Data Base Updates



We have another trial subscription to the Vault Career Insider database, which calls itself "the largest most comprehensive online career resource available." It's updated daily so you should be able to check it out soon and often. This is what it has to offer:

- Downloadable Career Guides
- Employer profiles and rankings
- Industry blogs and news covering the latest trends and issues
- Diversity, green programs and leadership development profiles
- Vault's job board, which matches employers and recruiters with top talent (that's you.)

Two of the databases to which we subscribe already have either recently been updated or will later this summer.



The Oklahoman has announced the release of an updated version of its Digital Archives. The new version includes updated searching and browsing capabilities. When you log in, you will see a new look and new features. The Archives now functions more like a website, and you can move between features with the menu buttons or by using your browser's Back button. Here are some of the features of the improved Archives:

Home - Perform simple searches from the past five years with results sorted by the most relevant articles.

Advanced Search - Refine your search, including by Date Range. You'll also have onscreen Search Tips here.

Browse Archive - You can now browse a range of dates and days of the week with thumbnail previews.

Search Within Results - Allows you to narrow your search even further within the search results.

Save Query - Lets you save searches and rerun them later from the Advanced Search screen.

My Collection - Keeps a list of the articles you've found for quick reading later.

Compatibility - The Digital Archives are now compatible with Windows 7, Vista and Windows XP.

You can call their customer service number at 405-475-4000 if you have questions or comments.

And finally, EBSCO announces that later this summer you will find changes to the Auto Repair Reference Center database. Some of these upgrades will include:

All repairs classified by OEMs, such as Ford, Honda, etc., on a given vehicle will be categorized and made available in the new ARRC user interface

Thousands of repairs (as opposed to hundreds in print repair manuals) for each vehicle will provide the most comprehensive repair coverage available to the Do-it-Yourselfer

Coverage will be provided for many more vehicles than Chilton, with historic repair information dating back to the 1940s

Content indices will make finding repair information much easier, and will include wiring diagrams, specifications, maintenance intervals, TSBs, recalls and labor guide estimates

A streamlined content update system will ensure currency superior to the manual methods used by other sources

Researchers using the new interface will have more complete access to what they need, by being able to find content from PDFs, including graphics in the repair procedures

This is the 2nd edition of a book originally published in 1974 that went on to become a standard text for anyone who needs to understand how to elicit information through the use of questionnaires.

Not many of us like filling in survey forms but sometimes they can't be avoided and you find yourself as either the surveyor or the surveyed. That's right, you may as well admit it—sooner or later you're going to have to ask for feedback from the public on the effectiveness of a library program or service, and the more you know about how to do it, the more reliable the information you get is going to be.

The authors of this book are the ones to go to when you need to find out how to create the most effective questionnaires. Douglas Berdie, Ph.D., is President of Consumer Review Systems, Inc. John F. Anderson, Ph.D., and Marsha A. Niebuhr are President and Vice President of Anderson, Niebuhr & Associates, Inc., a firm specializing in marketing and survey research.

Amazon.com tells us that the book covers, among other topics, "how to choose between mail surveys and interviews, designing a study using questionnaires, questionnaire format, how to write questions, discussion of response rates, and brief recommendations on analyzing data from questionnaires. A highlight of the book is the fully annotated bibliography containing 494 sources of important work related to survey research conducted over the past 50 years, with a table of contents organized by topic. Extensively illustrated, this book is a must for people in business, marketing, psychology, education, journalism, sociology, health care, government, and all other areas where questionnaires are used."

The book costs \$50, and that's why we have libraries. No question about that.

Why What We Do Matters

Need something to boost your spirits? Check out this excerpt from an interview with Ray Bradbury as published in the Spring 2010 issue of *The Paris Review*. Bradbury speaking:

"I'm completely library educated. I've never been to college. I went down to the library when I was in grade school in Waukegan, and in high school in Los Angeles, and spent long days every summer in the library. With the library, it's like catnip, I suppose: you begin to run in circles because there's so much to look at and read. And it's far more fun than going to school, simply because you make up your own list.

"I am a librarian. I discovered me in the library. I went to find me in the library. Before I fell in love with libraries, I was just a six-year-old boy. The library fueled all of my curiosities, from dinosaurs to ancient Egypt. When I graduated from high school in 1938, I began going to the library three nights a week. I did this every week for almost ten years and finally, in 1947, around the time I got married, I figured I was done. So I graduated from the library when I was twenty-seven. I discovered that the library is the real school."

I Can't Believe I Shot That! Again!!

A couple of years ago, DN Teen specialist **Kimberly Ann Edwards** questioned her own sanity when she started a film-making contest for teens. She called it "I Can't Believe I Shot That!"

This spring saw the event's third anniversary with a film "festival" of amateur movies and an audience of 63 people in attendance. Four prizes were awarded—1st Place won a Flip camcorder; 2nd Place a \$50 VISA gift card; 3rd Place a \$25 VISA gift card; and an Audience Choice Award, which was a space alien in a jar. Only Kim, right?

Winners were: "Risk" by Eric Talbert and Clayton Cromer; "Without a Doubt" by Bune Tomlinson, Jackson Fall and Evan Anne; "Sketches" by Abigail Bunting. The Audience Choice prize went to Talbert and Cromer.

"Everyone had a great time and I don't think I will ever tire of parents telling me that they are glad that I'm doing this for their kids!" Kim said.

This year the film contest was preceded by basic filmmaking classes with a short movie written, produced and directed by the members of the class.

No Outstanding Service Award in 2010

OSA Committee Chair **Elizabeth Kessler** (HUM) has announced that due to several reasons MLS will not be awarding Outstanding Service Awards this year.

"A few weeks ago," Elizabeth reported, "Outstanding Service Award (OSA) past chairs and I met to review the program to determine if it is fitting the needs of MLS employees. After much discussion, we have recommended that the OSA program be suspended for this year and reorganized."

The team's recommendation was approved by the Executive Director and the Deputy Executive Directors.

The decision was arrived at after considering several factors, primary among them being the fact that few nominees are received each year. The height of interest in the program came in its second year of existence, 2005, when 35 names were put into nomination. Since then, the average number has been 21, or less than 5% of the total number of MLS employees.

Another major consideration was the belief by some employees that the OSA was awarded due to factors that had little to do with the nominee's actual job performance and even less with the concept of "above and beyond." Some see it as nothing more than a popularity contest.

But Elizabeth sees this as an opportunity for OSA to evolve, not collapse.

"The formation of an 'Implementation Team' is in the planning stages," she said. "This team will take the recommendations from the committees of the cultural survey (change, communication and underappreciated) and apply them. Employee recognition does tie in with the underappreciated committee recommendations.

"So, while OSA may be absent this year, we might have a completely new and improved recognition program in the years to come."

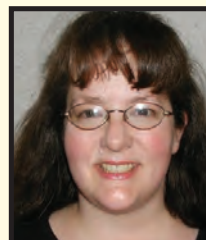

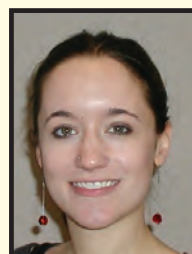

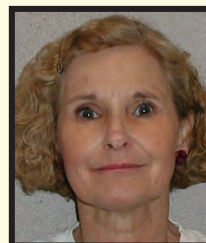
