Question: What's going on with parking at the Downtown Library?

Answer: We're having to undergo some major changes to our parking arrangement with the city parking garage to the rear of the Downtown Library. These affect not only DN staff and customers, but any staff members who attend meetings, conferences

and gatherings of any sort at DN.

Beginning on October 1, 2009, we will no longer be able to park in the City Center garage.


The city contacted us concerning our parking arrangements. Effective October 1, the City Center west garage will close. The city has arranged to move everyone who currently parks at City Center to the Sheridan/Walker garage. The city will do this automatically.

Parking in the alley behind the library will also be affected. We will still have some free parking spaces there, but they are reserved for staff who travel to and from the library on a steady basis. We did lose one guest spot, so in future we will have only two guest parking spots and those must be booked through the Executive Director's office.

I am sorry that we have lost our very convenient parking not only for staff but also for our customers, and please know that I am continuing to contact and discuss future options with the parking lots new owner, Devon Energy.

Well, good night. Pleasant dreeeeaaams, hmmmmm?



#### Lending Library Review:

The Accidental Librarian

New library employees who work with the public can find it out as early as their first day on the job—most customers assume that if you work in a library, you must be a librarian. We know it isn't true; we know that many library employees don't even want to become librarians.

But many do, or after some time on the job realize that advancement to a librarian position is just what they want, and a lot of those staffers may find themselves performing some of the tasks of the professional librarian without having taken any of the college classes. What have you missed? What do you need to do in order to find out about the newest ideas in librarianship? And what do you need to do in order to keep moving up the employment ladder?

### Help is Needed for a Member of Our MLS Family

ShelfLife heard recently that the brother of Materials Selector **Susan Ryan** is in desperate need of a bone marrow transplant this month. Thomas Ryan, 34, was diagnosed with Hodgkin's Lymphoma when he was 14, and the cancer keeps coming back.


Because the bone marrow transplant will be performed at the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, MD, donations are needed to help pay for travel and health-related expenses. Thomas has a cancer blog at http://www.helpthomas. org with a link to the Bone Marrow Foundation donation site for tax deductible donations for his care.

If you go to the blog and click on "donate now" on the right side, it takes you to the donation site with another link including a picture of him and more information on him and his diagnosis. If you would like to donate, donate to Thomas through this site, your donation is tax deductible, and Thomas receives the money from the foundation for his expenses.

"Staff can mail their checks to the foundation if they're not comfortable donating online," Susan said. "If those inclined to give are more comfortable sending their donations directly to me, that would be great, but they won't receive the deduction for their taxes unless they go through the foundation. "Thomas and his wife are using this foundation because they take care of everything. They manage the website, they keep track of the donations, they send every donor a letter of receipt, and they send Haley a list of donors and all of the messages left for him every week. It's a pretty easy site to use. If anyone needs clarification, they can give me a call."

Obviously, Susan and her family could use a helping hand right now. Our thoughts are with Susan, Thomas and his wife, and we encourage you to do what you can. Thanks.

### Getting Historical at Work



Here's a new database we have on trial through Oct. 31st. If you set aside a few minutes to take a look at it, that won't do. I dropped in at http://ahiv. alexanderstreet.com to browse around and ended up staying nearly a half-hour before I realized I needed to get this article finished. It's that interesting.

The site is American History in Video. Here's how the site describes itself:

"American History in Video provides the largest and richest collection of video available online for the study of American history, with 2,000 hours and more than 5,000 titles on completion. The collection allows students and researchers to analyze historical events, and their presentation over time, through commercial and governmental newsreels, archival footage, public affairs footage, and important documentaries. This release now provides 1526 titles, with new videos from California Newsreel and PBS, equaling approximately 528 hours."

Say you have a customer who's doing research on the Alamo for a history class. The site has a 3.5 hour History Channel program on the Alamo in two parts, plus an episode of the program "History's Mysteries" and one from "Wild West Tech." The icing on the cake comes in the form of a complete transcript of the program's text, handy for quoting accurately.

American History in Video received a rave review in the August 15, 2009, issue of Library Journal, which gave it a full 10 on a scale of 1 to 10 and a rating of "resoundingly recommended."

ShelfLife recommends it, too. Bring a sandwich for lunch and plan to spend an hour taking a look. Then let **Susan Ryan** in Material Selection know what you think of it.

### In System Audio Recordings

ere's a quick heads up from our Materials Services Division about the revision to their definition of "in system" when it comes to audio recordings.

In order to provide library customers with quick access to recorded library materials, the Materials Services Division has revised the definition of "in system" audio recordings. Most importantly, audio recordings may no longer be considered "in system" if the title is owned in print. Please read the information below carefully, and follow the guidelines for adding gift materials to the collection.

Since many publishers no longer offer "books on tape" (sound recordings in cassette format), the Materials Services Division wishes to give careful consideration before adding such materials to the collection. For this reason, gift audio tapes may no longer be considered "in system" gifts. Please send all gift audio tapes to Materials Selection; do not send any to Cataloging.

Materials on CD are often recorded in many variations (such as abridged and unabridged versions). All variations may not be available for purchase at any given time. To avoid creating long



customer waiting lists for a variation with limited availability, the Materials Services Division would like to evaluate the possibility of purchasing additional copies of any CDs added to the collection. For this reason, gift CDs will be considered "in system" if the exact material (title, edition, number of discs, performer(s), songs, etc.) is already part of the collection.

Please continue to send "in system" gift CDs to Cataloging, with appropriate documentation. Please send any gift CDs that do not meet the "in system" criteria to Materials Selection.


