It's a lot of work, and if you're feeling particularly worn out by it this summer, there's a good reason for that. Enrollments in both parts of the program are unusually high for this early int he program.

"Yes, sign-ups do seem to be up," said Children's Services Coordinator **Kristin Smith**, "but I think it has a lot more to do with our great librarians and marketing department than (Young Adult Services Coordinator) **Emily (Williams)** and me!"

After only two weeks of Summer at the Library, enrollment for the children's program is 9,433, which is 74 percent of the total number of kids participating in 2005. Enrollment for teens is currently 2,090, which is 76 percent of last year's total. Those

numbers put 2006 on track to shatter old records. "Many libraries," Kristin continued, "are already very close to their totals from last year!"

No wonder we're all looking forward to August so we can take a deep breath and relax a little.

Loyalty Oath

According to state law, all library employees will be required to sign a loyalty oath.

MLS Deputy Executive Director **Lloyd Lovely** tells ShelfLife that "No public institution under Oklahoma state law may pay any person who has not signed the loyalty oath. This law is not new, but the Library has only recently determined that it is required to comply with this law. The Library is neither promoting nor discounting the law, only abiding by it."

Human Resources will be collecting oaths as they are signed by current employees, hoping to have everyone's oath by the end of 2006. The signed document will then be maintained as part of the personnel files.

The signatures have to be notarized, so Lloyd and a notary will be visiting each library twice during the next few months. "The Library's official position," Lloyd added, "is to follow this law, and all laws, to the best of its ability."

This is the oath to which new MLS employees will attest:

LOYALTY OATH (51 O.S. §36.2A)

I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support the Constitution and the laws of the United States of America and the Constitution and the laws of the State of Oklahoma, and that I will faithfully discharge, according to the best of my ability, the duties of my office or employment during such time as I am an Employee of the Metropolitan Library System, 300 Park Ave, Oklahoma City, OK 73102 in accordance with 51 O.S. § 36.2.
