Did you see the e-mail about the big outbreak from **Lori Piccolo**. Director of Human Resources? Oklahoma has gotten the flu.

"The best way to prevent the flu," Lori said, "is by getting vaccinated each year. There are many myths about the vaccine so it's important to know that the flu vaccine cannot give you the flu. Why? Because the flu shot contains killed viruses, and the nasal spray has weakened viruses that cannot cause illness. If you get flu-like symptoms soon after getting vaccinated, it means you may have been exposed to the flu before getting vaccinated or during the two-week period it takes the body to gain protection after vaccination; it might also mean you are sick with another illness that causes symptoms similar to the flu. When you don't get the flu vaccine, you're putting yourself and those around you at risk for serious illness."

If you missed the flu shot at FOCUS last October, it's not too late. If you are currently on the Library's Health Plan, you can be reimbursed 100% when you receive the vaccination from any provider that administers it. For reimbursement details, contact Kelly Hoffman at ext. 3743.

Most importantly, to prevent the virus from spreading - please stay home and do not come to work if you think you have the flu! Remember to wash your hands

and/or use hand sanitizer frequently (hand sanitizer is available through Supplies).

Good News From the Big Town (The Really Big Town)

Well, you never know where the good news is coming from and sometimes it surprises you. For instance, a report on a study conducted by the Center for an Urban Future released a couple of weeks ago showed that libraries in Brooklyn, Queens and New York

New York Public Library

have experienced a 40% spike in the number of people attending programs and a 59% increase in circulation since 2002.

What these new stats show beyond all doubt is that at least as important a part of libraries' work is in providing information, training and resources to local communities, often to their most vulnerable people. The study focuses on some of the heaviest users of libraries — immigrants, seniors, jobseekers and students/schoolkids — who rely on the institutions now more

than ever for help with English-language learning, computer skills, internet access, internet literacy training and job research, and as a community hub.

Almost three million residents of NYC have no Internet access at home. Now central Oklahoma is no NY, NY, and we have no way of telling you how to compare that figure to ours, but our guess is that if the New York figure surprised you, the OKC figure would, too.

Here's another kicker from the report: "Since 2002, the city's three library systems have increased their total number of public access computers by 89 percent, with number of users rising just as fast or even faster. In the last five years alone, the number of computer sessions logged at public computers in the city's libraries has grown by 62 percent, going from 5.8 million sessions in 2007 to over 9.3 million in 2011.

At **NYPL** alone, attendance at technology programs nearly doubled from 2003 to 2012, going from 30,000 to 58,541.

Which all means what for American libraries? With the combination of an information and communication revolution, an economic crisis and an aging population are only going to put more pressure on libraries across the country.

We know we do good work—it's just nice to see stats that prove it.



Lending Library: Library Mashups: Exploring New Ways to Deliver Library Data

Booklist wrote about this title that "Editor Engard assembles 21 articles from 25 international contributors to focus on mashups within the library environment. Readers with little knowledge of mashups will find chapters such as 'What Is a Mashup'? and 'Behind the Scenes: Some Technical Details on Mashups' especially helpful. Other portions of this book cover topics such as mashups in library Web sites, mashups of catalog data, and mashups and media (e.g., photos). Technical details should not overwhelm non-techies. Plenty of screenshots aid in comprehension, although a few seem too small to read easily. One strength of this title is the emphasis on experiences in actual libraries, for example, mashup integration at the Manchester City (NH) Library. One weakness is that little attention is given to mashup accessibility for people with disabilities. A timely and useful resource for those keen on this fairly new technology."





















The ShelfLife Quiz:

What Goes Around Comes Around

Remember when we used to have some really nice independent book stores in OKC? More than just Full Circle. Remember Bollinger's? Nice location on North May. Then Barnes & Noble opened two stores, with Bollinger's right in the middle between them, and they drove Bollinger's out of business by undercutting pricing.

If you're into sweet revenge you may be happy to learn that B&N, after celebrating the demise of Borders last year, is now on the financial bubble itself, at least as far as brick and mortar stores are concerned. If they close up shop, 1362 bookstores will disappear—less than two years after 686 Borders stores vanished.

The odd thing is that this may not be good news for Amazon.com and other online book dealers. Surveys have

shown that 40% of online book shoppers do the same thing with books that tech shoppers do with TVs, etc. They "showroom," go to look at items at a brick and mortar before they

purchase online. If they have no place to go to look, they may quit buying books entirely.

Maybe libraries can save the day by providing brick and mortars where readers can not only examine new titles and new editions, but find out they can borrow them electronically, too. It's becoming a whole new system and we just have to learn how to work it.


