

LS Deputy Executive Director/Library Operations **Kay Bauman** wants everyone to be informed about the results of the recent Culture Survey and what is being done with them. At the X-change meeting on March 30, supervisors were charged with discussing the results with their staffs and then bringing the best ideas from around the system back to the next X-change meeting, which took place on Monday, May 18th.

Three areas have been identified as being of primary concern to staff, and these will receive focus system-wide. They are: 1) Increasing appreciation of staff 2) Improving communication and 3) Being more receptive to change.

Afterwards, ad-hoc committees were formed for each of these three areas to give in-depth consideration to the specifics shared at the X-change meeting and in the culture survey. While working on these issues over the summer, these groups will continue to solicit staff input via special e-mail groups that have been set up for this purpose.

From Cataloging

f you haven't noticed, there's a new icon on the block in the MLS catalog. It looks kind of like a little iPod, and it indicates a record for a downloadable sound recording. These records are available in the CyberMARS public catalog.

Cataloging staff have been adding these records for several weeks, and there are now over 200 in the catalog. Of course, that's just a fraction of the downloadable records owned by MLS, but more records are being added every day.

For a few examples to view without hunting for them, search the catalog for the titles *Audition*, *Double Homicide*, or *Deal Breaker*. Or if you'd rather just search your favorite title or author. If you want to see a complete list, do a keyword search using "downloadable" as the search term and limited the media to "audio."

Just a couple of reminders: there are no hot links in the records other than the ones to download the recording. To get back to the catalog listing, it's necessary to click the index button or to do a new search. Some records include links to hear an excerpt of the recording; others link only to the complete recording. Currently, all the records that have been uploaded link to recordings in wma format, although some link to excerpts in MP3. Records for MP3 recordings will be added later.

Strategic Plan Progress Report

ave you visited the Strategic Plan Highlights page on the Intranet recently? Take a look at (http://morris/gotinfo/general/strategic_plan/highlights/sp2. html) Do you wonder how all of these activities help us reach our strategic plan goals? Are they working?

ShelfLife spoke recently with Planning Dept. Researcher Stuart Williamson.

"Well, Planning recently repeated an online survey from a year ago to see how the perceptions of our online customers have changed vis-à-vis our strategic plan," Stuart told us. "I won't bore you with the details and words like 'statistically significant' or 'confidence level,' but the results show that your efforts are working. The perception that our staff is knowledgeable and attentive was up by about five percentage points on both counts. Awareness of our

Internet computers, Wi-Fi, website resources, and of the benefits of Internet access at the library increased across the board as well."

Stuart pointed out that the survey also showed that budging customer awareness of our physical items, materials such as magazines, audio books, videos, and music CDs, is tougher than anticipated.

"So," he added, "submissions to our Strategic Plan Highlights page on creative ways your agency is sharing these resources with customers are particularly welcome. The bottom line is that your activities are making a difference. Keep up the good work!"

Lending Library Review:Visionary Leadership in Volunteer Programs

ne of the true pioneers of volunteer management, Marlene Wilson has shared her vision and practical advice with practitioners around the world for over 40 years.



Her seminal 1976 book, *The Effective Management of Volunteer Programs*, was the first attempt anywhere to outline what volunteer management is all about.

Now she has compiled 16 of her most popular presentations from 1974 to 1999 into one book. Marlene Wilson's stories and ideas provided inspiration and vision for countless volunteer program managers.

One reviewer wrote: "This book captures the wit and wisdom of Marlene Wilson's significant legacy to the field of volunteer administration. Through her speeches, Wilson laces her personal reflections and keen observations with insights gleaned from popular authors. In many ways, Wilson's advice and recommendations are as timely today as they were when first shared with the field. He was part of a Rotary International Group Study Exchange (GSE) Program.

"The GSE program," Stacy said, "is designed for young professionals

professional partnership experiences in Bolivia were with public, private, academic, and special libraries and with educators and administrators working in private elementary and secondary schools and colleges."

Stacy was one of three participants from Oklahoma's Western District of Rotary – District 5750. The others represented Oklahoma State University, Credit Union Service Centers of America, and one is an educator/trainer/author.

"We left for La Paz on April 17th and returned to OKC on Sunday, May 17th. We visited six Bolivian cities (in order) – La Paz (the capitol), Cochabamba, Sucre (the original capitol city), Potosi, Tarija, & Santa Cruz.

Bolivia has about 9 million people and is considered to be the poorest country in South America."

The Americans stayed with Rotarians in their homes and had the opportunity to experience Bolivian life first-hand. Rotary focuses on International partnerships and one of the major assignments for each team member is to conduct presentations to a minimum of six Rotary Clubs across the district. By educating different Rotary Clubs about the needs and experiences identified in Bolivia, the clubs may wish to partner together on activities and projects to better the lives of the people. When two clubs from different countries work together on a project, the Rotary International Foundation will match the funds - thus increasing the monetary foundation for the project.

"Oh, the stories I could tell... and will be telling in the coming weeks and months," Stacy said. "Then look for a FOCUS session dedicated to my experience."
