Programming Spotlight: 123! Play With Me!



A programming favorite, "123! Play with Me!" not only encourages parents to play with their children, but it gives them the opportunity to learn and grow as caregivers.

The program is an informal playgroup where community resource professionals are invited to walk around the room and talk with parents about topics such as development, nutrition, social and emotional health, the importance of play, and other valuable topics.

"It helps parents and caregivers broaden their support system by making friends with other parents," Children's Services Librarian Kristin Williamson said. The Metropolitan Library System was first introduced to the program in 1997 at a training for library administrators. In 2002 Metro Library's "123! Play with Me!" program became a part of a collaboration with Family Place Libraries, an initiative started in 1996 to expand the role of public libraries as community centers for families.

"The basis for '123! Play with Me!' was a training program founded by a mother who realized there was a lack of resources in her community for parents – in particular first-time parents, and she thought the library could help fill this void," Beyond the Walls Manager LaVetta Dent said.

In addition to the parent-child workshops, the program provides toys in the children's area, parenting collections, staff training on child development, and resources for parents.

"Some children have had developmental or speech delays identified by the resource professionals and the librarian can then direct the family to agencies to have the child tested or provide resources. It is so important to have delays identified early," Williamson said.

"123! Play with Me!" programs are offered twice a year, in the fall and spring. Each series runs for four weeks, and typically 12-14 libraries participate, which comes to about 100-115 individual programs annually.

- •A renovation to the Downtown Library.



Resource Highlights

Cypress Resume - This database walks users through the process of building a resume - it prompts users to enter the right information and links them to a job description so they have an easier time entering appropriate experience. After it is created they can download a PDF, rtf, or txt.

<u>O*Net Online</u>- A resource with thousands of job descriptions to help users develop an idea of the schooling needed for a particular job, the salary, and other career information.

Film Scripts Online - This database has over a thousand scripts - available without checking them out. Users can make a favorite list, save and print PDF, as well as cite, email, share, and embed.
