1) Metropolitan Library System Mission Statement—

The Metropolitan Library System facilitates the free flow of information and ideas by providing access to materials, services and programs to Oklahoma County's diverse community.

The Bethany Library opened on January 31, 1965. The Bethany Library joined the Metropolitan Library System later that year.

The Bethany Library is located at 3510 N. Mueller, Bethany, Oklahoma, 73008.

The Bethany Library encompasses 8,280 square feet.

The Bethany Library has seating within the library for 48 library customers.

a) Bethany Community Profile—Bethany is a suburb of Oklahoma City situated on the western side of Oklahoma County. Bethany borders the city of Warr Acres on the north and east and Oklahoma City on the east and south. Bethany is bisected by the famous Route 66 highway. The northwest side of Bethany borders the Wiley Post Airport. The southwest edge of Bethany borders Lake Overholser.

The population of Bethany as reported in the 2000 census is 20,307 residents. The population of the Greater Oklahoma City Metropolitan Area exceeds 500,000.

Bethany is a diverse community with the population listed in the latest census as 85.79% White, 4.36% African American, 2.87% Native American, 1.38% Asian, and 5.8% Hispano or Latino of any race.

Households numbered 8,161. Those households with children under the age of 18 constituted 28.1%. Households with someone 65 or over living alone constituted 12.2%. Households with married couples living together constitute 49%. Individuals living alone constitute 31% of all households.

The median income for a household was \$35,073, and the median family income was \$43,905. Bethany residents below the poverty line constituted 9% of the population with 6.9% of families falling into this category.

Educational attainment:

28.6% of the Bethany populace have a high school diploma;

6% have received an associate degree;

15.4% have received a Bachelor's degree;

7.7% have received a Graduate or professional degree;

and 27% have attended some college courses but did not attain a degree.

Bethany is home to two universities. Southern Nazarene University is a private, Christian, four year liberal arts university which also offers some Masters level programs including an MBA program. The Southwestern Christian University is located at 7210 NW 39th Expressway.

b) **Service hours**: The Bethany Library is open to the public 65 hours per week. Hours of operation are:

Monday through Thursday—9 A.M.-9 P.M. Friday—9 A.M.-6 P.M. Saturday—9 A.M.-5 P.M.

 - a) The Bethany Library houses approximately 57,000 items.

b) Materials geared to a specific reading level:

Children's materials—18,000 items

Young Adult materials—1252 items

Adult materials—28,000 items

Note: Some collections, such as those coded "Seasonal", "Foreign Language", and "Family Place", include children's and adult materials.

Circulating items from any of the Metropolitan Library System libraries may be requested to be sent to the library of the customer's choice.

Materials not found within the Metropolitan Library System libraries may be available through an "Inter-library Loan" request. We will try to find another library outside of the Metropolitan Library System willing to loan the material to us for the use of our customers.

- ii) Access to Metropolitan Library System holdings: Our library catalog is accessed electronically through CyberMars on special computer terminals in the libraries or on the Internet at www.metrolibrary.org.
- iii) **Information Services**—Reference librarians are glad to help our customers to find materials or information.
- iv) **Computer Services**—The Bethany Library has 11 computers on which customers can access the Internet as well as various programs, such as Microsoft Word, Publisher, PowerPoint and Excel.

The Bethany Library also offers free Wireless Internet.

Selected databases can be accessed on the Metropolitan Library System webpage at www.metrolibrary.org. Many of the databases can be accessed from customers' home computers, but some are only available through Internet access within the Metropolitan Library System libraries.

v) Programs—

Adult Programs are provided on a wide range of subjects and of cultural interests, often presenting performances of local groups or informational or craft programs. These are presented one per month on average.

Children's programs and Young Adult programs are generally offered on the following frequencies:

Preschool Storytimes (ages 4-5)—4 weeks in the fall, 4 weeks in the spring; Toddler Times (ages 2-3)—4 weeks in the fall, 4 weeks in the spring; Monthly evening storytimes;

1-2-3 Play with Me! (Family Place) Parent/Child Workshops—Series of 4 meetings held once or twice per year;

4-6 craft or informational programs for elementary-age children during school year; Holiday themed programs for ages--preschool to 6th grade;

2-3 programs aimed at the teenage population during the school year;

Performances for children during June and July, as well as programs for teens;

Summer Reading Programs for preschoolers through teens;

System-wide programs during National Library Week, Children's Book Week, Spring Break and at other times, as arranged.

vi) **Meeting Rooms**: A meeting room is available for public use by advance registration. The room is rented by the hour for a small fee.

The meeting room is 912 square feet. It may be divided into 2 rooms by a sliding wall. Maximum capacity is 140 people for the undivided room. Tables and chairs may further limit the number of participants than can be accommodated. Some restrictions to the room use may apply.

d) Staff--8 Full time staff members and one half-time staff member and 8 part-time pages.

c) Review of Previous Year's Objectives—

Bethany Library Goal:

The Bethany Library exceeded its goal of providing 24 story times by holding 16 Pre-school Story Times and 21 Toddler story times.

The Bethany Library met the goal of providing for one series by having two series of Family Place workshops, now called "1-2-3 Play with Me".

The Spring 2009 series included two workshops per day due to the large number of customers desiring to attend. Each workshop still included over 20 participants even with the double meetings per day.

The Bethany Library exceeded its goal by providing 8 craft or informational programs for elementary-aged children, including a visit by author, David Lubar.

The Bethany Library met its goal of providing 6 programs to appeal to the interests and informational needs of the teenage population.

The Summer Reading Program was a big success in 2008. The Bethany Library had 1344 participants in the Children's Program and 334 participants in the Teen Program.

Attendance in the Neighborhood Arts Programs in the Summer of 2008 totaled 1503. The Bethany Library held double performances of each program due to demand.

The Summer Reading Program was an even bigger success in 2009. The Bethany Library had 1787 participants in the Children's Program and had 349 participants in the Teen Program. Attendance in the Neigborhood Arts Programs in the Summer of 2009 totaled 1855 participants. Even with double performances some potential attendees had to be turned away due to the limit on the number of people who could be accommodated in the Bethany Library meeting room.

The Bethany Library continues to attract Seniors from the surrounding communities. The Winter ReadFest was very popular again this year. Over 400 Seniors enrolled and participated this year.

The Bethany Library had programs of personal interest to area residents. Some of the programs were:

Alzheimer's Education 101, Free Health Checks Fair, AARP Safe Driving Workshops, Be Your Own Boss Workshop, Landscaping for the Birds, Soap Making Workshop, a presentation by writer Carolyn Hart, Rhythmically Speaking presentation—
"The Under Water Bridge", Build Your Own Business, Watts Green Education Seminars, Beginners Knitting Classes, Candle Making Workshop,

A Space Science Technology workshop for children was offered.

Parenting classes were provided in partnership with the Oklahoma City-County Health Department.

Throughout the year various displays of library materials on topics of interest are presented for the customers to enjoy. Materials are available for check-out by the library customers.

Goal: Residents see their library as a resource for introductions to an assortment of cultural, civic and/or community interests.

Bethany Library Goal: The library will host programs to showcase crafts, food, and music of various cultures and for a variety of interests.

Musical Performances were presented by: Buffalofitz, Aboriginal Australian—Stories and Music, the Huun Huur Tu Tuvan Throat Singers, the Merry Sisters, the Silver Strings, Irish Folk Dancers, Zydeco Music with Leon Chavis and Joseph Chavis, Robert Ruiz—Mariachi Guitarist, Cinco de Mayo Celebration with Luis Munoz, and the Oklahoma City Philharmonic String Quartet.

A series of programs on music was provided for Elementary-aged children. Various craft programs for children were offered.

Teen programs included "Gamefest", Face Painting, a Hip Hop Dance Workshop, and a Chinese Brush Painting Workshop.

The Annual Ice Cream Social attracted over one hundred customers.

The "Customer Appreciation Month" cake and tea reception was held in October for Bethany Library customers.

The Holiday Open House held in December provided entertainment and refreshments for Bethany Library customers.

A new series called "Coffee, Tea, and Games" began in the fall of 2008 to provide opportunities for customers to enjoy interacting in the comfort of the Bethany Library Meeting Room. Refreshments are provided.

Yoga classes were provided for adults to exercise with others in a pleasant environment.

Teachers from area schools set up times to meet with their students in the Bethany Library in the summer to encourage them to read and to keep up their reading schools.

Goal: All ages recognize their library as a great place both physically and virtually to interact with others due to the noteworthy opportunities provided.

The Oklahoma City-County Health Department consultants meet monthly in the Bethany Library to discuss with parents their developmental concerns and other issues relating to their children.

Children had several opportunities to participate in the "Children Reading to Dogs" sessions.

Daniel Fields served on the committee for the book on the history of Bethany which is being put together for the Bethany Centennial.

The Bethany Library hosted the committee for the Bethany Centennial in providing a place for the public to scan their personal photographs for use in the book on the history of Bethany. The Bethany Library partnered with Buddy Johnson to record oral histories for the Bethany Centennial History volume and also to add copies to the Oklahoma Memories collection.

New toilets were installed for the comfortable use by customers and staff.

Bethany Library Goal: The library will purchase two new computer chairs to replace older chairs.

We purchased two new computer chairs for the public computers.
