

2020 Benefits Enrollment

The Metropolitan Library System has self-insured group medical insurance coverage with in-network and out-ofnetwork benefits. There are employee only or employee with dependents coverage options available for employees who work 30 hours a week or more. Enrollment must be completed by June 11, 2020.

When enrolling it is important to consider If you have access to another health plan (i.e. through a parent or spouse), you should compare the cost and coverage of each plan and choose the plan that best fits your healthcare needs, Benefits Manager Stephany Dowd said.

Benefits are effective July 1, 2020

- Employee only = \$104.96
- Family (Employee Plus Dependents) = \$352.20

What's new in the 2020 plan year?

- The cost increased 1.1%. Employee only coverage is \$1.14 more per month. Employee plus dependent(s) coverage is \$3.84 more per month.
- Telehealth services were added 03/16/20, subject to applicable office visit co-pays (\$25.00 for primary care visit and \$50.00 for specialist).
- COVID-19 testing is covered at 100%, just present your health insurance card to the health care provider and they can verify the coverage.

Helpful Plan Benefits to Consider Using:

- Flu Vaccines: Vaccines are available at all pharmacies paid at 100%.
- Flex Spending Account: If you have reoccurring medical, dental, prescription and/or vision expenses, enrolling in the flexible spending account is a great

way to save taxes on your income as deductions are made pre-tax.

- MyDecision: Staff have 100% paid benefits through MyDecision providers. Before scheduling a surgery or diagnostic testing, call (844) 289-9963 to get in touch with a MyDecision provider.
- Mother and Child Program: Enroll in the Mother and Child Program and get access to a prenatal nurse throughout the pregnancy to keep you both healthy.

Race and Equity



New York Times Remote Access Now Live

The New York Times is now available with a library account from anywhere!

To access offsite, customers can click the New York Times link on the Download and Stream page of our website to redeem a 24-hour pass to nytimes.com. Customers will need to register for a free account or login using an existing account with their email address. The pass also gives them access to nytimes.com and the app.

For customers accessing New York Times in the library, nothing has changed. They can simply navigate to nytimes.com and login using their account.

Nytmes.com provides access to articles from 1851-1922 and 1981-present, but it's designed more for everyday use catching up on recent events. For research purposes, ProQuest's Historical Newspapers database provides full coverage of the Times from 1851-2012 and ProQuest's U.S. Major Dailies database provides coverage from 1980-now.
