Meet Ralph Ellison Library Manager, Daphene Keys

Daphene Keys did not take the direct route to librarianship. Instead she waited until the time was right to apply for and accept the job she wanted.

"When I was in library school, I knew then I wanted to work in a public library in an urban setting," said Keys.

"So when this job came open, I thought – this is it. You can't get more urban than -"This,-" she said with a chuckle.

'This' is the Ralph Ellison Library, and Keys became the manager of the library on March 17.

"I was just ready for a change," Keys said.

The move came after working at Langston University for 12 years until March of this year. Steadily moving up from personnel assistant to assistant

director of Human Resources and finally executive assistant to the president, Dr. Ernest L. Holloway.

Keys graduated from University of Oklahoma Library School of Information Studies. Keys also has a bachelor of finance degree from University of North Texas in Denton.

What was the reason for the detour from finance to library studies? "Two reasons – my husband, Ronald Keys, is a librarian at Oklahoma State Continued on page 2

University, and he encouraged me to check out library school when I was thinking about going to graduate school. And Erwin Totten, a friend, is a librarian at University of North Texas – he also encouraged me to go to library school," Keys said. "So, I tried it and stayed with it!"

Keys said she is inundated with training and learning the ropes of her new job.

"Just getting to know the vendors (including the Coke man and the Pepsi man) servicing the library and introducing herself to them was a small but timeconsuming task.

Definitely trying to cover all the bases, Keys is working hard to fulfill the role of Library Manager. While Ralph Ellison Library has continued to operate Monday through Saturday, the library has been without a permanent manager for about a year. Keys said her first priority is to create a measure of stability for staff and the library.

Keys' life outside work comes with a husband and two girls, Jessica, nine, and Hypatia, six.

The girls are delighted with their mom's new job. "They say 'Mommy can you bring me this book home?" Keys says she has become their personal librarian!

When asked if she had a favorite author, Keys laughs and said, "I was telling the staff, thinking now that I'm here in a library (she would have a chance to read) – I haven't had time to read any-

thing except this," and points to a stack of work related papers. She does have a favorite author, Alice Walker, and favorite book, *The Color Purple*.

Another goal of Keys is to go out and meet the community surrounding her library.

"This library, particularly in this community, is more of a cultural center. With the programs we have this is like the center of the community. Looking at our programs and the different events held here, it really reminds me of a community center, and the library is a focal point. I think that's really good, and it will help with future program plans."

A big event coming up is Juneteenth on June 14. Martin Luther King Boulevard, runs alongside the library, will be blocked from N. E. 23rd Street down to N.E. 22nd Street.

"We'll have a moonwalk, barbecue, food vendors, activities for the children, a clown to entertain, bands and local community talent to perform." Juneteenth celebrates the end of the slavery and is a big celebration in Keys' home state of Texas.

In accepting the manager position at Ralph Ellison Library, Keys intends to narrow the information divide. "Our customers must have access to accurate and timely information. My vision for Ralph Ellison is for this library to not only serve the information needs of the community but also serve as a cultural center for the Northeast quadrant."



Updated Meeting Room Booking System

On July 1, a new meeting room reservation software will be in place, instead of the old MR Win 6530.

The new program is more streamlined, sidestepping the need for a lot of instruction.

Tracy Stone, DN librarian, said, "You do have more choices to make," i.e. more room for error on the part of the user.

"It's Windows based," said Deb Robertus, "with drop down menus for the name of each library, program types, and meeting room set up."

Deb also said staff will be able to see each library schedule - "Easier than you could before."

And there will be a diagram of every meeting room in every library including the new Downtown/Library Learning Center. So staff can see which meeting room in the system will best accommodate customers' needs.

"The money will go directly into the day's deposit. You don't have to change screens to put the money in," said Debbie.

And there will be extra space for contact information including customer's

FAX, cell, work, and home phone numbers.

You'll also be able to tell which staff member entered the information and, if updated, who updated it.


"Thanks to Jim Welch who created the new software. This will make our lives easier." said Deb.

"There will be some training," said Judy Walden, "but we don't anticipate the need for a lot of instruction."

"Current plans are to have an Open House at The Downtown Library training room, where staff can come, try out the new system, etc.," she said.

"There will be a tutor on site for any questions and printed instructions. We want to provide training for all levels of need."
