You programmers know about this already, but it may be news for everyone else. The Oklahoma Department of Libraries has started a Children's and Young Adult Book Review Podcast. You can catch it at http://yalitlovers. oklibshare.org/ Listen on your computer or download it through iTunes to an MP3 player or smartphone.

Twice a month, Adrienne Butler, Youth Services Consultant at ODL, posts new podcasts. Among the podcaster are Adrienne and our own **Emily Williams** (Young Adult Services Coordinator).

"This might be a good way to keep up on your children's/ YA lit reader's advisory," Emily said. "Our latest podcast is all about *Mockingjay*, the bestselling conclusion to the Hunger Games trilogy. Another recent podcast was about *One Crazy Summer*, which I think will probably win the Newbery Award (or a Newbery Honor) from ALA in January."

The podcasts are rich with spoilers. "If you're going to read the book and don't want to know what happens," Emily warned, "wait until after you read to listen. But if you just want to keep up with new books for kids and teens, this is a good place to start."

Stay FOCUSed

This year FOCUS is starting off with something a little different. Stacy Schrank and the FOCUS team have booked one of the most promising keynote speakers

ever—Danny Cahill, the man who lost over 55% of his body weight during the 8th season of the TV show *The Biggest Loser*, to become the program's biggest loser ever.

Born in Midwest City and now living in Broken Arrow, Cahill is a musician who has played with Donny Osmond, PC Quest, and other bands. He's also a motivational speaker who tours the country regularly. He has appeared on The Today Show, The Jay Leno Show, Live with Regis & Kelly, The Doctors, The Joy Behar



Show, Larry King Live, The Suze Orman Show, Issues with Jane Valez-Mitchell, and numerous radios shows.






