





The Freedom to Read Must Not Be Denied

This month your library system is part of a national program called The Big Read. People around the country will be reading the same book and hopefully talking about it as well. The celebrated book is *Fahrenheit 451*, the classic novel by Ray Bradbury that describes a society where the firemen are so named because they torch books (and their readers and the buildings they occupy). Surprisingly, this is done at the request of a drug-addled society perched on their easy chairs as the lives of celebrities wash over them all day everyday delivered by large television screens. In this world, people grew weary of books offending this group and that group; ridding the world of books also rids the world of controversy and this makes people very happy.

Lest you think this book is pure fantasy and have found yourself quoting the title of Sinclair Lewis' little read cautionary novel It Can't Happen Here, let me remind you that Oklahoma City has always had groups to look after the best interests of its citizens' reading habits. During World War I, a quasi-governmental group called the Council of Defense assisted the courts and the police in destroying over 5000 volumes from a Jehovah's Witness warehouse because five pages of a book suggested that America's entry into the war would bring about the country's ruin.

Later, a private group called the Public Welfare League pressured the mayor into creating a three member Board of Censorship. For nearly three decades, Oklahoma City saw no movie or play, read no book, magazine, or even an advertisement which was not cleared by the censors. "We try to temper the wind to the shorn lamb," one of the censors was quoted as saying. He admitted it was a hard job to be a censor, but that it could've been much easier if the creators of the material had used "good sense". Interestingly, that censor was the Kligrapp of the local Ku Klux Klan. The son of another censor spent ten years in prison on a "morals charge." And the mayor who

appointed them later spent five years in a federal prison.

Since the 1940s, we've had the American Legion disrupting the Oklahoma Youth Legislature for debating Communism; the Oklahoma Literature Commission which attacked comic books and detective magazines; and Citizens for Decent Literature who went after Catcher in the Rye, Wordsworth, and James Bond in the 1960s. There have been plenty more since then and will be many more in the future to be sure.

Thankfully, we've had our defenders as well. In her Daily Oklahoman columns, Edith Johnson routinely challenged the censors; college professors have debated them; and the public library has always ensured that a variety of opinions and viewpoints are presented.

Open your eyes. Read Fahrenheit 451. Join the conversation. The Big Read.

The Lost Memoirs of Jane Austen by Syrie James



James decided to add to the original works by inventing The Lost Memoirs of Jane Austen and creating a novel based on Austen's life that incorporates themes and aspects from both her novels and her real life which are then skillfully blended into a fictional work.

The result is a charming story set in the south

Maybe you know Estleman as an award-winning writer of westerns, or of private eye novels. If so, you're in for a treat with his new mystery.

It stars Valentino, no first name, a film archivist for UCLA. He calls himself a "film detective" because his job is tracking down previously unknown copies of old movies thought to be lost. His knees turn to crumbling celluloid when he finds a complete print of the 1924 movie Greed all eight to ten hours of it. It's the Holy Grail of Lost Movies and if it weren't for the human skeleton on the floor next to the film cans, Val would be in movie heaven.

Assisted in his crime solving by a





twentysomething film/law student named Fanta and an aging professor who teaches only two classes each semester—and that's the first and last class sessions for a total of two hours-Val has to find the killer in 48 hours or the police will confiscate Greed as evidence.

It's merely an okay mystery, but the characters are fun and the dialogue is right out of a 1930s screwball comedy. Frames is a good start to a new series.

The Monster of Florence by Douglas J. Preston with Mario Spezi


Preston, who may be better known for his series of thrillers co-written with Lincoln Child, took his family to live in Florence in the late 1990's where he met Italian journalist Mario Spezi. Spezi told him all about the unsolved mysterious deaths of several young couples over a period of 20 years.

Together, Preston and Spezi began to do their own research into the case only to become entangled with a police force and justice system Reviewed by Christine Bassett

reminiscent of those featured in John Grisham's *The Innocent Man*. Many innocent individuals have spent years in prison or on trial. Even Preston himself was charged with obstructing justice and forced to leave Italy, while Spezi found himself arrested for being the Monster of Florence!

This fast paced true story reads like a fiction thriller and is well worth checking out at your local library.






You may have heard that truth is stranger than fiction. In her autobiography, *Too Close to the Falls*, Catherine Gildiner proves that to be true. Lou's Dirty Dozen By Ranny Grady

The Depression years were hard for everybody, but they were especially hard for Lou Crandall. Her abusive husband died and left her to finish raising their twelve children. Lou was up to the task, using love, hard work, and a ready repertoire of scriptures to train up her children in the way they should go.

They all worked together to survive, earning bits of money in every way they could. Lou worked as a cobbler, a nurse, wrote for the newspaper, and operated a popcorn concession. When her unpaid grocery bill reached \$500, one of her sons took up night plowing to earn extra money. When he and his crew plowed into nests of rattlesnakes, the angry serpents came flying up all around them.

One man died from four bites, but Lou's son didn't let that stop him.


The family survived a three-day dust storm, the birth of an illegitimate child, an attempted rape, and the lack of women's rights. They enjoyed sports and music competitions, going to dances, and once helped a neighbor lay a pit trap beside the outhouse on Halloween night.

This is a true story about Ranny Grady's grandmother. It is told, in fictional style, through the eyes of, Jessie, his mother. Jessie is an Oklahoman who will turn 94 years old in October. In my opinion, this well-written story should be on the New York Times' best-seller list.

Total Constant Order by Crissa-Jean Chappell




The doctor immediately puts Fin on Paxil. The antidepressant makes her sick, and she fears that the drug will turn her into someone else. Around this time, she meets Thayer, a dreadlocked stoner with issues of his own. Hooked on Ritalin since he was a kid, Thayer provides a level of understanding and acceptance Fin has yet to find with her doctor or her mother.

Sick of the side effects, she stops taking Paxil

cold turkey, a bad decision that sends her into painful withdrawals. Rather than give up, she continues to talk with her mother and doctor about her obsessions. Little by little, she begins to understand OCD, obsessive-compulsive disorder. This understanding, paired with her experiences with Thayer, helps her find the inner strength to continue living.

Overall, this is a well-realized first novel. Chappell provides an informed and subtle exploration of a complicated problem. Readers, especially those dealing with their own obsessions, will relate to the author's likeable, realistic characters.

"When we hire a new employee," said Stacy Schrank, MLS
Employee Development
Coordinator and President of the
Continuing Library Education and
Networking Exchange Round Table of
the American Library Association, "we

always hire the person most qualified for the job, but we need to make sure he or she remains well qualified so we developed an in-house training component modeled after the college experience."

Stacy, whose background is in education, created Metro University when he joined the MLS team four years ago. He realized that employees respond well when they are trained by other employees, so while Metro U frequently works with outside consultants and trainers, the majority of the "faculty" is made up of subject matter

experts who are also library staff members. Beyond being just the "dean," Stacy is responsible for training the trainers.

"We keep an eye on what other library systems are doing for in-house continuing education," Stacy added. "MLS has been doing it as long as anybody. Staff training was in place before I got here."

That's true, but Stacy is making it sleeker, more professional, and a lot more fun for staff. That's why so many classes have to be offered. Metro U's catalog lists around ten classes per month. Some colleges don't do as well.

Metro University is not to be confused with the College Consortium that is housed on the fourth floor of the Downtown Library. The classes the Consortium offers are open to the public. MLS' Metro U is just for staff and is a very private school.

"I love it," Stacy concluded, "that we can have such a good time while we develop

The Big Read Heats Up With

e think that the ability to read is a pretty basic skill, but you might be surprised to find out that a lot of people choose not to read for pleasure, nor for any reason at all. A 2004 report from the National Education Association indicated a critical drop in American adults who read just for the fun of it. And as Mark Twain warned us, "A person who won't read has no advantage over one who can't read."

It was in response to that distressing NEA report that the National Endowment for the Arts, in partnership with the Institute of Museum and Library Services, and in cooperation with Arts Midwest, created The Big Read.

The program is being hosted in Oklahoma County by Rose State College and your Metropolitan Library System. The book chosen for discussion here is Ray Bradbury's science fiction classic Fahrenheit 451. "After only three years, The Big Read is already the largest reading program in the United States. This one book, one county read is a great way to connect readers in Oklahoma County," said Sharon Saulmon, Director of the Rose State Learning Resources Center/Library.

In planning The Big Read, NEA's focus was on American literary classics that would appeal to a diverse audience. One of the books selected for community participation was Fahrenheit 451, Ray Bradbury's dystopian tale of a time in the near future when the job of firemen is to burn books because the government doesn't encourage education. The citizens have been so deadened by that time, controlled by media propaganda and drugs, they offer no resistance.

Originally published in 1953, the book has been called "more relevant than ever a half-century later." Fahrenheit 451 has achieved the rare distinction of being both a literary classic and a perennial best seller." "I chose Fahrenheit 451 for our Big Read book,"

Saulmon said. "Ray Bradbury is one of my favorite authors. He is really a librarian's author. He loves libraries and wrote this book by renting a typewriter for \$.10 for 30 minutes at the UCLA Library. He had small children at home and could not concentrate there. He would run up to the Library stacks and find information or a quote to include and continue writing.

"Of course, my other bias in selecting this book is the actual topic of the book. The powers that be controlling information and reading. Bradbury's intent was to condemn the media that was emerging in the 1950s. People in the book are surrounded by the electronic media and lose family connections. No books are freely available. People have to memorize books before they are burned to have the books again in the future."

But as serious as the book's themes are, area Big Read events promise to be a lot of fun.

"The Big Read is an amazing opportunity for Oklahoma City to explore one of the great works of literature," said Emily Williams, MLS' Big Read events coordinator.

"The library is hosting all kinds of fun Big Read programs in October to help bring people together as a community, encourage them to share ideas, and celebrate our shared love of reading."

"We've contacted dozens of local book clubs, many of which will join us in reading Fahrenheit 451 this October," Emily Williams continued. "Free discussion guides will be available at the libraries and at other locations around the city for anyone else who wants to join in on the fun."

James, M.R. (Montague Rhodes). *Count Magnus and Other Ghost Stories: The Complete Ghost Stories of M.R. James*, with an introduction and notes by S.T. Joshi.

FICTION/JAM

James is the father of the deliberately paced, antiquarian ghost story. Frequently you get to the last paragraph before you realize that that odd sensation on the back of your neck is all the hair standing up. His spirits are bad tempered and they don't have much use for the living. Spooky stuff.

Schwartz, Alvin. *Scary Stories to Tell in the Dark*. Collected from American Folklore by Alvin Schwartz. J398.25/SCH399s

Here comes Halloween and Schwartz' many books of spooky—but not too spooky stories—for children are an annual hit with the trick or treat set. Drawing from the folk tale tradition, urban legends and literature, Schwartz can pull the whole family together as you read these mildly haunting tales to the young ones.
