# Look Over Jordan

Now that my life is half over, I see enough in the rearview mirror to realize that pretty much any situation you encounter in life has already been covered by an Old Testament story or a Shakespeare play – or both.



ost of our collective knowledge of these stories has been further condensed into utility one-liners like "pride cometh before a fall" and "all's well that ends well." As a historian, though, I love to play the "What if..." game. And one of the "what if's" I've often wondered about is what would have happened if Moses had crossed on over into the Promised Land even though he was told it was forbidden. He had already disobeyed once and was destined to climb up to

Pisgah and be struck down, so what did he have to lose?

You're wondering what Moses has to do with this guy, Oklahoma City's first mayor, William L. Couch. Well, Couch was a Moses of sorts. Around 1884, he joined David L. Payne's Oklahoma Colony and soon after distinguished himself

enough to become Payne's lieutenant and eventual heir to leadership of the Boomer movement to settle the Unassigned Lands. After working tirelessly to open the land to white settlement, involving repeated arrests and lengthy testimonies before government officials, Couch and the Boomers had finally convinced Washington to allow it in early 1889. However, President Harrison warned that anyone present before the official opening was prohibited from making a claim in the Promised Land.

Couch had secured himself a job with the Santa Fe Railroad just before the opening and he thus had ample opportunity to scout out the best land for a claim. Despite being expressly forbidden from entering into the Promised Land, Couch strolled over to present day Main and Walker just after noon on April 22nd, and staked a claim to his new farm long before the first legitimate land runners arrived. A handful of others claimed his land as well, but as there was no authority at the time, claims disputes were not being settled just yet.

About a week after the run, a provisional government was set up and Couch was elected Oklahoma City's first mayor. He was the natural choice, as he was well known by the Boomers

> and known to be in possession of fine leadership skills. But contemporaries also said he was uncompromising, easily angered, and quick to combat. One of the other claimants for the homestead was J. C. Adams, described as violent and eccentric to the point of madness. You can see where this is going. Couch

resigned the mayoralty in spring of 1890 to defend his claim and soon after he was wounded in a skirmish with Adams. He died of complications on April 21 - a full year after entering the Promised Land. Like Moses, he passed from the Earth even though "his eye was not dim, nor his natural force abated."

All in all, I'd say it's a pretty good answer to the "what if." If the lawgivers themselves aren't held accountable for upholding the law, then what hope is there for a nation guided by the rule of law?

# Shambling towards Hiroshima by James Morrow

"We don't want to put too much pressure on you, but it's essential that you understand the stakes," Yordan said. "Turn in a masterful performance, and the Pacific War may end happily."

"Screw it up, and we'll be forced to bust a Jap city or two," Strickland added.

In a parallel universe very similar to our own lives Syms Thorley, a successful B-movie actor known for his uncanny ability to portray mummies, lizards, and other creepy monsters with convincing acumen. So effective is he as Corpuscula, a Frankenstein-like freak, that the U.S. Navy taps him for a top-secret assignment.

In addition to the Manhattan Project, the government is funding the creation of a biological weapon in the hopes of bringing about the unconditional surrender of the Japanese military. Should it work, the Knickerbocker project

would render the dropping of an atomic bomb unnecessary, saving thousands of civilian lives – if Thorley can shamble appropriately on camera.

The military can't possibly risk a live demonstration of their biologically-modified behomoths: Dagwood, Blondie and Mr. Dithers. The creatures are so ferocious and unpredictable, they must remain sedated. Thorley's assignment is to portray one of the creatures for a Japanese delegation, which would film him and convey their horror to the Imperial Government in Tokyo. Capitulation and surrender would be inevitable, if Thorley's acting abilities are up to snuff.

It sounds so crazy, it just might work.

# Pinocchio



*Pinocchio* was not supposed to be Walt Disney's second feature length animated film, but it took so long to get *Bambi* ready for release, the story of the wooden puppet who wants to become a real boy showed up in theaters a full two years earlier.

*Pinocchio* is the favorite Disney cartoon feature of a lot of people, especially men who, in middle age, wonder if they made the best decisions in life. I think we feel closer to Pinocchio than other Disney characters—our hearts are good but the temptations of life can seem awfully strong at times.

The picture is a masterpiece of careful, innovative animation; the set and character designs are

practically perfect, and the multiplane shot that begins the movie by sweeping across village rooftops is a thing of beauty forever.

With great voice acting from Cliff Edwards (Jiminy Cricket), Walter Catlett (Foulfellow the Fox), Dickie Jones in the title role, and others, and terrific songs by Ned Washington and Leigh Harline, *Pinocchio* is a movie for all seasons and ages.

# Go Down Together: The True, Untold Story of Bonnie and Clyde by Jeff Guinn

May 23 marked the 75th anniversary of the deaths of Bonnie Parker and Clyde Barrow in a Louisiana ambush in 1934. That brought to an end the three-year crime spree that took the lives of nine police officers and a yet undetermined number of civilians. Whatever Bonnie and Clyde were in real life, they weren't Robin Hood and Maid Marian.

Guinn is the first historian who had available to him Cumie (Clyde's mother) Barrow's unpublished memoir. It sheds some light on his early years, but Ma was faithful to the fantasy of her good but misunderstood son until her death in 1942, so don't look for any revelations.

The story whips along like a stolen Ford V-8 outdistancing the law—stealing cars was the only crime Clyde was really good at—and Guinn tries to maintain fairness in dealing with both the outlaws and the cops on their trail.

The sort of sad thing is that despite the glamour of the reputation that has grown up around the dangerous duo, bank robber John Dillinger was the one who really understood them. They were just a pair of punk kids, he said, stealing grocery money.



# Flashback by Nevada Barr

Fort Jefferson in Dry Tortugas National Park is the setting for Anna Pigeon's 11th adventure, and what an unforgettable setting it is. Built back in the mid-nineteenth century, the fort almost totally encompasses tiny Garden Key, an island seventy miles from Key West.

Anna takes a temporary assignment as supervisory ranger after the former ranger develops mental issues and begins seeing apparitions that aren't really there. Anna's sister, Molly, sends her a packet of old letters written by their greatgreat aunt, Raffia. She and her husband, the fort commander, lived at the fort during a time when it functioned as a prison for confederate soldiers and for the Lincoln-assassination conspirators.

The cliffhanger chapters alternate between Raffia's account of mysterious events at Fort Jefferson and Anna's discovery of the wreckage of


a speed boat near the island. Before long, Anna begins seeing what appears to be the ghost of Aunt Raffia. Her state of mind deteriorates as she investigates the origins of the speed boat and the apparent disappearance of the former ranger's girlfriend.

I recommend you visit www.wikipedia.com or Google Images for photos and a history of Fort Jefferson before you begin reading the book. It will enhance your understanding and enjoyment of the story, and it might put the Dry Tortugas on your list of future vacation destinations.

This title is also available in a large print edition and as a sound recording.



# The Boy In The Striped Pajamas by John Boyne

One day in 1942, nine year old Bruno starts on a journey that will change his life for ever. He and his parents, his sister Gretel and the maid Maria, all move from their large house in Berlin to Out-With where his father has been sent to work by the Fury. At first Bruno is very angry to have to leave his three best friends Karl, Daniel and Martin, and his home because there is no where to explore in the new house which is small and has soldiers coming and going every day.

However, soon Bruno realizes that he rather enjoys being at Out-With. Herr Liszt comes every day to tutor the children in geography and history

and Bruno finds that there is somewhere to explore after all. Even more exciting to Bruno is that he meets a new friend called Shmuel. So everyday after classes, he secretly leaves the house to talk to the boy in the striped pajamas.

This friendship turns out to have devastating consequences for Bruno and his family. Boyne's powerfully written fable is suitable for both adults and teens alike.


With threats of a possible swine flu pandemic, is it in bad taste to review a book about TEOTWAWKI-- The End of the World As We Know It? I didn't mean to read yet another doomsday scenario book, but after an eagle-eyed librarian questioned the classification of this book, and I started looking through it to figure out which Dewey Decimal Class fit it best, I couldn't put it down.

Unlike most of us, when it all hits the fan Strauss is going to be ready for action. Over an eight-year period, he transformed himself from an average Joe into a steely-eyed, gun-toting survivalist who can start fires with sticks and

some ear wax, wield a knife, find water in the desert, live in the wild by harvesting flora and fauna, pick locks, kill a man with his bare hands, and so much more.

I'm not sure how many couch potatoes will be inspired to rise up and start making escape plans. This type of preparation can get expensive. (Do you know how much a gyrocopter costs?) But it set my imagination wandering. I had no idea there were so many different courses one can take in order to learn about beating a seemingly unbeatable system. Strauss even attends an Urban Escape and Evasion course held right here in Oklahoma City. To prove he's learned to successfully navigate through a dangerous environment, he's dropped into Bricktown and must make his way to the Bass Pro Shop without being caught by bounty hunters. Does he do it? Could I do it? Could you?

# Get Reading Oklahoma.

Times are tough right now for anyone involved in a job search and especially for those whose reading, writing and math need some polishing. Oklahoma adults can now improve these vital life skills and prepare for the GED at the library and from the comfort of their homes.

et Reading Oklahoma is an innovative project of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation that seeks to improve the reading skills of adult citizens through readily accessible programming on public and cable television and online video streaming.

The project includes TV411, an award-winning basic adult skills television program; GED Connection, a television series devoted to improving skills for the GED exam; and www.GetReadingOklahoma.org, which offers online video streaming of both series, contact information for statewide literacy providers and GED resources. Partners working with the Oklahoma City Community Foundation include the Oklahoma Educational Television Authority (OETA), Cox Communications, Oklahoma Department of Libraries and Central Oklahoma Workforce Investment Board (COWIB).

"Many adults read at levels too low to function independently and their inability to read impacts their health, their economic well-being and the lives of their families," says Nancy B. Anthony, executive director of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. "We hope that Get Reading Oklahoma and all of the supporting activities will begin to address this issue in our community and our state."

TV411 is an award-winning series consisting of 30 half-hour programs and accompanying workbooks and teacher's manual. The series focuses on real-life applications of reading, writing and mathematics skills in the areas of parenting, money management and health.

GED Connection is a unique program that is comprised of 39 half-hour programs that help learners study and practice all five subjects included in the GED exam. The programs feature wellknown actors and real world adults in a challenging and interactive setting.

Both TV411 and GED Connection will broadcast on OETA on Mondays through Fridays from 10 a.m. to 12 noon. The series began on June 1 and will continue through July 31. In addition, the programming will be available to Cox Communications customers via the On Demand Freezone channel. For a complete television schedule, visit www. GetReadingOklahoma.org.

People without cable TV subscriptions can access online video streaming of both programs on GetReadingOklahoma. org. They can access them via the public access computers that are available in every library in the Metropolitan Library System. MLS libraries also have for check out books and other materials for self-paced learning at home.

Learners and volunteers can also call 1-888-OK2READ to locate literacy services across the state. Get Reading Oklahoma is part of a group of projects commemorating the Oklahoma City Community Foundation's 40th anniversary. A nonprofit charity established in 1969, the Oklahoma City Community Foundation's mission is to help donors meet the charitable needs of the community through the development and administration of permanent endowment funds for charitable organizations, scholarships and other charities.

# A New Way to Listen to Your Library

You probably know that your Metropolitan Library System has on its shelves hundreds of audio recordings of every kind of music, and you may have heard that we also have hundreds of books on tape and CD. ay you're interested in Barbara Walters' autobiography, *Audition*. You look it up in our online catalog and you see we own the title in three different formats. Take a look at those icons that appear to the left of the

> title. 'There's one that looks like a book, which means we own it in book form. Another of the icons looks like a CD, so you know we have *Audition* as a sound recording.

But what's that third icon, the new one that looks like a little iPod?

That one indicates that we can make the book

available to you as a downloadable sound recording. So now you know

you can locate them by searching for a title, but there



are other ways as well. You'd also find this record by searching "Walters, Barbara." To get that kid-in-a-candy-store feeling, go back

to the "Search the Library Catalog by" screen, and click on "General Keyword." Now type in "downloadable" on the "Search for" line, click "go" and presto, you'll see all the downloadable records we've put online.

We're adding more every day. Some records include links to hear an excerpt of the recording; others link only to the complete recording. Currently, all the records that have been uploaded link to recordings in wma format, although some link to excerpts in MP3. Records for MP3 recordings will be added later.

What kind of material is available in this format? Just about every kind of material there is, from novels by Nora Roberts and John Grisham to Scott McClellan's Bush White House memoir, *What Happened*.

We all owe a big round of applause to the staff in the MLS Cataloging Department who have worked so hard to make sure these records are easy for you to search.

And if there's a better way for us to put you in contact with the available material, we'll find it.



# **Carnegie Library**

The building doesn't exist anymore, but the Carnegie Library served Oklahoma City for 50 years.

Development of educational institutions in Indian Territory and Oklahoma Territory coincided with the public library movement across the United States. Credit for establishing the territories' libraries generally goes to the local Women's Clubs, whose activities almost always included setting up local reading rooms and collecting books to furnish those facilities with material to lend.


The library movement was aided after 1900 by a grants program established by famed steel magnate Andrew Carnegie. Retiring from the steel industry in 1900 at age sixty-five, Carnegie devoted the rest of his life to philanthropy. In total, his Carnegie Corporation provided more than \$41 million for 1,689 free public library buildings in 1,419 communities around the United States. One condition of every Carnegie grant was that a community must pledge an annual amount of 10 percent of the grant, from tax monies and not from endowment or gift, to maintain the library.

Oklahoma communities received \$464,500 in twenty-four Carnegie grants between 1899 and 1916. Construction of the first two public library buildings in Oklahoma Territory (Oklahoma City, 1899 and Guthrie, 1901) were Carnegie grants. Oklahoma City and Muskogee, 1910, received the largest for \$60,000.
