Funded by a grant from the U.S. Institute for Museum and Library Services, Laura Bush 21st Century Librarian Program, up to 100 qualified applicants will be selected to participate. Fellows will be introduced to a new framework for serving and engaging adults ages 50 and older that both promotes productive aging



Lending Library Review:

Visionary Leadership in Volunteer Programs

LS is blessed with one of the best volunteer programs of any Oklahoma library. Heidi Port and the gang in the DVS office (frequently with the help of Emily Williams, Lisa Wood and the Outreach Crew) recruit, train and encourage thousands of volunteers every year.



But every member of the extended MLS team may work with volunteers at some time or other and an understanding of volunteers will be a great advantage.

And that's where Marlene Wilson enters the picture. She has been called "one of the true pioneers of volunteer management," and she's been in the business for over 40 years. Her first book on the subject, The Effective Management of Volunteer Programs, was published in 1976, and she's still finding new things to say, new advice to offer.

Her latest book is a collection of excerpts from her speeches and comes highly recommended for its clarity and insight.

The lucky winner is Elvonda Presley who uses the Choctaw Library. "Elvonda was so excited with her new laptop, everyone at the Choctaw Library couldn't help but be excited with her," Roesler added. "Now, none of us can wait to start the program up again in 2011."

Nobody's Perfect!

Maybe you saw this story in the news lately. It seems that the Father of Our Country didn't return all his library books on time. Or ever.

That's right—George Washington, we've recently discovered, still has out some library books from the oldest library in New York. According to a ledger, then President Washington borrowed two books that were due back on Nov. 2, 1789, and never returned them. One of the books was the Law of Nations, which deals with international

relations. The other was a volume of debates from Britain's House of Commons.

The fines have been determined and at today's prices, adjusted for inflation, the Prez owes the New York Society Library right at \$300,000. Head librarian Mark Bartlett says the institution doesn't expect to collect the money, but it would like for the items to be returned. (Good thing Washington didn't borrow any DVDs—the fines really add up on those.)
