfully. The book is a treat for readers with a taste for good books and the people who create them.
