How Do They Do That?

Do you ever wonder how your fellow MLS employees go about performing their magic? Most of us take what we do in our own department for granted — rarely giving a thought to the humdrum elements of our jobs. Yet people in other departments often have nary a clue as to how we do what we do.

With that in mind, we visited recently with **Susan Ryan** of Materials Selection about how she finds and vets new databases to purchase.

"I find out about new databases from reading reviews in the library literature," she said. "I also get suggestions from staff and customers and from contact with sales representatives notifying me of new databases.

"I send out trials to various databases to library employees all year long. The librarians demo the databases and are very helpful in letting me know which databases are needed, which ones are superior, and which ones aren't so great. I also make visits to each library twice a year to determine needs of the collection."

Three new databases have recently been added to the MLS catalog.

"The Auto Repair Reference Center database was a pretty easy decision," Susan said. "It received good reviews, the librarians responded favorably to the trial, and it was available remotely for customers to use from home.

"Most libraries just don't have the space to house large collections of auto repair manuals anymore. This is a way for all the libraries and our customers to have access to automobile repair information."

The second new database is African American History and Culture. "It's a great tool for students and general readers to explore all aspects of the African American experience from past to present," Susan observed.

And finally, there's Issues and Controversies, which Susan sees as "a wonderful resource for students looking for information for school reports on all sorts of topics. These articles provide pros and cons for each subject. The database even includes the annual national high school debate topic."

"One of the valuable features of all three databases is their availability to be utilized outside of the library. Instead of students surfing the web and finding potentially dubious information, they now have access to information provided by reputable publishers 24/7. "The library system is very excited to provide reliable online information to our customers day and night," Susan emphasized.

Commission Recommends Special Collection

In response to customers' comments regarding access to specific children's books, the Metropolitan Library Commission approved in a vote to provide a "special section... about controversial topics" in the children's area at the August 25 Commission meeting. Although the MLS administration is disappointed, Executive **Director Donna Morris** expressed that we will follow Commission directives and policies.

After several rewordings, Commission member Scott Duncan moved that:

"a special section be created within the children's area of all Oklahoma County libraries. This section is to be labeled "parenting collection" or other more appropriate title as determined by staff and will only apply to easy readers, readers, and tweens. It will contain books that provide a resource for families in teaching their children about controversial topics based on guidelines as established by the administration and staff in conjunction with an ad hoc committee. Subjects where good judgment would indicate that Oklahoma County community standards are not served by the material would dictate inclusion in this section. The decision as to which books would be placed in this category would be made by the selection staff, recalling that it is now and always has been their decision as to which books are selected for our libraries and which are not."

Commissioner Hugh Rice will set up a five member ad-hoc committee comprised of both members who voted for and against the motion. The motion passed by a 10 to 7 vote.

Numbers are in for 2005 Summer at the Library

As much fun as MLS's annual Summer at the Library can be, we all breathe a sigh of relief when it's over. This year, MLS staffers can give themselves a pat on the back, because 2005 saw an increase in signups for both the Children's and Teens' programs.

Sign-ups for Kids were up 596 over the figures for 2004. This year saw 12,808 children enter the "Dragons, Dreams, and Daring Deeds" program, and 5,459 readers stayed with us all the way to completion. In fact, the number of finishers was up at nine of our 17 libraries: CT, DN, MC, RE, SO, VI, WA, NP, and WR.

In only its fourth year, the Teen program set new records with 3,245 sign-ups—up 522 from last year—and 1,451 finishers. (The latter is up 535 from last year.) Everyone who worked with teens this summer, take a bow. The libraries that recorded an increase in teen finishers: BE, CH, CT, DC, DN, ED, MC, RE, SO, VI, WA, LU, NP, and WR.

It's nice to know that when we build the right programs, they will come.

A CyberMARS quicktip Did You Know?

When you search for a specific title in CyberMARS you will see, on the left next to the title, an icon to let you know if that entry is for a printed book, a video cassette or DVD, or a compact disc or audio tape.

But did you know that you can tell at a glance whether or not the book is available in large print? You can. Just look to see if there is punctuation after the title. Or in the case of large print books-no punctuation.

Try this out. Search "Grisham, John" and you'll get more

than 80 hits. Click on his name, and you get the list of titles in the System. The book *Bleachers* heads the list. Notice that the first entry for *Bleachers* has no form of punctuation after the title. This means that edition is large print. Note further down the list the same title with another book icon to the left, but after the title there is a period. This means that edition is standard print size.

No punctuation equals large print. Just a little something to speed up customer service.





A few days ago, Shelflife learned Tristan Hyams, son

of **Linda Hyams** (HUM), is currently on a six-month deployment with the USS Klakring as part of Standing NATO Response Force Maritime Group 2. His expected return date: sometime in December or early January.

"Eight countries permanently contribute sailors and ships to the Standing NATO Response Force Maritime Group 2," Linda told Shelflife, "and they are tasked with carrying out Operation Active Endeavor. Those countries are Germany, Greece, Italy, the Netherlands, Spain, Turkey, the United Kingdom, and the United States. Four other nations — Russia, Israel, Algeria, and Ukraine — will be joining NATO efforts in the next 18

> months to fight terrorism on the Mediterranean Sea."

This group of nations began policing the seas a little more than three years ago. In that time, more than 65,000 vessels have been hailed and questioned, and 92 merchant ships have been boarded. Sail-

ors stopped a ship that was hauling 680 tons of the highly explosive ammonia nitrate (an ingredient in the bomb that leveled the Alfred P. Murrah Building in Oklahoma City in April 1995) and another with 22 kilos of heroine.

The MLS embroidered blue polo shirt features two areas of embroidery — the logo over the heart and "Metropolitan Library System" on the sleeve — so if you provided the shirt, the cost would be \$10 plus tax.

IPGI is located at N.W. 27th and N. May in Oklahoma City; hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays. It accepts cash, check or credit card.

And if you still have your heart set on that MLS blue pique golf shirt — Jackson says the style number is K420.

One caveat: you must show your library identification card when you place your order for the MLS logo.
