The mate is a mighty trainin' man, The speakers smart and hip. The Metro crew sets sail this day For a multi-session trip. (A multi-session trip.)


The keynote address will start us right With words that make us think— If not for growth, that steers the course, The FOCUS! Ship would sink. (The FOCUS! Ship would sink.)

Another Smash Hit... Summer at the Library

Summer at the Library continues to be MLS' big moment each year. If we were the Statue of Liberty, Summer at the Library would be the torch we held aloft.

And every summer, the torch glows brighter. In 2005, 12,808 kids signed up for the program.

In 2006, a record number 14,392 came on board. And what's even better is that MLS saw a 39 percent increase in "finishers" —those who completed Goal 1.

> "The numbers for the teen program are still

strong," said Young Adult Services Coordinator Emily Williams. "BI, CH, CT, DC, ED, SO, WA, HR, and JN all had increases in teen sign-up from last year, and system-wide we

had 3,072 teens join us." Better yet, nearly half of them—1,393—completed Goal 1.
