who make up the Acquisitions Dept. for the Pioneer Library System, and they were here to find out how MLS does what they do.

"Their Acquisitions is a combination of Cataloging, Tech Processing, Materials Selection, and Interlibrary Loan," Janet told us.

They were fascinated in our way of doing things, and impressed by our staff.

The idea that the Pioneer gang could visit with the MLSers came about after Caroline Dulworth, from Pioneer, toured here in the past. She took a look at our

operations and buildings and decided that bringing a group of her techs to The Big City might prove beneficial.

"We divided them up into groups and sent a different one off every 15 minutes. We pretty much stuck with the nuts and bolts of the job—we talked about vendors, standing orders, and only briefly went into the ins and outs of selection.

"They were particularly impressed with the compact shelving at DN Library since they have real storage issues back in Norman." Another MLS area that was of interest to the Pioneers was our reserve system. One of their routines is to buy selected

> titles for limited checkout in addition to regular circulation. These copies are located on the new book shelf and cannot be used to fill reserves. They are on the shelf to be checked out on a first come-first served basis.

### Hardhats Required An Update on MLS Construction Projects

A couple of months ago Shelflife chatted with the MLS Director of Construction Management, **Todd Olberding**, about the status of some of our major construction projects. We went back to Todd to see what's changed since that first conversation.

"Everything keeps moving along, sometimes faster and

sometimes slower. In relation to the new **Service Center**, the current plan is based upon the construction of a new building to house **Maintenance**, **Technical Processing**, **Cataloging**, **the Friends** and several **Outreach** operations,"Todd told us. "The process of securing a building site, the first step, began in March. We'll be making a presentation to the Finance Committee of the Library Commission on May 31. If all goes well then, we'll take the report to the full Commission at the June meeting. We hope to be able to close on the purchase of the property located on *NE 50th Street, between Lincoln & Santa Fe*, by the end of June"

Todd suggested that from that point, we would hire an architect and that the design process would take 60-90 days.

Progress is a little slower on the new **Northwest Library** project as we're still

The Guild raised money to buy a plot of land for construction of a new facility, and they were busy through every step of the planning and building processes.

crete table and bench set on the north patio on our western side," Rosemary told us, "and they purchased and planted a willow tree last winter. It survived the winter and is greening out and looks quite well."

But even more significantly, they created a scholarship for people interested in going to graduate library school.

"Two employees from the system have looked into applying for it for the 2006 year," Rosemary added.

Quilt making was a talent Guild members employed as a means of fundraising during the days the new library was still a dream. They are once again working on a quilt, with the assistance of members of the community, that will be raffled or auctioned off when completed.

"I really appreciate all they do for the Choctaw Library," Rosemary concluded.

in search of the perfect location for a new facility. We're working in collaboration with Francis Tuttle Vo-Tech and Oklahoma City to review prospective sites. Todd is hoping we can have a site selected in 90-120 days.

Finally, improvements to the **Ralph Ellison** Library constitute the first project that is covered by the 2000 bond issue vote. "We have some recommendations to take to the Finance Committee on this one, too," Todd said, "and with their approval we'll then go to the full Library Commission. After that, MLS in conjunction with OKC will start the architect selection process.

Proposed improvements to Ralph Ellison include enlarging the meeting room, renovation of the library space, upgrade of the restrooms and expanding the parking lot.
