The students hear a story, get a library card and check out books.





Lending Library Review:

The Nextgen Librarian's Survival Guide

uthor Rachel Singer Gordon is Aformer Head of Computer Services at the Franklin Park Public Library and is currently Consulting Editor to the Book Publishing Division of Information Today, Inc. Odds are, she knows what she's talking about.

And what she's talking about are the things the new generation coming into the library profession need to know. (That's right—not all librarians are old. Just the ones . . . well, never mind.) Topics include Surviving Library School; Surviving the Job Hunt; Surviving Entry-Level Positions; Moving Forward; Image, Stereotypes, and Diversity; Connections; Work/Life Balance; and Transforming the Profession.

A significant portion of each chapter is given over to printing survey results which included opinions of Nextgen librarians both new to the profession and in managerial positions, and older librarians weighing in on librarianship and generational issues. The author does a good job of breaking down issues important to young librarians including (but certainly not limited to) the job market, librarian stereotypes, and career planning.

A Clear Voice in the Dark



Jessica Minter is a Circ Clerk at WA. She's also the link that joins the blind and/ or physically disabled to the world of reading.

Jessica has recently become a volunteer for the Oklahoma

Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped. Once a week she donates about an hour and a half making recordings for people who cannot read due to blindness, dyslexia, or learning or physical disabilities that make holding a book impossible.

"I've only been doing this five weeks now," Jessica said. "I saw a flyer on our bulletin board calling for volunteers and so I offered my services. The library asked me to come in for an audition, and I passed it, so now I go in on Thursday or Friday and read. I usually read Commentary from 'Oklahoma Gazette,' and sometimes some of the articles."

Currently the Library for the Blind is in the process of building a new recording studio so the need for more reading volunteers is crucial.

"The system is called OTIS," Jessica added, "and that stands for Oklahoma Talking Information System. They're in talks with OETA to broadcast some of the recordings over the radio.

"You know," Jessica said, "we all have struggles we have to live with but I feel blessed with good health and the ability to do things physically. When I think of those who aren't so lucky, I realize my responsibility and really want to help however I can. That's why I do this. It doesn't take much from me but it means so much to others."

Don't Take It For Granted

We received a reminder recently via email that every year MLS has to compile the statistical information that is needed to make sure all grants are reported because they have to be included in our end-of-year stats and revenue.

Many staff members across the system may find opportunities to apply for grants from outside sources to assist their departments. This is just a reminder that, in order to prevent a duplication of efforts and to streamline the grant application process, the library's Development and Volunteer Services (DVS) Office should be consulted before grant applications are submitted.

Due to the fact that some granting agencies may only accept one application per organization, or have other contingencies that might affect the possibility of a larger grant for the Metropoli-

tan Library System, this internal grant process is very important.

Following this process will enable the DVS Office to keep a record of all grant applications as well as utilize relationships they may have to assist in securing the requested grant dollars. The DVS Office's records and resources can also help grant applicants make sure their applications are as effective as possible before they are submitted, and they may be able to assist in providing components of the grant that you might not have readily available.

Please consult the DVS Office as early as possible in the grant application process, and remember to provide a final copy of any grant applications for the DVS Office's records.




