

Donna Morris Named New MLS Executive Director



New MLS Executive Director, Donna Morris

At the Nov. 21 MLS Commission meeting, Donna Morris was officially named MLS Executive Director, after serving three-and-a-half months as Acting Executive Director.

Donna Morris, a 33-year veteran of the Metropolitan Library System, has been named by the Metropolitan Library Commission as the System's new Executive Director. Morris replaces Norman Maas, who resigned in August.

Morris, who began her employment with the library as a clerk at the Belle Isle Library in 1969, has been serving as Acting Executive Director since August 2002. She was named executive director at the Commission's meeting on Nov. 21. "I'm very excited by this appointment," Morris said, "and honored to be the one who will lead this great library system to even more accomplishments in the years ahead."

Morris, a native of Kansas City, MO, holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Central Oklahoma in Elementary Education and a Master of Library Science degree from the University of Oklahoma.

Morris believes her training in education helped her land her first significant job with the library.

"Except for student teaching, I never did any classroom teaching, but I think that training helped me when I became a

part-time Children's Librarian. When I discovered the nature of library work, I fell in love with it.

"There are interesting puzzles in answering reference questions," she said, "and I just loved researching them. People come to you with questions they need answers to and you have to find the information they need. Now that's fun."

Morris and her husband, Kenny, have two sons, Jeff, a student at the University of Oklahoma, and Matt, who hopes to enroll at OU next spring. They are a close knit family that enjoys spending time together.

"I read a lot, which I guess is just what you'd expect a librarian to do," she said with a smile, "but we spend a lot of time watching and participating in sports, too. We enjoy clear water scuba diving, swimming, boating and snow skiing. We haven't been skiing in several years, but I'd love to get back on the slopes. My guys play a lot of golf, and I join them sometimes, though I'm not very good at it.

"I probably shouldn't admit this, but I love computer games, and during the winter months, I like to work jigsaw puzzles. And don't tell anyone, but I like to go shopping. In fact, I *love* to go shopping," she added with the big smile that library employees know so well.

"And no one suspects this, but I'm a pretty good cook."

The closeness of the Morris family provided much needed support in 1994 when she was diagnosed with breast cancer.

"I had a fast growing, aggressive tumor, and I was told then that there was a 50 percent chance of recurrence. Well, I did beat it, and so far there has been no sign of a return."

Morris leaned back in her chair as the memory of those frightening days rushed over her.

"I know you hear this a lot, but the experience did make me a stronger person. It also put things into better perspective," she said. "I realized as never before how important my family is to me, and how good it is to have a job

you enjoy doing with people you like to spend time with.

"I was lucky in that I'm a positive person. Attitude plays such an important role in recov-

ery. I wouldn't give in to it. That experience taught me a lot about myself and about the people I love, but I tell you," she added, "I do not want to do it again."

Having met and won the greatest



challenge of her life, Morris is now prepared to face the challenges of her new job: several building projects, a big jump in usage of library services and a flat budget.

"We have a lot of changes in store," she admitted, "whether we like it or not. Meeting them will keep us busy for years to come.

"The new Downtown Library Learning Center will be opening next year, and we are well into the planning stages for a new library facility to serve the far northwest area of the county. We hope to locate it on the Francis Tuttle campus, and we should be ready to open the doors within five years. A small pocket in the southwestern part of the county, near the airport, does not have an easily accessible library, and Edmond is growing so fast we may have to look at another expansion there within the next 10 to 25 years.

"We cannot stand still and continue to meet the informational and recreational needs of the people who have come to depend on us. We will also maintain the relationships we've already forged with our neighboring communities," she said.

But Morris is not content to merely continue doing what the library system

has already proven it does so well.

"To be viable 50 years from now," she added, "we must strengthen the advances we've begun in literacy and early childhood development programming. Our Family Place initiative, through which parents and children can come to selected libraries to play and learn together, has proven to be an overwhelming success, and we intend to expand it to more library locations.

"Of course, in order to do that, and to create programs that meet current and future community needs," she noted, "we must ensure that we have the resources to provide consistent service.

"Whenever there is a downturn in the economy, more people depend on the public library to help them. Financing will continue to be a problem we have to face straight on," she noted.

And Donna Morris is the right person to meet those challenges.

She has been deeply involved in designing a new library building for the city of Choctaw after the old building was devastated by tornadoes in May of 1999. The new Choctaw Library will open next year.

She has also contributed to planning the new Downtown Library and Learning Center, which is now about 70 percent complete.

"The problems with the outside panels are not resolved at this time," she said, "but work on the inside of the building is continuing, and we expect to take possession of the building next summer and open the doors next fall.

"The facility will be spectacular, and we know that the Learning Center will be heavily used. The Downtown Consortium will depend on it to house classes, meetings, even conventions. I think the people of Oklahoma County are going to be amazed and delighted at what we are going to be able to provide them."

Donna Morris, who has devoted more than half her life to bringing the best possible library service to her community, leaned forward.

"You know, library usage will be up 20 percent by the end of this year. We are growing stronger all the time, and we've done it by providing great public service. If we are to continue this growth—and we will—we will have to continue to give the public not just what it wants, but what it needs. We are in a great position now to do that."

With her interest in early childhood development, library planning, serving the public and, always, OU sports, Morris is ready to move into the future with the same excitement she's always brought to her family, her life and her job. And for her, the best is always just around the corner. **Doug Bentin, PR**

News from the Construction Guy: Todd Olberding

New Choctaw Library While we have had some rain, the majority of the earthwork below the building has been completed. The last of the perimeter foundation footings were placed on Nov. 19. The next major step is to complete the underground mechanical and electrical work, which is underway and also requires dry weather. This work should be completed in mid December, and will be followed by the placement of the concrete slab.

While the "project schedule" still indicates substantial completion as of August 30, 2003, the contractor has reserved its right for additional time due to the recent rain delays. At present, the contract has not requested that this time be officially added. This is part of the "normal" construction process and is being left open until all weather issues can be addressed.

Downtown Library

While there is still no word on the panels, there is a great deal of time and effort being expended on all sides to reconcile this issue.

The interior wall construction is close to 80 percent complete. The building is 99 percent watertight and some temporary heat has been turned on. This has allowed painting to begin this past month.

A Request for Proposal (RFP) for the purchase of the telephone and data cabling work has been issued. This work is scheduled to be awarded at the December 12 MLS Commission meeting.


Kitties Need a Good Home
