# New Choctaw Library: Grows from Solid Foundation

From the destruction left in the wake of the May 3, 1999, tornado, the new Choctaw Library took another step toward completion on March 12, this one in concrete.

That's when the floor slab, the final component of the foundation for the new structure, was placed. Activity began at 8:00 a.m.

The new state-of-the-art facility is located three blocks west of city hall at 2525 Muzzy, and Choctaw's population of 10,000 awaits its opening eagerly.

Presently, the Choctaw Library operates a space leased in the Choctaw Plaza shopping center at 14385 N.E. 23rd. It was relocated there after the tornado damaged the Tri-City Youth & Family Center building that housed the library.

The new 9,000-square-foot library will be constructed of brick with a standing seam metal roof with matching trim. The building will include a multi-purpose room for programming and classes, 40-50 reader seats and tables, an outdoor concrete deck that includes a programming area and a magazine/ reading room.

The new Choctaw Library will house 45,000-50,000 items - including books, magazines, CDs and videos.

# Ralph Ellison Library In the News

The Oklahoma City Herald newspaper ran a story about the Ralph Ellison Library on March 7.

Following are excerpts from the story: Ralph Ellison Library is the libray that nearly did not exist.

In the early 1970's the City Council of Oklahoma City did not think they had the funds to build a library in northeast Oklahoma City.

This predominantly black part of the city had earlier had a small library with one black librarian for many years on NE 4th Street, which had been torn down via the Capitol Improvement and Urban Renewal projects of the late sixties and early seventies.

When it was apparent to the Northeast community (also called the Eastside) that there was not going to be another library in the Northeast part of town, the community leaders began to rally a campaign to fight for a new library.

Dr. A. L. Dowell, city councilman for that community, along with his wife, Dr. Vivian T. Dowell, and other community leaders and activists put together a plan for a library.

(The City repeatedly rejected Dr. Dowell's plans due to a lack of funds and the perception that Northeast Oklahoma City didn't need the facility.)

...Finally, after a long struggle, the city council approved the library being built

on the proposed site.

Theodosia Crawford, a prominent civil rights activist and commercial realtor, Jimmy Stewart, the Rev. Goree James and then-State Rep. Hannah Atkins (a former Douglass classmante of Ellison) came up with the name Ralph Ellison for the library instead of naming the library after the community.

Ralph Ellison was raised in Oklahoma City and later became a world-renowned author, essayist and jazz musician. His most acclaimed work was the landmark novel, *Invisible Man*. By far he is the most famous person to come out of the Northeast community.

#### Ralph Ellison Library Today

The Library is an excellent facility with thousands of books and other resources including two meetings room facilities.

One large meeting room has kitchen facilities and holds 75 to 90 people and a smaller meeting room holds 25 to 40 people.

There are exciting events every month at Ralph Ellison Library and you may check the listings of events every week in the *Oklahoma City Herald*.

The Ralph Ellison Library invites everyonein our community to come and visit the library.

Our community leaders worked long and hard to get this library built in our community for all of you.
