Printing

View Back Issues


Issues as far back as 2009 on National Geographic Kids and as far back as 1988 on National Geographic Magazine.

Tell parents about the Library's digital

collection. Parents planning a road trip with their families may be delighted to know that they can take the library with them! Applications like Libby, Hoopla, Kanopy and Speakaboos are traveling lifesavers. Families can listen to audiobooks in the car together, watch movies in the hotel and more on these free library resources.

Set out some passive programing at your library. This may include things like a ballot box to poll



customers on their favorite read of 2020 so far, coloring stations, puzzles and more. Your imagination is the limit! Try something new or unique with your library customers.

Inspire them to enter the Fan Fiction and Fan Art Contest at Southern Oaks

Library. Encourage teens to get writing and drawing! Submissions will be accepted through March 22 at 6:00 p.m. by emailing cjones@ metrolibrary.org or by dropping them off at the Southern Oaks Library. Winners will be announced at the announcement party and awards ceremony on March 28, 2020 from 1:30-3:30 p.m. The Fan Fiction and Fan Art contest was founded by Southern Oaks Librarian, John Hilbert. Tell them about upcoming film-making

programs. The Bethany Library is hosting a unique Film Camp 101 on Mar. 16 and 19 in their makerspace to teach teens the basics of using film equipment. Each teen will have the opportunity to create their own 90 second movie. The Downtown Library is hosting a Stop Motion Film Making series beginning Mar. 18 where children and teens can learn to storyboard, create characters and create mini sets.

Direct them to STEAM programs. In addition to filmmaking, several libraries host coding programs for children and teens. The Northwest Library will host a Spring Break Coding Camp Mar. 16-20. The Program series includes computational thinking, algorithms & debugging, conditionals, loops and events and variables.

Encourage them to try an

escape room. Escape rooms have become a library programming hit, and it's no surprise, they're relatively inexpensive and yield lasting rewards! Children, teens and families can engage in family entertainment that encourages critical thinking, problem solving and team building. The Del City Library is hosting two Triwizard Escape Rooms on Mar. 19.

Tell bored teens about board games at the

Library. The Almonte Library is hosting a Spring Break Game Room Mar. 16, 18 and 20. The program series includes video games and group challenges to get children and teens thinking critically, building new friendships and having some good old-fashioned fun.

DIY Development Chair Work: How to Project Vocal Confidence 19(m) 21(s)

Learn how to project vocal confidence. Speech coach Allison Shapira teaches tips and tricks for better projecting your voice, in this course adapted from the podcast How to Be Awesome at Your Job. A former opera singer and TEDx speaker, Allison teaches at the Harvard Kennedy School and offers keynote speeches, workshops, and executive coaching for Fortune 500 companies, government agencies, and nonprofits around the world. She explains how most people are breathing wrong—and what to do about it. Allison offers a three-step technique to correct your breathing and three tips for strengthening the power of your voice. She also describes the best way to prepare for a speech, bring it to life, and drive your point home.
