
I've often wondered how my United Way donations are used and if I'd ever need to use the services offered from UW funded organizations. I found out how this year. In the past year, my mother's health and mental state have declined considerably. It's been difficult for my family to care for her properly since we aren't in the same city and our jobs and family responsibilities often make it hard to give her consistent care.

Several years ago, I served on a United Way allocations committee that reviewed the budget requests and determined what amount of UW funds agencies should receive. One of the agencies we worked with was Sunbeam Family Services. It was during a visit to see the programs they offer that I discovered a resource that I thought could help my family. One of the services Sunbeam offers is a Senior Companion service. An older adult who is mobile serves as a companion to an older adult like my mom. They do minor work around the house, clean or cook. They also take them to appointments, shopping, or just sit and visit with them. This is a great help to the primary family caregivers who need relief from the daily care of their parents.

I thought this would be perfect for us, but unfortunately mom lives in Arlington, TX. I called the Tarrant County United Way and received a wealth of information and resources that my family could use. What a relief for all of us.

Had I not known about the help my local United Way provided to the community, I would not have thought about calling them in Texas. United Way donations stay in the local area, but even though my mom lives in another state, I still benefited from the efforts. So, please donate to the United Way. You never know how your life will be changed and it may be a United Way organization that can help you.



Lending Library Review:

Reading With Babies

READING WITH BABIES is an 18-minute DVD that shows babies 0-24 months 'reading' books with their parent(s) according to their developmental capacities. This pro-baby videotape is not just an idealized view of a parent reading to a quiet compliant baby but a more complex,

realistic, playful portrayal of babies interacting with books.

The 50+ babies in *READING WITH BABIES* show us, readers and non-readers alike, the fun and sometimes exasperating antics that emerge when reading to very young children. We see how babies read by eye, ear, finger and mouth; how they use books as toys; and how they engage in efforts to communicate with their parents.

Earlier than one might expect, babies show how they want to please their parents AND investigate books in their own ways. The families on the DVD speak English, Spanish, Russian and Chinese. The babies speak 'baby'.

For fun, she belongs to a crossword society in England and has puzzles sent to her. Christine says she finds American crosswords too colloquial.


