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### MLS and the Mayor's Office: Together Again

Recently DN librarian Buddy Johnson forged a new link with OKC city offices when he was asked to provide information about past OKC mayors. The OKC PIO department

the formal portraits that hang in City Hall, but are too large to scan using a conventional scanner.

Buddy knew that he and talented DN tech assistant **Chris Larwig** were just the team to help them out. They decided to bring the portraits to the DN Library Oklahoma Room so Chris could take photos of these photos. The originals were in lousy condition and the images were in desperate need of preservation. Chris took the new photos and Buddy went to work on them on the computer.

Enter Mick Cornett. The mayor was so impressed by Buddy's and Chris' work, he de-

cided to commission a time line of the city that would use the scans of the mayors along the line.

As a result of this collaboration, City staff has agreed to allow MLS to scan all of the City's historical photos for preservation and inclusion in our Oklahoma Images collection.

In addition, the city PIO department learned of the Oklahoma Voices project for the first time and now plans to have several long-time City employees sit down for interviews.

And that's how good things begin. Buddy and Chris rock!

You may have seen a note sent out recently from Susan McVey, Director of the Oklahoma Department of Libraries. Her agency received a request seeking information about how folks who are out of work are using their library in an attempt to land a job. The reason is that libraries have a chance to claim some of the money from the economic stimulus package, aka the bailout money.

If you have any solid data as to how your customers are using your library in their job hunting, or in their quest to start a small business of their own, Susan would like to pass it along to the agency that is asking her for information. Failing a collection of stats, which we don't usually keep, even anecdotal information would be helpful.

"Some of you," Susan wrote, "may subscribe to a test database that includes practice tests for occupations that require employees to pass an entrance or advancement test. If so, data on the number of searches conducted would be very helpful. If you have offered classes on employment, the number of attendees would be helpful. I appreciate your help."

### Fish! Tales: Real-Life Stories to Help You Transform Your Workplace and Your Life

Stephen Lundin and his collaborators apply the lessons they've learned to this clever and unexpected book.

It all began in the Pike Place Fish Market in Seattle when the employees realized that there was a lot of fun to be had in handling and selling fish. I mean,



it's not an iron lung—it's a fish. People who wanted to buy a fish for supper could take it all very seriously if they wanted to, but the guys working at the market could push their fun to the point of putting on a show, if they wanted to.

There are four basic elements to the FISH! philosophy:

- \* <u>Play</u>—have fun and create energy at home or at the office.
- \* <u>Make their day</u>—how can you engage fellow employees, customers and make each other's day?
- \* <u>Be Present</u>—How can you make sure you are fully available and aware during conversations with people? It is about create a greater sense of intimacy between individuals.
- \* <u>Choose Your Attitude</u>—Each day you choose how you are going to act or on which "side of the bed" you wake up. The choice is yours and, the way you act, affects others.

This months ShelfLife Quiz tests how much you know about science. Or, in my case, if you know anything about it at all. The answers appear on another page.

Who was the first person buried on the moon?

#### Answers:

- 1. Dr. Eugene Shoemaker The famed U.S. Geological Survey astronomer, trained the Apollo astronauts about craters, but never made it into space. Dr. Shoemaker had wanted to be an astronaut but was rejected because of a medical problem. His ashes were placed on board the Lunar Prospector spacecraft before it was launched on January 6, 1998.
