Oklahoma Images

For Your Ice Only

There was a time when ice was crucial to the operation of the modern city.

owadays, we seem to regard annual ice storms in much the same way we once did tornadoes. Who knows, maybe by our sesquicentennial we'll work ice, downed power lines, and cracked timber into our state marketing plan as well as we have done with the mighty twister.

There was a time when ice was crucial to the operation of the modern city. We've all mused at our grandparents' quaint stories of having ice delivered to their homes by wagon and placed in the household icebox, but we rarely wonder much beyond these tales of the good old days and go on to examine ice and the role it played in our ancestors' lives.

Ice had long been used by humanity to preserve food and tame fevers, but the thought of plopping a couple of cubes in a glass to cool a drink was an unheard of luxury. As Oklahoma City entered its teen years, refrigeration technology had improved to the point that icehouses moved from storing ice blocks cut from frozen lakes to creating ice all year round for commercial and residential markets.



The icehouse was centrally located and huge blocks of ice were distributed to icedocks around the city. By 1925, there were some 40 icedocks dotting the map around town. These docks served as distribution points for home delivery wagons or for direct purchase by the public. The large blocks were once cut by teams of men using two-handled saws, but the development of the electric radial saw sliced the cutting

time from a couple of hours by hand to just thirty minutes.


At times the Oklahoma City market supported six icehouses and ice delivery was competitive and largely controlled by labor unions. Typically, customers placed a card in the front window of their home requesting 12, 25, 50 or 100 pound blocks of ice



and the delivery wagon brought the ice later in the day. As seen in this photo, the work was physically demanding and was often quite dangerous. If air pockets formed in a block, it could shatter when gripped by the tongs, resulting in gruesome wounds from ice shards (author Ralph Ellison's father was killed in this manner).

In the 1910s, demand for ice in Oklahoma City outpaced the supply

and shortages occurred during the summer months. The situation grew so dire, that in 1920, the city considered issuing bonds to build a municipal ice plant and regulate ice production as a public utility. Relief was not far off, though, as the arrival of the first home refrigerators came in the late 1920s.



The Ghost of Mingo Creek and Other Spooky Oklahoma Legends by Greg Rodgers

It's the time of year for gathering around campfires, sipping hot cocoa and telling spooky stories. Now we have eight eerie new tales to choose from in The Ghost of Mingo Creek and Other Spooky Oklahoma Legends.

If a headless ghost is your thing, try the title story. Kids from small towns usually know of a local place that's haunted; in Ardmore it's Mr. Apple's grave, which actually exists. You can go there and search for a worn path encircling his tomb. Ride a rural route with a young paperboy and feel the fear when he glimpses the glowing eyes of an escaped lion hiding in the bushes.

The stories are based on Oklahoma legends that have been orally passed down or recorded



in archives. They showcase Oklahoma industry, geography and culture. Jimmy the Doodlebug sprang from Oklahoma's early oil exploration. The Kiamichi Big foot and the Red River Monster Fish focus on Oklahoma's forests and waterways.

In addition to being highly entertaining and spooky, the stories lightly touch on ethics, warning against greed, pride, mob psychology, etc. This book will be gratefully welcomed into an area of sparse coverage—books for kids about Oklahoma.



Blood River: A Journey to Africa's Broken Heart by Tim Butcher

British journalist Tim Butcher became obsessed with retracing the footsteps of explorer H. M. Stanley's famous expedition and with following the 3,000 kilometer journey along the Congo River from coast to coast.

Fifty years previously the Democratic Republic of Congo had a modern network of roads, railways and river transportation, but today none of that exists. The only practical way of getting around the country today would be by air. However, Butcher decides to make the perilous journey on foot, by canoe and by motor bike in order to follow the river as closely as possible, a feat that even the natives think is far

too dangerous because there are still Hutu warriors wreaking murder and mayhem in the countryside.

As Tim Butcher remarks, "the Congo had more potential than any other African nation, more diamonds, more gold....." but now "much of its territory has been abandoned to a feral state of lawlessness and brutality." Butcher makes a remarkable journey and this is a remarkable book that is thoroughly engaging and thought provoking.

Rockin' Bones: 1950s Punk and Rockabilly Various Artists

The artists represented on this riveting 4-CD box set were present at the creation of a massively influential cultural movement. Fusing hard country twang, forbidden African-American blues, and doit-yourself production values, the 1950s rockabilly pioneers on *Rockin' Bones* invented a sound and an attitude that would shape popular culture well into the 21st century.

This lovingly compiled set places icons like Elvis, Jerry Lee Lewis, and Buddy Holly side by side with utterly obscure singers who helped shape the rockabilly sound. The "Punk" element alluded to in the set's subtitle can be found in the unbridled spirit of singers like Oklahoma City's Wanda

Jackson, whose "Fujiyama Mama" is propelled by raw vocals and a lascivious beat. Songs like Ronnie Hawkins's "Who Do You Love" and Johnny Kidd's "Shakin' All Over" are essential touchstones in rock and roll

history and sound incredibly vital even today.

The extensively researched liner notes provide fascinating short profiles of the singers on *Rockin' Bones*, so many of whom vanished into obscurity


after releasing one or two rumbling singles. Short essays by later rockabilly-influenced artists like Billy Gibbons of ZZ Top and Mike Ness of Social Distortion argue for the lasting legacy of this primal sound.

And it's the sound that is so often remarkable on these discs. The precise, echoing twang of genius guitarist James Burton is featured on several songs, and his rise from the anonymous sideman of one-hit-wonders to the invaluable musical partner of Ricky Nelson and Elvis mirrors the stratospheric launch of rock and roll. The 101 songs on *Rockin' Bones* reveal a critical moment in the middle of the century when music simultaneously looked back at American traditions and African roots and shot itself forward into an electric future. And nothing has ever sounded better blaring out of cheap car speakers on a lonely highway at night.



"Guards shouted at us to be quiet and that just made everyone yell louder. Eventually we were all howling, screaming our heads off, screaming our throats raw. Why not? What did we have to lose?"

You probably know one of those kids: the 5-yearold who uses Google to find games on PBS Kids, the 10-year-old who can DVR his favorite TV shows for the entire week, the teenager who uses MySpace, edits his own digital film, and texts his friends via his cellphone at the same time.

Marcus is that kind of kid. He frequently spoofs his school's gait-recognition software so he can leave early. He always bypasses the web browser provided by school administrators (a system which also records every click) to log onto an encrypted indie browser – a brilliant mechanism for getting around government-approved censorship.

It's this kind of activity that frequently gets

Marcus into trouble with the school vice-principal. But when he happens to be in the wrong place at the wrong time, the stakes are much higher than being expelled. Apprehended by Homeland Security and subjected to enhanced interrogation methods, Marcus gets a glimpse into his city's descent into a police state and he doesn't like what he sees.


Embracing his inner techno-geek, Marcus vows to use his hacker skills to fight back against a government gone mad. He teams up with other like-minded, techno-savvy teens to wage digital disobedience in a fight to forge a future where free speech and civil protest remain a treasured tenet of American democracy.

The Golden Rat by Don Wulffson

It is no secret that 16-year old Baoliu resents his father's new wife. So when the new wife turns up dead, Baoliu quickly becomes the main suspect. At the trial, no one, not even Baoliu's family, speaks up in his defense, so the judge has no choice but to sentence the boy to death. The night before the execution, Baoliu's father comes with bitter news. Baoliu will be set free, but only because his father has paid for a substitute to die in his place. Once he is free, this gruesome ritual plagues Baoliu. He is shunned and harassed by people in the street, and his own family will no longer speak with him; so he is forced to live on the street and forage for food. In a desperate attempt to understand what has happened, he seeks out the

family of the man who died in his place.

This intense mystery set in Yongjia, China, in the year 1199, will hook readers who like punchy action, a little history, and a new twist on the urban survival tale. Wulffson includes occasional Chinese dialogue to lend authenticity, though many of the English phrasings sound far too modern for the time period. Baoliu is a sympathetic, though not fully-developed character. However, the length (168 pages), action and fastpace make this a good choice for young readers interested in the topic.





Since the first issue of *info* came your way, one of our most popular features has been the monthly "Oklahoma Images" article. You know that these print histories are drawn from the vintage pictures in the Oklahoma Images collection on our website, but did you know that you can now hear the stories behind these pictures?



Videos about Oklahoma Images run weekly on the library television program Read About It on Cox Channel 7, Saturday mornings at 10:30, but if you can't watch it live you can now watch Oklahoma Images segments on our website. Just go to www. metrolibrary.org and click on Oklahoma Memories at the bottom of the page. Now click on "Videos About Oklahoma Images" and start browsing. Oklahoma writer/ historian Bob Burke tells the tales. The idea of filming "Oklahoma Images" segments for television and the MLS website sprang from the success we had

with our series of "Oklahoma Moments," a collection of anecdotes about interesting people and events from our state's history that we aired on Read About It during the Oklahoma Centennial year, 2007. Former Governor George Nigh told those stories and they become even more popular when they moved to our website.

"Oklahoma Images" was spun off and lightning struck twice!

Some favorite stories include the one about the Cattlemen's Convention of 1914 and the resultant city-wide party. Another is of Oklahoma City's first Post Office, a ramshackle structure of logs, wood paneling and corregated iron at 8 West Main that was slapped together in 1889.

Another fascinating story is the one about The Avery Chapel African Methodist Episcopal Church, the roots of which stretch back to 1889. It was in the parsonage of this church that the young Ralph Ellison moved with his mother in 1917, after his father's death. It was in the church's library that he first fell in love with books and writing.

"I have always said that the real story of Oklahoma is in its people," said Bob Burke. How true that is.

Midwest City Library

Here's some real MLS trivia—did you know that the original Midwest City Library was located on a golf course? It was a 4,500 square foot structure that had been the Municipal Golf Course building.

That was long ago. Midwest City established library service in 1955 and joined the Metropolitan Library System is 1965 when country-wide service began, but it took until 1983 for Midwest City officials to adopt a building program and select a site for a state-of-the-art facility. On March 26, 1985, Midwest City voters passed a \$2.85-million bond issue.


The library building that is still serving Midwest City opened in September 14, 1987, at 8143 E. Reno. It is 36,200 square feet with a shelving capacity of 90,000 volumes.

The library's new manager is Chris Kennedy, previously the manager of the Noble Library. Chris said, "I am excited to be in Midwest City. The library is a wonderful facility and the staff has been incredibly supportive. I look forward to working with my staff to partner with community agencies as we work to make the Midwest City Library the best it can be."


Getting tired of a constant diet of best sellers and book club hype? Want to take a look at what librarians read? Here are two favorite books as selected by MLS staff.
