



New info





udson was born in Oklahoma City in 1916. She lived with her parents Ollie Lee and Lenora in a nice bungalow on NW 32 in Military Park until the

late 1920s when her mother became so convinced of her dramatic talent that the whole family moved to Los Angeles. By 1930 the 14 year old actress had a regular gig providing the voice of Honey, the girlfriend of Bosko, in the hit cartoon series of the same name. Ultimately she would make over thirty Bosko shorts.

Despite regularly voicing the girlfriend of an animated character, Hudson picked up a few parts in feature films and routinely wowed directors in her screen tests for lead

roles. Of course it didn't hurt that she was visually stunning, but she was also very mature and had the range to play a variety of roles. RKO-Radio Pictures signed her to a long-term contract, but the problem was that even Hollywood at its most decadent thought it would be creepy to place a 14 year old in a lead role requiring her seduction by much older men. So, obviously there was only one thing to do – change her age in her studio biography.

Her career exploded after 1931. She was a regular in Will Rogers' movies (studio biographers tried to list her birthplace as Claremore, but she and Will both dispelled the rumors) and received second billing to several of filmdom's major stars. By her 18th birthday she had 48 credits under her belt including the missable Lucky

Devils with fellow Oklahomans William Boyd and Lon Chaney, Jr.

Reading through gossip columns of the era, it's obvious that Hudson was adored by her peers and

impressed them as not only gorgeous with mesmerizing Myrna Loy-ish eyes, but that she was also dazzlingly intelligent. At 23 she married a Disney writer and in 1942 quit Hollywood and joined her husband as a spy in Mexico for the duration of World War II. After the war and bored with show business, she appeared as Natalie Wood's mother in Rebel Without a Cause in 1955 then walked away for nearly a decade.

A reporter caught up with her in 1964 and discovered she had been

manager of a 10,000 acre ranch in Arizona and been a communications consultant for a Tulsa oil company. She found the corporate world tiresome as well, so on a lark she called up her long-time friend and dialogue coach William Castle and asked him for a part in one of his schlocky horror films. He put her in Strait-Jacket with another Oklahoman, Joan Crawford.

Rochelle Hudson made two more horror flicks and then hung it up for good in 1967. She died in 1972 with 112 acting credits.



Spiral by Paul McEuen

This thriller has everything: non-stop action, romance, political espionage, biological weapons, nanotechnology, pulsing glow-in-the-dark fungi, and the imminent threat of a world pandemic. It will appeal to men, women, soldiers, pacifists, jocks, nerds, and anyone leery of taking too many antibiotics.

The complex plot begins during World War II as young soldier Liam Conner saves America from Japanese biological weapons. The next time we see him, he is a seventy-five year old physics professor emeritus at Cornell, doting on his great- grandson, Dylan, and plotting romance and more between his younger coworker Jake and his granddaughter Maggie.

From there, the action doesn't stop. Reeling from a personal tragedy, Jake, Maggie, and Dylan prove

satisfyingly feisty and resourceful in defending themselves and their world from danger. But an evil genius has planned their demise with great precision and is bent on destroying America to ensure Asian world dominance.


As soon as I read the last page, I checked imdb. com (Internet Movie Database) to confirm my suspicions. Yes! This novel has been optioned for a movie. Can't wait (am thinking Matt Damon for Jake). Amazingly, this is the first novel by the author. Not surprisingly, he is a physics professor at Cornell University. And interestingly, he is a native of Oklahoma City.

Shadowfever by Karen Marie Moning

I think any series finale is difficult for fans, whether it's television, movies, or books. Look at Return of the Jedi, The Matrix trilogy, The Sopranos, Harry Potter, and The Hunger Games series; all of these endings were met with a mixed bag of appraisals from rabid followers. It's a rare thing for a storyline to play out in a way that satisfies everyone.

And so it goes with *Shadowfever* by Karen Marie Moning. You really need to read the first four books in this urban fantasy before delving into this book. You'll be lost if you don't. However, those of us who have followed MacKayla Lane's ups and downs while searching Dublin for her sister's murderer and fighting evil Fae have been holding our collective breaths for this book.

It's a little disappointing in parts because of the amount of introspection by the main character

throughout the book; more action, please! Much of this soul-searching could have been pared down. Many plot twists occur (a few unbelievable even for someone whose reading preference is fantasy), and Moning's squeezes in a great deal at the end of the book to try and wrap up some loose ends. Moning is a gifted writer, and her books are very readable and addictive. I would highly recommend the series as a whole; it's one of my favorites. A teaser at the end promises more books set in this world, so Moning still has a chance at redemption.

This title is also available as a spoken word compact disc, an Adobe EPUB eBook and an OverDrive WMA Audiobook.

The Tragedy of Arthur by Arthur Phillips

I have never much liked Shakespeare. I find the plays more pleasant to read than to watch, but I could do without him.

Now those were two painful sentences for an aging English major to quote and if anything in them were real I'd be an emotional wreck. Fortunately, it's the opening of Arthur Phillips' new novel--or should I say it's the beginning of the essay that introduces this first edition of a previously lost play by Shakespeare, The Tragedy of Arthur.

Phillip's conceit is that his own father, also named Arthur Phillips, before dying in prison (he was a big league conman) reveals that he is in possession of this lost play. His son locates the manuscript and this new book is the play's first publication. The

publisher, Random House, hired young Arthur to write an Introduction, which turns into a search for veritas. Yeah, good luck with that.

Of course, Arthur pere could be lying. Or Arthur fils could be lying. It's up to the reader to figure it all out. The author's "Introduction" is actually the novel, followed by a real five-act pseudo-Renaissance tragedy about King Arthur. Who could also be a liar.

It's a clever concoction from one of the slyest of our contemporary novelists.

The Hare With Amber Eyes by Edmund De Waal

Netsuke (nets'ke): the two Japanese characters *ne+tsuke* mean "root" and "to attach." Oxford English Dictionary

Netsuke, ornamental togglelike piece, usually of carved ivory, used to attach a medicine box, pipe, or tobacco pouch to the obi (sash) of a Japanese man's traditional dress. During the Tokugawa period (1603–1868), netsukes were an indispensable item of dress as well as being fine works of miniature art. Britannica Online Encyclopedia

Winner of the British 2010 COSTA (formerly the Whitbread) Biography Award, this memoir by Edward De Waal begins in Tokyo where, as a young student, Edward goes on his weekly visits to his Uncle Iggie (Ignace). On each visit after lunch, they open a viewing cabinet or vitrine containing 264 netsuke and carefully examine them one at a time. The netsuke are made of ivory or wood and bring great pleasure to their owners. The hare with amber eyes made of ivory is a favorite. Others include a boxwood hare; a dozen ivory rats and three toads

In 1994 when Iggie dies, Edward inherits the netsuke collection. He cares a great deal for these



precious objects and a passion begins to develop to find out more about them and their previous owners. He knows that they were originally purchased in 1870's Paris by a cousin of his great grandfather called Charles Ephrussi as part of the latest fashion craze for all things Japanisme. The story unfolds as De Waal traces his Jewish roots back to Odessa and follows them and the netsuke from Paris to Vienna, back to Japan and finally to England.

An unlikely bestseller turns out to be a fascinating read spanning over 100 years of European history and detailing a great fondness for the netsuke as a family heirloom. Most of us will not find such wealth when researching our family histories and ironically De Waal is himself a curator of ceramics in London's Victoria & Albert Museum who has clearly inherited the love of pottery himself.



Finders Keepers: A Tale of Archaeological Plunder and Obsession by Craig Childs

"The lives of these artifacts do not begin when they are lifted from the ground, or when you first make eye contact with them in a museum case. They begin centuries, even millennia, earlier, when they are first conceived..."

Walking across an Oklahoma field, you come across an arrowhead nestled in the red earth. Do you pick it up or not? Handle it with wonder or observe it in situ? Take it home to add to your cigar box collection or leave it for future generations to discover? How tempting it is to pocket a little piece of history. Our fingers yearn to touch it, to feel a connection to those who came before us. We don't need context or historicity. It is overwhelming, the desire to have that which appeals to us on an emotional and visceral level. So we take it.

Craig Childs wonders if we can resist the human

impulse for collecting. In his book, he asks thoughtprovoking questions. Who owns the past? Why does the moniker "archaeologist" transform a digger from thief to hero? Why continue to excavate the past when millions of objects are piled up in museums around the world, lacking funding and manpower to do even the most basic analysis?

Riveted, I read about Childs' discovery of a 1,500 year old basket. Tucked into an isolated canyon somewhere in the west, he came across it in all its glory. He takes a small sample for dating, photographs it, and gently places it back where belongs. His philosophy: let us appreciate all that has been gathered, and for the rest, let it lie.



t seems like magic. You stroll through a book store or see an author flogging a new book on a TV talk show, and the next thing you know it's available through

and makes retrieval of the book easier.

The Technical Processors then put a plastic wrap on the book to rse. The books on your keep it clean. This makes it more attractive and allows it to

your library. It isn't magic, of course. The books on your library shelves get there through the hard work of some dedicated MLS staff members the public hardly ever sees.

The trail begins in the Materials Selection office. Deputy Executive Director Karen Marriott and her team of ten read about new material to find out about the best and potentially most popular fiction and non-fiction publications in all formats. They examine dozens of review sources to determine which items will produce the biggest bang for our collection development dollar. They then figure out how many copies of each item we need to buy—you can imagine that buying only a copy or two of a new Nora Roberts novel just won't cut it—and put in the order.

When the material arrives it goes to Heidi Johnson and her team in the Technical Processing Center and to Pauline Rodriguez-Atkins and the Cataloging Department. Cataloging assigns the Call Number, that combination of letter and numbers that appears on the bottom spine of the

The books are then sorted into bins and our daily Delivery Drivers transports the bins to the libraries. This isn't just for new material, either. If an item that belongs to The Village Library winds up being returned to Edmond, the Delivery guys will take it home. And when you put a book on reserve Capitol Hill Library and it's owned at Midwest City, the Clerks or Pages at the owning library pull the book from their shelf and send it to the customer who reserved it.

And speaking of the Clerks and Pages, now we're getting to the real unsung heroes of this adventure. These are the gals and guys who make sure that the books you want to read are placed in the right shelf locations so you can find just what you're looking for every time.

So every book on the shelf passes through several hands before it winds up in yours at the end of the trail. Enjoy!

Be Healthy, Stay Well With Consumer Health Complete

So your kid's outside playing and gets a scrape on his arm. What do you do? That's easy. Everybody knows you splash on a little rubbing alcohol and slap on a band-aid. You don't need a medical degree for that, right?

ut wait a minute. Rubbing alcohol, hydrogen peroxide, and iodine sting. Alcohol dries the skin, which slows down the healing process. Soap and water work every time (dishwashing liquid works, too.) Pat the wound dry with a clean cloth or even a paper towel. Apply some antibiotic cream and a bandage. Let some air in, but don't leave the wound completely exposed or a scab will form. And consider a tetanus booster.

No one wants to make you paranoid about simple everyday boo-boos, but it's good to have a source of information about health questions handy, and one of the best can be found at the MLS website. Click on Databases, then Health & Medicine, and take a look at Consumer Health Complete, a free database that describes itself as "the single most comprehensive resource for consumeroriented health content."

CHC is designed to support the relationship that exists between you and your doctor, not replace it. You can start here, but the serious questions still have to go to your M.D. The database covers a multitude of areas relating to health and wellness,

even relying on information about complementary, holistic and integrated medicine. The full text articles it features come from both professional and layman's journals and discuss such topics as aging, cancer, diabetes, drugs and alcohol, fitness, nutrition and dietetics, children's health, men and

CHC is designed to support the relationship that exists between you and your doctor, not replace it.

women's health, and more.

Several popular encyclopedias and health-related reference books are available for browsing right from the Consumer Health Complete Home Page. These include: The AMA Complete Medical Encyclopedia, Mayo Clinic Family Health Book, the current edition of the Complete Guide to Prescription and Nonprescription Drugs, and others. The information comes to you through fact sheets and pamphlets, videos and animations, and you can search by type of problem, say, poison ivy. You can find a definition, the causes, risk factors, symptoms, diagnosis and treatment, and then get a few words on prevention. (Like, don't go back to that part of the park.)

But CHC is more than just a howto-react-to-medical-emergencies guide. There are also articles on more theoretical subjects. For instance, under the topic "Parenting" you can read a short essay called "The Six Friends Every Mom Needs: Why Connecting With People You Don't Have to Clean Up After Is Crucial to Your Sanity."

There's even a section of national and international health news to inform you about the latest medical research including public and minority health, prevention, safety and awareness, mental health and disease outbreaks. And unlike so many of those TV "news" stories on health issues that are paid for by pharmaceutical companies, Consumer Health Complete does not host or receive funding from advertising or from the display of commercial content. So this is one database you should definitely take a look at. It's good for you.

Off the Beaten Path

... Discovering New Literary Treasures

Getting tired of a constant diet of best sellers and book club hype? Want to take a look at what librarians read? Here are two favorite books as selected by MLS staff.

Gresh, Lois H. and Robert Weinberg. *The Science of Supervillains*. 741.509/G831sv

You'd think that the natural disasters flesh is heir to would be enough to give the average gal or guy a bad-enough case of the galloping whim-whams, but no, the evil geniuses that populate the world of comic books—and during the summer, movie screens—have to come along with their plans for world domination.
