

# Let's get WILD About Reading!

une kicks off our annual Summer Reading program and this year's Wild About Reading program is inspired by the WILD world of Maurice Sendak, author of the popular children's book Where the Wild Things Are.

#### Why Summer Reading?

Each year we draw the attention of our community to the importance of reading for both children and adults. Reading reduces stress, builds vocabulary, improves memory, increases analytical thinking, improves focus and more.

It is important for students to continue reading during the summer to beat the summer slide, learning loss caused by periods of little reading. Just 20 minutes a day can keep students on track.

However, this year we are also encouraging our community to get out and enjoy other literacy activities such as book clubs, library events and more. By joining in on literacy activities, Summer Reading participants can earn additional points toward prizes in our Summer Reading program.

#### How do points work?

Each minute read counts as a point and each activity completed counts as 5 points.

600 points

(10 hrs of reading) = Goal 1

1200 points

(20 hrs of reading) = Goal 2

1800 points

(30 hrs of reading) = Read it Forward

- **3.** Log minutes and activities to earn badges and prizes.

#### Volunteers help make it happen.

Summer Reading is a busy time – we can use all the help we can get and not only do our volunteers help us, but we help them!

Many of our volunteers have never had a job before, so volunteering at the library gives them job experience. In addition to job experience, volunteers gain skill in reading to children, learn to take initiative and make lasting friendships.

them make the most of the volunteer experience by giving them projects to work on and remember that volunteers are customers too.

- Learn how to log volunteer hours by reading the steps in the Tips for Staff or asking your library's Summer Super.
- **Communicate with teens** effectively by letting them take the lead and learning to say "yes" when you can, phrasing concerns as questions (i.e. "Have you considered...?" or "Have you tried...?"), assume they have the best intent, know your boundaries and get to know your volunteers.
- Make volunteers feel like part of the team by remembering to: feed them because sometimes just a simple snack can make things easier when you're hungry; give them goals so they know what your library is working to achieve; celebrate with them by having incremental celebrations of

success; praise them and encourage them in their role; develop friendships; be positive about your library, your team and Summer Reading.

#### **Volunteer Tips Overview:**

- Tell potential volunteers about the benefits of volunteering such as job experience, service-learning hours and confidence building. They won't want to miss out on this opportunity!
- Make your volunteers feel welcome. Some ways you can make them feel like part of the team include greeting them each day, making yourself approachable by asking how they are doing and answering any questions. Help










#### You Don't Have to Say You Love Me by Sherman Alexie

Adult | Nonfiction

The story of a complicated motherson relationship in a Native American Family on the Spokane Reservation. The author also vividly depicts life on the reservation, touching on difficult topics including joblessness, alcoholism and drug abuse, fatal car crashes, violence, rape and child molestation, murder and exclusion from society.





**Jefferson: Architect of American Liberty** by John B. Boles Adult | Nonfiction An in-depth biography of founding father, Thomas Jefferson, covering various defining parts of his life. The author asks that they reader consider things from the perspective of

someone living in that time, but does not excuse Jefferson. Some of the more heavily touched on topics include Jefferson's dispute with Alexander Hamilton and Aaron Burr, his thoughts on religion and his relationship with his enslaved servant Sally Hemmings.

#### **Make Your Home Among Strangers** by Jennine Capo Crucet

Adult | Fiction

A coming of age story set in a Cuban American community in Miami Florida. The protagonist, Lizet, is the daughter of Cuban immigrants and she will be the first in her family to attend college. Her aspirations are directly juxtaposed to those of her older




sister who aspires to marry and have children. Lizet struggles to find her place as she embarks on her first year of college.

#### Between the World and Me

by Ta-Nehisi Coates

Adult | Nonfiction

A series of essays confronting the issue of race in America



written as a letter from the author to his son. He discusses several difficult topics including mass incarceration, slavery and police brutality. He touches on what he believes it means to be a black man in America today. He cautions against the idea that racism exists only in the distant past.



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






## Our Kids: The American Dream in Crisis

Adult | Fiction



# Print book, meet audiobook.

#### So, what are Vox Books?

Vox Books are audio enabled books now available for checkout at Metro Libraries. Vox Books is the name of the product produced by Library Ideas.

#### How do they work?

A speaker is attached to the print book and after pressing play, users can read along at their own speed. Customers can listen to the book out loud or through headphones. The battery is rechargeable and lasts approximately 125-150 plays. The charger is a mico-USB, also known as a "universal port" to make it easy to charge.


## What are the benefits of audiobooks?

The VOX<sup>™</sup> Reader is permanently attached to the inside of every VOX<sup>™</sup> Book.



#### **User Controls**

Adjust the volume using the + and − buttons.

Move forward or back a page with the ← and → buttons.

#### **Listening Options**

Use the built-in speaker above the control panel or attach earphones using the jack along the left side.

#### Easy Charging

To recharge, simply insert the included wall charger into the earphone/charging jack and connect to a wall outlet.
