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What We Do—Security Manager

Linda Hyams, MLS Security Manager, isn't quite SuperCop, but she comes pretty close. She spent 20 years in the military, half of them as an investigator, and after her retirement she was a police officer in Chickasha.

Now she supervises all areas of security in all MLS agencies.

"I review hours of security tapes," Linda said,

"to see if the same challenging customers are moving between libraries. I study crime stats to see what the trends are in various parts of the metro area."

Linda advises library managers, but

the managers still have final say in their security needs. Linda and the managers are determined to keep our libraries safe for staff and customers. If any library has a repeated problem, staff should speak with the manager, who can then call on Linda if more help is needed.

"I want everyone to know," Linda added, "that if a real emergency arises, no

matter where you are, call 911 first. When you have time, then you can call me. When you look me up

on the MLS Who's Who page you see my phone number is 606-3757. If I'm not at my desk, the answering machine picks up after one ring and the recorded message includes several other phone numbers you can reach me at."

Linda recently had to deal with a graffitiminded customer who carved up a door in the Downtown Library's third floor men's room.

"I found him on the security tape and we got some pictures of him. DN Security Officer **Joe Poe** showed the man a picture and asked him who the guy was in the photo. The guy said it was himself, then he told us what his nickname is, and that was the name carved into the door.

"Talk about silly criminals. That guy should be on television."

Maintaining: The Maintenance Emergency Process

Just in case you didn't see the e-mail from **Patrick Williams**, MLS Director of Facilities Maintenance, or inadvertently



deleted it, this is a reminder on how to receive service from the Maintenance department.

This is the emergency process:

When you have an emergency or an urgent request, you can call Maintenance's **3536** internal phone or **606-3536** external phone number. This number will work for everyone 24 hours a day. You will speak with

someone immediately, receive voice mail instructions, or you will hear a pager tone

At Pager Tone: Enter the number you wish to be reached at.

If you have the new Cisco phone system, enter your extension number only.

Please do not enter library main numbers without entering an extension.

If you have the old phone system, enter your main number and the extension number you can be reached at.

You should receive a return call within five or ten minutes. Please, never rely on one try with a pager. If you feel that you should have received a response, call the 3536 number several times.

It is very important to turn in a work order even if it is an emergency and you have successfully reached someone in Maintenance!

Routine work orders


- -Turn in a work order for all repairs or request by clicking on the Maintenance Request link on the Intranet.
 - -No verbal request if at all possible.
- –No matter what the issue's are, a work order is always necessary.
- -Once a work order is received, the Maintenance tech will look into the matter and make the necessary repairs.
- -If you have lock problems of any type call 3536 and turn in a work order. We will spear head the problem until rectified.

-If you have any questions or need feed back please call Patrick at 606-3535 or 3536. He urges everyone to test this system and become familiar with it.

The Maintenance department is working on being more reliable; therefore, following this procedure will help them to help you.

Lending Library Review: 1001 Ways to Energize Employees

In this volume in his 1001 Ways series of books, Bob Nelson reveals what real companies across America are doing to get the very best out of their employees—and why it's the key to their success.

What are the basic ways of encouraging employees to take possession of their jobs? Listen to them. Form a community

of partners. Reward risk-taking but don't punish those who fall short of risky goals. For example, Hershey Foods gives out The Exalted Order of the Extended Neck Award.

With case studies, examples, techniques, research highlights, and quotes from business leaders, 1001 Ways to Energize Employees is invaluable for managers seeking to increase employee enthusiasm and involvement.

Reviewers of the book wrote: "When does this book come in handy? If you are seeking quick ideas to energize your team, and are short on inspiration: that is where

it's a very comprehensive source," and "If you have even heard ONE murmur about low morale at your office, try Nelson's books. He shows what successful companies know...that good employees deserve care and reward."

Ask Donna!

This month's question concerns the Daily Link, and Donna has stepped aside to let MLS Deputy Executive Director for Library Operations **Kay Bauman** address it. The question is: What has been staff reaction to Daily Link, and does it seem to be making a difference? Kay responded:

"The truth is that the reaction to Daily Link is a mixed bag. Some people are excited by it and some are resistant. And some agencies or offices have a hard time finding time for it.

"But there have been some wonderful benefits. Many places do their Link discussion and then make time as a team to discuss topics that need to be discussed. They combine the Link with staff meetings.

"MLS is an organization that is all about interactions. If all we do when we see each other is grunt good morning, how can we expect that we'll do much better with external customers? We need to investigate those principles that lead to better communication. The Link also provides a system-wide common point of interest for the day. But from what I've seen, people seem to be more friendly, although it's too soon to tell if there will be a lasting effect.

"Some people are concerned with revisiting the Links every few weeks, but you're missing the point if every time you go over the same concepts, you do it in the same way and with the same terms. You have to dissect the concept, even if you do it by going over it word by word. You need to look for the small ideas imbedded in the large ones.
