

Enrollment Numbers Keep Climbing for Summer at the Library

Build it right and they will keep on coming

Summer at the Library 2005 may end up being one of the most successful MLS summertime programs in years.

Enrollment numbers are up, and so are the numbers of young customers who have completed the first level — a statistic that means not only are more kids entering the program, but more of them are also reading.

"The number of Level I finishers looks to be a little more than double what it was the same time last year," said LaVetta Dent, MLS Children's Services coordinator.

And, according to Dent, the choice of either a medal or a medallion remains the favorite prize among most participants.

"Children were finishing faster to get their pick of which they wanted — a medal or medallion," she noted. "Since there is a limited supply of the medal with ribbon, those wanting that one are particularly anxious to get their reading done and their choice made."

As of June 17, 8,921 children had signed up in the Children's Book Program, and 1,352 had completed Level I, according to Dent.

Young Adult Services Coordinator Heidi Daniel-Morgan told Shelflife that as of June 17, 2,168 teens had entered the LOL:) program — compared to 1,988 teens as of June 25, 2004.

"That's a 10 percent increase," noted Daniel-Morgan, "and last year's figure includes almost an additional eight days of sign up!"

Daniel-Morgan notes that as of June 17, both the **Ronald J. Norick Downtown Library** and **Warr Acres Library** had both surpassed their totals for the entire 2004 summer. Four days later, **Choctaw Library** did the same.

And, several libraries were very close, including **Luther** (three teens away), **Belle Isle** and **Edmond** (10 teens away), and **Ralph Ellison** (very, very close).

Daniel-Morgan was overheard to say: "I've said it before, but in the immortal words of Jon Bon Jovi (or some hair band singer from the 80s), you guys rock!" (Morgan was last seen playing air guitar she was so pleased.)

Meanwhile, thousands of children have attended another Summer at the Library tradition: Neighborhood Arts.

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"Attendance was 1,962 for one of our 17 shows during the first week of Neighborhood Arts," LaVetta said, "and 2,468 children attended during Week II. For the first 14 shows of this week, we have had 1,889 children in attendance."

But numbers never tell the whole story. That's just raw data. To find out what customers really think about Summer at the Library programming, you have to ask them.

"From the evaluation forms the librarians are sending in about the performances," LaVetta said, "we have received several kinds of comments: A parent at **Belle Isle** wrote, 'Boy this really brings kids to the library.'

"**Downtown Library** reported that 50 kids came to the children's reference desk and asked about the book *The Reluctant Dragon* after Lucky Penny Players performed a play based on the story.

"Also, a couple of libraries reported that some families show up early to see the actors before the show or stay late after the show to get autographs of their favorite performers," she noted.

All in all, Summer at the Library appears to be on the right track. Just what the ending for 2005 will be remains to be seen, but if this snapshot is any indication, it promises to be a happy one.

Library to Add 12 Wi-Fi Hotspots

On August 15 at 9 a.m., MLS will introduce free filtered wireless Internet access at 12 libraries — the five full-service libraries in Oklahoma City as well as those in Bethany, Choctaw, Del City, Edmond, Midwest City, The Village and Warr Acres.



With the new service, customers will be able to bring a laptop or a personal digital assistant, such as a Palm Pilot or Blackberry, into these libraries and not only access the Internet but also the many subscription databases maintained online by the library, according to Jim Welch, MLS deputy executive director/technology.

The only catch? Their equipment will need to have the appropriate wireless networking card, adds Anne Fischer, MLS director of Information Technology. Wireless access will not extend to MLS's five extension libraries at this time, he notes, because the extensions either lack the volume of computer users necessary to warrant the investment or they have a physical limitation that precludes incorporating the service at

this time.



But Welch sees the new service as improving not only the wireless profile of Oklahoma County — but also of MLS. More details, including an explanatory brochure, to come.

Although, like "Marian," I'm tired of the poor etiquette I see in my library, I'm equally tired of the public image of librarians as cranky, uptight and "shushing." As a librarian, my job is to help and educate patrons. "Marian's" letter made it seem as if librarians are the behavior police.
