Plans are being developed for the grand opening of MLS' newest branch, the Choctaw Library.

MLS Director of Construction Management, Todd Olberding, said the new facility is quickly nearing completion.

A grand opening celebration is scheduled for February 9-14.

The week-long event will feature a ribbon cutting, reception and numerous events for the community.

The new library, located at 2525 North Muzzy, will replace the current facility, located in the Choctaw Plaza Shopping Mall.

MLS officials moved the facility to the mall following the May 3, 1999 tornado which destroyed the old library building.

Pension Board Meets, Examines Assetts, Costs To System

The Library Retirement Pension Board met Thursday, October 30, 2003, at 3:30 p.m. at Belle Isle Library.

Penny McCaleb, chair, introduced **Andrew Junkin**, inancial consultant, Asset Services Company. Mr. Junkin presented the Quarterly Review of Investments for the third quarter of 2003. The pension fund is \$13,627,420. This is an increase of 1.77%. Mr. Junkin stated that even though the Stock Market is improving there is slower growth for quality stocks and bonds.

Mrs. McCaleb introduced Ken Culver, president, FBD Consulting, Inc. Mr. Culver presented the Actuarial Report: Annual Valuation as of July 1, 2003. The plan asset on July 1, 2003, was \$13,581,885. This provides a benefit security ratio of 108%. The report also gives the contribution requirements. When the Employer contribution is made on February 1, 2004, the amount will be \$1,430,683. The estimated employee contributions for the 2003 year are assumed to be \$198,263.

Mrs. McCaleb entertained a motion that the Metropolitan Library System's contribution to the pension fund for FY 2003-04 shall be \$1,430,683 payable by February 1, 2004. Motion passed.

The Finance Committee met August 20, 2003, at 3:30 p.m. at the Belle Isle Library, and at that meeting **Nancy Anthony**, member, Metropolitan Library Commission, requested the Library Retirement Pension Board review options for changing the defined benefit plan to a 401K-type retirement plan. Pension Board Agenda Item VI – Discussion: defined benefit retirement plan was not discussed but will be on the next Pension Board meeting agenda.

The meeting will, tentatively, be the first week of February 2004.


