MLS Break Policy

In case you missed Executive Director **Donna Morris'** e-mail of May 17, please take a look at it here. Donna just wanted to clarify the long-standing MLS policy relating to breaks during the work day. Here is her memo:

To: All Staff From: Donna Morris, Executive Director Subject: A REMINDER ON THE 15 MINUTE REST BREAKS

Just want to remind everyone that the Policy (SH 120 Hours: Overtime; Breaks; Meal Periods) reads as follows:

Any employee scheduled to work in excess of four continuous hours in any one day is entitled to a rest break of 15 minutes duration for each four-hour work period, granted as closely to the midpoint of the

> scheduled work hours as is practical given staffing considerations. This rest break time is "on the clock" and considered as paid time. Employees are expected to remain at the work site and are subject to interruption

and recall to work duties during paid rest

breaks when required by staffing levels and/or unusual conditions. Rest break time is not cumulative within a workday or between workdays nor can it be used to allow for late arrival or early departure or to extend meal breaks.

There are two points that need to be kept in mind by all:

1. The policy states "a rest break of 15 minutes duration; not 3 breaks of 5 minute duration, not 5 breaks of 3 minute duration. "A" means "one" break of 15 minutes duration, not 18 minutes or 20 minutes. If you want to take less than the 15 minutes, that's okay because it is an "entitled to," not a "required to" benefit. There is no requirement in federal or state law, that an employer give anyone a rest break "on the clock." Minors under age 16 must be given a rest break of 30 minutes after so many hours, but because it is 30 minutes in duration, it is "off the clock."

2. The policy states "employees are expected to remain at the work site and are subject to interruption and recall to work duties during paid rest breaks." This means you can't go walking around the block or down the street. It means you can't go sit in your car to listen to music or to read a book or to regenerate your karma. Smokers, if you must smoke on the break, you must do so more that 25 feet from any doorway; but don't go much further. Remember you are subject to interruption and recall and to be so, you better not go much farther than 25 feet from the door so you can be found to be recalled if needed.

Ernestine Clark 2007 FOLIO Hall of Fame Award-Winner

MLS Director of Development Ernestine **Clark** is as important to the library system as the books on our shelves. Now in her 31st year of partnership with MLS, Ernestine was charged by then-Executive Director Lee Brawner to create a Friends of the Library group, and she has since seen that organization's "small" annual book sale blossom into the largest library book sale fund-raiser in the country, a \$200,000-a-year behemoth that has funded hundreds of special projects for MLS libraries.

Since 2000, FOLIO (Friends of Libraries in Oklahoma) has presented 17 Hall of Fame awards. This year, award #18 went to Ernestine.

"Award winners have been people who were dedicated to their local libraries and wanted to see the Friends of Libraries expand across the state," said Friends Coordinator Kay Samaripa. "This year's award committee, which was made up of Beverly Dieterlen, Chairman, Joe and Carol McReynolds, Julia Brady Ratliff, and Clare Delaney, couldn't have come up with a more worthy nominee than Ernestine."

Ernestine filled out a questionnaire in the fall of 2006 that solicited information to be used at the employee recognition banquet
