

BHM History

Black History Month began as a day long celebration on Abraham Lincoln's birthday. It did not become the month long celebration that it is today until 1976. President Gerald Ford declared February Black History Month stating, "Seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history."

Every president since had designated a theme for Black History Month. The 2020 theme announced by the Association for the Study of African American Life and History (ASALH) is, "African Americans and the Vote." This year marks the centennial of the Nineteenth Amendment and the sesquicentennial of the Fifteenth Amendment, celebrating the culmination of the women's suffrage movement and the right of black men to the ballot following the Civil War.



Features To Know In World NewsDigest

ant to check out the <u>Mueller Report</u>? Or watch original footage of <u>Martin Luther King Jr.</u>
receiving the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964? World News Digest gives you access to all that and more.

World News Digest (WND) is a chronicle of ongoing events beginning in 1940 when *Facts on File* (the original name, pre-Infobase) began. WND was a print resource for the first 70 years, but it has been around for nearly 80 years. This resource is a great way for students to begin research on current events for essays and other school assignments. It is also useful for anyone wanting to get a comprehensive overview of a topic to develop an opinion or simply as a tool to reflect on important historical events. Here are some of its best features.

Featured articles

The home page features a recent article with a link to related news articles for further research. There are also links to tabs with social media highlights, videos, editorial cartoons and infographics on the featured topic. The most recent events will have the more up-to-date content, whereas an event that has been going on for a while will have some older content as well as the most recent articles on the subject.

Landmark Events in History

Students usually read about history in textbooks from historians reflecting on the past, however this resource allows students to view primary sources and original news



stories. Landmark Events may not have social media or videos, but they will have news stories from around the time that it was happening. However, there may also be a *Media* tab were some videos can be found.

Special Features

Infobase highlights a new topic in the *Special Feature* section on the home page every month or two. This is a great way to get a comprehensive overview of a current event. There



is currently an *Election Guide* posted under the special feature.

That Day in History

That Day in History is a fun feature on the home page where you can enter any date and it will tell you what happened on that day in history. It's a great way to

incorporate history into your daily learning.

Browsing

You can utilize the *Browse the News* feature on the menu and look at topics by country, by people or by topic. The featured topics on the browse pages will be the most recent events, people and topics in the news. For example if you go to *People in the News* the featured articles are Donald Trump, Nancy Pelosi, Boris Johnson and Mark Zuckerberg.

Curriculum Tools

In the main menu there is a feature titled, *Curriculum Tools* that has helpful teaching articles related to WND.

Featured Videos

On the home page under *Featured Resources* there is a videos link with engaging historical content. Some of the current featured videos include D-Day, the moon landing, Nixon's resignation and September 11, 2001.
