Pay Partial Update

Do you ever have to take customer money at the Circ Desk and have a little trouble with the Pay Partial Screen? It can happen, especially when a customer wants to pay part of his/her fine but is unable to pay it all at one time. Recently **Anne Fischer**, Director of Information Technology, sent out a note explaining how Pay Partial works, along with word about an update that went into effect on August 24. Here's what Anne had to say.

There appears to be some confusion between the **Pay Partial** screen and staff adjusting how much they are expecting a customer to pay on their fines, i.e., accepting less than the amount owed. This e-mail will try to explain how the Partial Pay fine screen is meant to be used and what to do if you allow a customer to pay less than the total amount of fines owed on their card.

1. **Pay Partial** Screen — Use this screen if the customer only wants to pay the fine on some of the items that they owe fines on. Example: Customer owes \$10.00 in fines but only wants to pay \$5.00 today and will pay the rest later. You go to the Partial Pay Fine screen, hold the Ctrl key and select items one at a time until the amount totals \$5.00. You then accept that amount of money and the fines selected are erased.

If you cannot select items that total to exactly \$5.00, select items that will get as close to \$5.00 as possible without going over, i.e., select \$4.80 worth of fines, enter amount paid of \$4.80 and give them \$0.20 change. The next time they come in, they will owe \$5.20 instead of \$5.00.

2. Allowing customer to pay less than the total amount of fines they owe (forgiving remainder) — If the customer owes \$10.00 in fines but you agree to accept \$5.00 and want to clear their record, go to the **Pay Fine** screen. The amount due will say \$10.00. Change the Amount paid to \$5.00 (the amount you agreed to accept), then enter the Cash Received from the customer. All fines will be erased but your money will be correct because it will show the Amount Paid was \$5.00. You do not

need to worry about the adjustment on each item, just that their record is now cleared and you accepted \$5.00 as the amount they owed.

Staff have been using the **Pay Partial** screen to make the adjustment and selecting several items and then putting in less than the amount owed. The computer does not know what to apply to each one in this situation so the library's money will be off if you do this. This also was not how this screen was meant to be used.

Effective August 24:

To keep this from happening, on the Pay Partial screen, you can adjust one item, i.e., you can select one item, and accept less than the amount due. However, once you select more than one item, the Amount Paid field will no longer be available to you. So, if you want to adjust fines on individual items, you will need to do this one item at a time. If you want to accept less than the customer owes for fines, just use the Pay Fine screen and don't worry about adjusting each item.

Working on the MLS budget is one of the most complex things we do every year, but it can be fun when we wind up with more money to spend than we thought we'd have. That happened to us this year when the tax revenues added up to around \$600,000 more than was anticipated in the first draft budget.
