

ONEcard Engages Students with Library Services

Students in Oklahoma City Public Schools have a unique way to access library resources. ONEcard is a partnership between the Metropolitan Library System and OKCPS that started in 2017. Students enrolled in a ONEcard account can use their student ID numbers to access Metro Library resources!

OKCPS students are automatically enrolled in ONEcard when they register to attend school, unless their parent or guardian opts them out. ONEcard account holders can check out up to 10 books or audiobooks at a time, use all online resources (including e-books, e-audiobooks and databases) and use library computers.

Working with students who don't go to OKCPS? Any child under the age of 17 who is eligible to attend school in Oklahoma County may apply for either a primary or school account. At this time, we aren't able to expand ONEcard to include other school districts. How many ONEcard users do we have, and how often are they used?

- We have 33,030 registered ONEcard users
- 5,565 (47.1%) have been used at least once since July 1, 2020
- 8,366 (25.3%) were used since June 1, 2021
- 2,229 computer sessions have been logged by ONEcard users since July 1, 2021

The libraries with the highest number of ONEcard internet access sessions since July 1 are:

- Capitol Hill - 471
- Ralph Ellison - 369
- Southern Oaks - 357
- Almonte - 336
- Village - 308
- Northwest - 100



The data for libraries with highest non-internet usage is not as clear, with many students logging in to our databases from their school. The Downtown Library sees a lot of usage from John Rex Elementary!
