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The Science of Star Wars

Library members experienced the science behind the force in one of the library's summer programs with the Science Museum of Oklahoma.

The program took children and their parents through a series of physics-based activities including moving an object with the force, taking a journey through the galaxy, and creating their own light saber.

Toy cars equipped with magnets on the back taught children the power to move objects with the force. They used another magnet, held in their hand, to repel the car across a table in a race.

A family game took them through the planets within the Star Wars galaxy, and each child received one-on-one time to discuss the physics behind it with a science museum staff member.

Finally, an LED bulb and watch battery were transformed into a light saber that could be attached to each child's Jedi training certificate.



Each year the Science Museum plans their own summer programs. Utilizing them as a resource not only makes the planning easy, but it allows the library to give members who may not be able to afford museum admission, the science museum experience.

We signed each of the boys up for a school library card, allowing them to check materials out from our library.

Each week the young man came to the library with his friends, checking out books and logging minutes for the summer reading program.

We were so pleased with the outcome of this story – we were able to put our members first, and give young men in a difficult situation a "yes" instead of a "no"."

- Franconia, Bavaria where I was born - It is lush and green.
- Cleanliness People will sweep their sidewalks on a weekly basis.
- Food, wine & beers Many of them produced from very old recipes, some going back hundreds of years.
- The living history- Whether it is old castles, old houses built in the Middle Ages, or Bronze Age graves.
- Social engagement People still visit each other, and since Germany is a small county it is easy to take day trips to other European countries like France, Italy, Austria, Switzerland, Hungary, and Poland.

What is the first thing you like to do when you go back to Germany?

Have a Bratwurst at my favorite Bratwurst stand, with lots of mustard.

If you could share one thing with Americans about Germany, what would it be?

Most Germans know at least some English, but if you don't speak any German fluently, try to use a German phrase. Even if mispronounced, Germans will appreciate the effort and go out of their way to help you.

You said you are from Bavaria what is unique about this part of **Germany?**

Bavaria is the state bordering on Austria and Switzerland, so there are the Alps and Mad King Ludwig's castle (including Neuschwansteinwhich is the model for Disneyland's Sleeping Beauty castle). You will also find many milk cows, beautiful scenery, good beer, good food, and let's not forget the annual October Fest held in Munich. The Bavarians are known for their Bavarian accent which at times cannot be understood, even by other Germans.

2017 **Solar Eclipse 101**



What causes an eclipse to occur?

Eclipses occur due to the special coincidence of the moon and the Sun being the same angular size. The Sun is 400 times wider than the moon, but it is also 400 times farther away, so they appear to be the same size in our sky.

What was the most famous total solar eclipse in history?

King Henry I of England, the son of William the Conqueror, died in 1133 CE. This event coincided with a total solar eclipse that lasted over Information from NASA's Website four minutes on Aug. 2 . Historian William of Malmesbury recounts this "hideous darkness agitated the hearts of men." After King Henry's

death, a struggle for the throne threw the kingdom into chaos and civil war.

Isn't this 'safety' issue about eclipse viewing, a bit overblown?

No. Human eyes have not evolved to look at the sun without suffering severe damage. There are no higher organisms on this planet that can do so and not run an enormous risk of being blinded.

Is there anything I can do to make this event personal?

Other than watch it with your family and friends, you may want to create a time capsule, which you would open on April 8, 2024 when the

next total solar eclipse occurs over the continental United States.

Can I photograph the eclipse with my smartphone?

Yes, but of course you have to be careful that you minimize glimpsing the bright sun with your eyes without the benefit of a proper filter. As for your camera, there is no valid reason why you would want to point your smartphone camera at the brilliant, un-eclipsed sun without putting a filter over the lens. During totality, you do not need the filter, of course!
