Five Info Sessions on Pension Changes Set

A series of five educational sessions about the new **Defined Contribution Pension** Plan have been planned for the month of August to allow staff members to learn and ask questions about the Plan.

The new Plan goes into effect August 29. The first paycheck to be affected will be the one dated September 15.

"Mark Thompson, representing Mass Mutual, will be here for all five meetings," said MLS Deputy Executive Director Lloyd Lovely. "He will talk to staff about investment options and then be available to answer questions after each session on a one-on-one basis.

"Staff will not be required to make any decisions at the sessions. Everyone will be given time to decide what they want to do."

Wi-Fi Without Tears: New Service Designed to Function Sans Staff

Remember when computers began to creep onto our desks? Not long after that, they found their way to the public floor and MLS began offering free Internet access to our customers.

Now MLS is about to take the next logical step in the evolution of computer-based services for our customers. It's wireless fidelity, or Wi-Fi. It allows computers to connect to the Internet without the use of wires.

MLS Deputy Executive Director Jimmy Welch wants to

ease any staff concerns before they take hold. "The MLS wireless service," he said, "will allow us to provide Internet service to more customers with minimal staff involvement. Wireless access service is designed to be simple and hassle-free for our customers."

And there's one other point Jimmy wants to stress: "Staff members will not be configuring customer computers."

In fact, to avoid any possible liability, he says, staff shouldn't even touch a customer's computer.

Currently, MLS Information Technology and Marketing & Communications departments are developing a brochure for customers that will explain the service.

Wi-Fi service will begin August 15 at 9 a.m. at MLS's 12 full-service libraries. The service is being offered at all MLS libraries that are in a position at this time to offer it.

MLS has invested about \$60,000 to get the wireless hotspots up and running, and Jimmy says the investment

will save the System money in the long run. "For one thing," he noted, "it will mean we can support many more computer users in our libraries without having to purchase more computers."

Nearly all libraries in the United States offer free public Internet access, according to a study released recently by the American Library Association, but only 18 percent presently offer wireless access. "We're pleased to be among the front runners in bringing this new technology to the public," said Welch.

Teen Summer Read Numbers Have MLS Staff Laughing Out Loud :)

As of July 19, 2005, MLS staff had signed up 3,015 teens for the program — even better a third of them (1,106 teens in all) had completed Level I. That's a record completion rate of 36.6 percent, and it means that not only are more teens than ever before entered in the program, but a higher percentage of them have also stayed the course through Level I.

They're not just signing up for the prizes—they're reading!

"Woo hoo!" said **Heidi Daniel-Morgan,** MLS young adult service coordinator, demurely. "We have finally reached the goal we set way back in the very beginning of the program in 2002 Extreme Summer / Extreme Reads!" Let James Russell Lowell express our congratulations to Heidi and every member of the MLS staff whose hard work made this possible:

A Library Within a Library— For Staff Eyes Only

When was the last time you checked out a library book?

Okay, when was the last time you checked out a library book from one of MLS's professional collections? These are the books purchased for staff use only, and they are not part of the regular circulating collection.

We chatted recently with **Stacy Schrank**, employee development coordinator in the Planning Office, about Planning's Lending Library. "It serves as a resource for staff," Stacy said, "in meeting various training and/or development needs. It supplements the face-toface training MLS offers its staff."

The Planning Lending Library includes some 360 items—books, cassettes, videos, manuals, statistics, and web design resources among other things that don't duplicate material already available in the circulating collection. The items can be checked out for a two-week period, but extended loans are easily arranged. Typically, 10 to 15 items are checked out at any one time. Just check with Stacy.

"We have a valuable assortment of material for any MLS staff member who would like to further his or her career with the library system. Say you want to move up to a management position, or you just need books that will assist in training in a particular area. We have books that will guide you along."

Finding out what the library contains couldn't be easier. Just go to the MLS Intranet page. Click on "Resources." On the right of the screen, under the heading "Professional Collection," you'll see it clearly—"Planning Lending Library."

Coretta Scott King Awards MLS's Denyvetta Davis to Jury (Again)

It's always an honor to be asked to serve on a committee or jury — but it may be a greater honor to be asked back.

That's an honor **Denyvetta Davis,** MLS director of Branch Services, recently experienced, when she was named to the jury that selects the winner of the Coretta Scott King Award for the second time.

"The CSK committee was one of my first ALA committee appointments 18 years ago," Denyvetta said, "and one with which I continue to participate. I started by attending meetings as an observer, getting to know the members, and participating in activities. I have thoroughly enjoyed it.

"The award celebrated 30 years recently, and I served on the planning committee. The committee sponsors a breakfast during the annual conference each year that attracts 600 to 800 attendees."

The award, named for the widow of the late civil rights leader Martin Luther King, Jr., who was a community activist in her own right, was conceived in the late 1960s and given for the first time in 1970. It is now awarded annually to African-American authors and illustrators who have made an outstanding contribution to literature for children and young adults. In 1982, the CSK Award became officially associated with the American Library Association.

"Several years ago," Denyvetta added, "I introduced two Oklahoma CSK book award winners. I have met numerous authors and illustrators and have autographs from most of them including: Leo & Diane Dillion, the late Virginia Hamilton (she was my favorite), Rudy & Ossie Davis, Walter Dean Myers, Ashley Bryant, the Pinkneys (father and son), the late Tom Feelings, the McKissacks, and many more."

The jury deliberates during the midwinter session, and

the winners and honor books are announced with the Newbery & Caldecott winners.

The assignment is a natural one for Davis, who is an author in her own right. In 2003, Denyvetta co-authored, with Oklahoma City attorney Bob Burke, *Ralph Ellison: A Biography.*
