

# **Legislative Report**

Donna Morris, MLS Executive Director, is very businesslike when she discusses Oklahoma House Bill 2158, written by Representative Sally Kern, and Senate Bill 1777 written by Kern and Senator Cliff Aldridge.

Both bills are essentially the same. They both demand that "The Oklahoma Department of Libraries Board shall not grant or distribute any state funds that are allocated to libraries . . unless the library has taken action to place all children [sic] and young adult books and materials that are homosexually themed or sexually explicit in an adult or special area in the library and the library has a policy in place to limit distribution of such books and materials to adults only."

Both bills declare a state of emergency to exist in Oklahoma "by reason whereof this act shall take effect and be in full force .... " The Senate version adds that "This act shall become effective November 1, 2006."

"We don't know why for sure, but Representative Kern's bill was laid over by the subcommittee that was reviewing it at the hearing on February 15. That means that it was not considered and thev chose to take no action on it. It wasn't on the agenda for this week, either.

"I know the Oklahoma Library Association Legislative Committee has developed talking points for Kern's bill and

has asked voters to discuss this with their legislators. Senate staffers asked ODL for fiscal information related to the bill, but that's standard operating procedure on

things like this. It doesn't mean one way or the other whether or not the senate is considering passage."

Executive Director Donna Morris

Susan McVey, of the Oklahoma Department of Libraries, informs us that Senate Bill 1777 did not meet the deadline for passage by committee. "As a result, the bill is not considered to be an active bill. Deadlines in the House of Representatives are different from those in the Senate so bills in the House are still being heard in committees."

Donna has promised to keep us all up to date on the bill's journey through the legislature.

Tammy Wood is director of outpatient operations for Valir and she said that the new facility has four exam rooms, a lab, digital X-ray, and on-site physical therapy. "And yes," Kelley added, "it's

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included in our PPO Benefits Plan. Just take your card with you when you go. If you don't have your card with you, just have the doctor's office call Human Resources and we can tell them what they need to know over the phone."

## MLS's Cataloging Unique Among Public Libraries

Did you know?

•When a title leaves Cataloging, it has a record in the catalog, with author, title, and subject access,

with holdings, and barcode labels printed. This is equivalent to having typed and filed all the cards in a card catalog.

•The average turnaround time for cataloging materials with system reserves waiting is 24 hours; the average turnaround time for cataloging other materials is 48-72 hours; for many libraries, the average turnaround time is measured in weeks or even months.

•MLS catalogers know MLS customers, and make sure to assign Dewey numbers so that materials are shelved where customers look for them. •MLS assigns a unique call (shelf) number to every nonfiction title; most public libraries don't bother with unique call numbers.

•21,000 new records were added to the MLS catalog in FY 04-05.

•Every time an additional copy of a title is added to the MLS collections, a Cataloging Technician reviews the record; records in most library catalogs are never reviewed.

•Most libraries purchase barcode labels, while Cataloging prints them in-house;

•Over 114,000 barcode labels were printed between July 1, 2005 and January 31, 2006.

•MLS is a depository for state and federal government documents; depository government documents are cataloged and shelved with other library materials while in most libraries, government documents are a separate department with its own shelving, and users must go to that area to use documents.

•Materials Services Division Technicians in Cataloging reprocess all materials transferred between agencies; about 15,000 items were transferred in fiscal year 2004-2005.

•Every new record added to the MLS catalog is evaluated and enhanced by a Cataloger before it is added; many libraries download records from other sources into their catalogs without any evaluation nor enhancement.

•MLS's Cataloging department is considered a leader in cataloging in Oklahoma.

### MLS to Unveil New Computer Services . . . SOON

Does signing up computer time for the public computers at your library give you a headache? Do you feel a constant battle with customers over who gets first dibs? Well, that's about to end soon. At the Feb. 15 Managers' Meeting, Jimmy Welch, MLS Deputy Executive Director/ Technology, and Anne Fischer, Director of Information Technology, introduced new additions to our multi-use and reference computer service.

The concept is to make it easier for the customers – and the staff. Currently different agencies have different ways to sign up for the public computers. When the new system is installed, we'll all operate the same!

It begins by having customers sign in to use a computer on a main pc. Once signed in, they will receive a printed receipt that has their reservation code. When a computer is ready, a main display monitor will display their reservation code and the computer that is available. If there are computers available when they sign in, they will be assigned a computer immediately. The display unit will also show where they are on the waiting list as well as how much time is remaining on the computers that are in

PC Librarian is software that will be installed on the reference computers. It will allow staff

to see how many customers are waiting, take a unit out of service if it is not working and in the case of a problem, move a customer up on the waiting list. PC Helper is software used by the IT staff to take a unit out of service if it has not been done by the staff and they've called in a service call. IT can also

set a unit to be out of service when the customer currently using it is finished if there is repair work that needs to be completed on the unit."

The new system won't be available for a few months, but just think how great it is going to be when it is! MLS IT is awesome. Period.



### Overcrowded and Outta Space...

DN Library staff breathed freely for the first time in years when they moved into their new build-

ing, but other MLS staff feel constricted and look forward to a time when they, too, gain some elbow room.

An already crowded facility is CH, where Tech Processing and Cataloging share quarters with a busy library.

The concept of an MLS Service Center has been kicking around for a number of years.

The center would house Tech Processing, Cataloging, Maintenance, Books by Mail, the

Outreach Book Centers collection, and the Friends of the Library sorting site. Currently, all those functions and departments share 22,000 square feet at CH and the Maintenance

Center. Plans are to build a Service Center of 39,000 sq. ft.

"We explored eight solutions to the space problem," said Todd Olberding, Director of Construction Management. "We thought about expanding the current Maintenance Center, of buying the property that abuts it and putting up a new building, of adding on to CH, lots of things.

"We finally decided that the most cost-effective plan would be either to buy a used building and renovate it to suit our needs, or to buy raw property and build our own building."

An expansion of the current Maintenance Building isn't feasible, Administration began scouting around for another location. A variety of factors were considered and the area around 36th and Santa Fe seemed to be MLS' centroid. "Making a used building

work for us,"Todd explained,

"involves issues that could result in a lot of lost cost. For instance, with most improvements, you get something in return for the money you spend. But if you have to first do something before you can begin the improvement, you get nothing back for that expenditure. We have to look at so many things—cost, location, impact on the entire system."

This information will go before the Long Range Planning Committee of the Library Commission on March 7. We'll let you know how things progress.


