Social networking websites, like MySpace and Facebook. can be used by libraries to get publicity about their programs, especially for young people, to the widest potential audience. John Hilbert, at SO. uses it to publish the Southern Oaks Teen Advisory's zine "Aargh!"



A recent NewsOK.com story (http://newsok.com/ar-ticle/3021199) talked about a woman in Edmond who has a MySpace site. Her space is illustrated with photos and she invites friends to leave comments. The stuff she put on her site is harmless, but the friends sometimes leave responses laced with profanity.

Nobody else's business? Hey, it's a public site so it's every-body else's business. Parents. In-laws. Employers. Prospective employers. If you want to know how the rest of the world sees you, Google your name and take a look at what shows up. Remember those party pics you posted because you wanted absent friends

to see them? Well, they can see them—but so can your co-workers, your boss, your minister, your kids, your kids' teachers, and that creepy guy who lives across the street; the one who stares at you whenever you go outside in your cutoffs.

We think of sites like MySpace

and Facebook as locations for social networking, and they are—but they're not private and we should remember that.

And also keep in mind that, according to a news story from NBC, (http://www.nbc10.com/news-links/9332483/detail.html?taf=phi) "A recent survey of job recruit-

ers found 77 percent of them uncovered information about job candidates using the Web, and 35 percent eliminated a candidate based on that information."

A guy they interviewed who represents companies that check out prospective employees on the net said, "If it's something you would have trouble sharing with your mom or putting on the front page of the Miami Herald, then I wouldn't put it on a Web site."

Debbies Idea.com

Want to know what book to start with from a certain author?

Debbiesidea.com sounds like a website you'd go to if you needed snack cake recipes, but that's not the right idea at all.



The Debbie was Debbie Sankey, who died in 2004 at the age of 90.

Her idea was that there should be a place on the Internet readers could go to when they wanted to find out which books made the best entry points for exploring writers they'd never read before. In other words, if you want to start reading Jane Austen but you've never read anything

by her, which of her books makes the best place to start?

You click on Austen's name on the "Browse Authors" page and another page will pop us with comments by general readers—not scholars or specialists—recommending where to begin.

The experience behind the site is that often people who don't have a clue which books by an author they've never read before are the good ones, will pick a weak one. Has that happened to you?

Someone tells you that you ought to try a writer, say Stephen King, so you pick up a copy of "The Tommyknockers," read 100 pages, and decide it's the worst novel you've ever attempted to read. Then, when you're so soured on King you wouldn't read him if you were paid to, your friend tells you, "Oh, that's his worst book. You should have started with [fill in the blank]."

Check out debbiesidea.com if you perform a lot of readers' advisory. You might want to recommend it to your customers.

"Here's a tidbit for Shelflife," writes VI Manager of LO **LaVetta Dent**. "My staff thinks this is a record. I assured them it

was not, but that it was a very long time.

"The Village Library had a loooooonnnngggg overdue book returned to us this month, with a due date of November 21, 1967. The book was sent Priority Mail with a hand written note saying, 'Dear Village Library--I am embarrassed to be sending this to you after so many years. I recently

found this book packed away in storage boxes. I'm quite sure the fine exceeds the value of the book!' The book was Shirley Jackson's *The Haunting of Hill House.*"

Does 40 years late set a record? LaVetta is right—it doesn't. A guy in Burlington, VT returned a book that was 60 years

overdue. It was a children's book and the fine was cut off at \$10, but he insisted on paying the full fine of \$440.16 hoping the publicity would motivate others to use the library, which he called "a door to the rest of the world."

In 1997, a Harvard University book was returned after having been checked out in 1764. Someone found the third volume of Bishop White Kennett's Complete History of England in a used book store, bought it, and
