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Getting the Lead Out

We've been receiving phone calls again from local media outlets with questions about that Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) policy regarding lead limits in items intended for children. Questions are being addressed to us because prior to 1985, lead was an ingredient in printer's ink and if a child decided to eat Green Eggs and Ham—the book itself and not the food—the lead in the ink would do the kid no good.

The ruling came out in January, 2009,

with the warning that testing for lead limits was LASSIE COME-HOME

to begin on February 10. On January 30, the CPSC approved a one-year stay of enforcement for certain entities, libraries being one of them.

For some reason, on March 17, Yahoo ran an Associated Press story headlined: "Dangerous Reading: Libraries Are Urged to Remove Some Children's Books Over Lead Fears." The article by Lee Logan mentioned the one year postponement and admitted that "the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention say any danger from lead in children's books is slight." But nothing is more fun on a slow news day than stirring people up over nothing.

If you take a call from the media about this issue, please refer them to Director of Marketing and Communications **Kim Terry**. And if you like a glass of iced printer's ink with your lunch, make sure you're not drinking anything bottled earlier than 1985.

The Benefit to You

ave you noticed the new St. Anthony YouCARE clinics that have been opening around town? They are like mini-emergency rooms that offer "quick and convenient care for many common illnesses."

The advantage is in convenience and the fact that they don't cost as much as traditional ER care, urgent care centers, and doctors' offices.

The disadvantage is that they are not participating providers in the First Health PPO Network. You may need their services someday—although we hope not—but if you do, you need to be aware that they are not members of our insurance plan.

Also, there are providers who advertise that they accept "all insurance plans," but that doesn't mean that they

have an active provider contract with our PPO network. When you're not in an emergency situation, try to remember to check the First Health Network website located on the MLS Intranet under Employee/Benefits/Insurance Benefits. You can find walk-in (no appointment necessary) care centers by searching under the Facilities category for Convenience Care Clinics or Urgent Care Centers.

If you have questions about any clinic or care center, contact **Kelley Hoffman** in Human Resources. But don't ask ShelfLife. Our advice is to take two aspirin and go back to bed.

Executive Director Q & A

From Executive Director **Donna Morris**

Q: Will you be asking the staff who make the budget to work in some cuts for FY 09-10? Do you know yet where budget cuts will have to come?"

A: At the current time, we don't anticipate having to make major cuts in the budget. The county is projecting a 2% increase in revenues, so we will project our budget using the same numbers. As we still have some time before the final budget is taken to the Metropolitan Library Commission finance committee in June, we will continue to monitor the economic situation on a statewide and national level, before making final recommendations to the commission.

We are very fortunate to have a dedicated mil levy for library services in Oklahoma County as voted on by Oklahoma County taxpayers. The dedicated tax dollars mean our budget is very stable from year to year. The end result is that we don't have big swings in the budget up or down. In 2010-2011, the Northwest Library is scheduled to open and that will require a large amount of money to go toward the operational costs of the library. The good news is that we have been planning for this new library for quite some time, and our revenues have been stable enough to support this new, large increase in operating costs.

New Work of Art Unveiled Downtown

J. Norick and his dad, James, were on hand at the Downtown Library on Wednesday, March 25, for the unveiling of the new completely interactive statue called "Learning." The art is a gift from the Norick family and the James H. and Madalynne Norick Foundation to MLS and the City of Oklahoma City.

The work is of three almost life-size people in a library setting. A woman in a purple dress is holding a picture book open so the boy and girl can see the illustration. It is "interactive" because viewers are able to walk around the scene and sit or interact with the figures.

MLS Executive Director **Donna**Morris spoke a few words of dedication and told the crowd of 80 people that the sculpture depicted three things that are very important to her: art, libraries, and learning. Former mayor Norick also spoke, telling the history of the project beginning a year ago when his recently departed mother commissioned the piece from Buffalo, NY artist Susan Geissler, who has been one of the

nation's most important female realist sculptors since she entered the field in the mid-1980s.

Ms. Geissler spoke a few quiet words and was visibly grieving the loss of Mrs. Norick. Several children who were on hand for the unveiling grabbed the cloth that covered the statue and gave it a sharp tug, revealing "Learning" and collecting a laugh at the same time.

"This event was about the Noricks and the art," said Downtown Manager of Library Operations **Julie Ballou**. "That's where the emphasis belonged and I'm glad it stayed there."

The statue is at the entrance to the Children's area of the Downtown Library.

"We are honored that the Norick Foundation chose us to receive this remarkable work of art. We know it will serve for decades to come to remind generations of children and adults of the importance of the library as a center for life-long learning," Donna said.

"Learning" is located Downtown, but it was dedicated for all of us.
