# Learning by Senses

A fter attending a sensory program at The Village Library in July it was instantly obvious why parents and their children love this program – it's ooey gooey popping fun.



A little girl slapped a big blob of shaving cream in her mom's hand and grinned, a little boy was rattling colorful beads in a clear tube, a small group was huddled around a water station dipping and emptying containers of water and more parents were crowding into the room with their children.

Sensory play includes activities that stimulate the senses: touch, smell, taste, movement, balance, sight and hearing.



Sensory play is beneficial for all children. However, sensory play has been known to benefit children who have autism of sensory integration dysfunction disorder. Sensory play also helps develop motor skills – children learn to coordinate muscle groups as they play. Sensory play can also have a calming affect.

"Early learners can learn a lot from their senses and sensory play gives them new ways to talk about and experience the world around them," Youth Engagement Specialist at the Village, Sally Gray said. "And parents also like it because we do the messy part, so they don't have to do that at home."



The program at the Village began in February and the July 24 program had more families than ever. The program was attended by 38 kids and 22 adults.

Kids in patkas, hijabs, yarmulkes, and baseball caps play side-by-side and learn from each other's traditions in






understand the importance of listening?

*By: Betty G. Birney* Grade level: 2 - 4




This series depicts the life of lovable classroom pet, Og the frog, and his perceptive observations about classroom behavior. Children who read Birney's The World According to

The ability to chunk materials means you only watch what you need in the Lynda course. Most of these videos are just one minute to five minutes in length. Corresponding worksheets and

exercises are also available within some courses to easily synthesize lessons.

Instead of having to complete hours of videos to get credit for one course, course content will be more easily adjusted to the learner's needs.
