FROM THE AD TEAM: ANNE FISCHER, DIRECTOR OF INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

Did you know that in addition to service calls, at least once every quarter, an IT Tech checks every computer :

- to make sure all cabling is secure and tied up neatly
- checks monitors for dimness or distortion and schedules replacement if there are problems
- relabels any equipment that is improperly labeled,
- installs updates to all common programs such as Internet Explorer plugins, etc.
- checks printers for any maintenance messages
- checks the UPS in the data closet to make sure the batteries are not in need of replacement
- asks Library Manager or person in charge if they have had any computer problems reported to them
- talks to staff in various areas to see if they have had any problems with equipment or problems reported to them
- checks the library laptop to make sure all software is up to date
- checks express computer and cabinet to make sure fans are working properly and temperature inside the cabinet is acceptable
- cleans keyboards, mice, and monitors
- replace mousepads on all public computers and on staff computers if needed

IT has also been spending time getting ready for the new replacement computers this year. These computers will have the Windows 7 operating system which will be new to some staff and customers. Windows XP is not going to be supported too much longer so we are going to start making the switch this year. As part of this upgrade, all library software has to be updated with a new way of communicating with the NonStop system. Jimmy is currently working on this project as well as several others.

We are also spending guite a bit of time planning for the remodel of Southern Oaks and the new Northwest Library. Both libraries will have sorters in their staff work areas as well as one service desk instead of separate circulation and reference desks. Both libraries will also be implementing a new tool called a "touchdown" station. This will be two or three cabinets located throughout the building that hold computers for staff to use while assisting customers. We have been testing both the iPad and netbook for use at these stations. They can connect to the network wirelessly but are both small and light enough that staff could take it with them to the shelf when assisting the customer. Then, if the material is not on the shelf, they can place the reserve right there without having to go back to the desk to have computer access.

All in all, this is an exciting time for IT and the library and we are looking forward to continue our regular work as well as implement these new projects.


Get *Friend*ly



Something to keep in mind, though, is that you or customers cannot volunteer for projects through the Friends site. **Heidi Port**




will continue to track volunteers with her own special method.

You Don't Look Like a Librarian: Shattering and Creating Positive New Images in the Internet Age

Librarians, and really all library staff members, are expected by the public to look a certain way—and it isn't like Gisele Bündchen or Michael Bergin. All professions are saddled with their own particular stereotypes, and they're rarely flattering, but many professionals seem able to improve their negative image. But it's tough for librarians, and Kneale's book looks at the nasty truth that our image has in many instances kept librarians, and by extension all libraries, from being taken seriously.

Kneale spent 10 years studying librarian stereotypes and the impact they have on libraries, our careers, and the future success of the profession. She conducted over 1,000 respondent surveys and interviews, and draws on the published literature on the subject.

The result is a unique, entertaining, and eye-opening look at librarian stereotypes and their real-world consequences in the Internet Age.

Press Display online (http://library.pressdisplay.com). This is an online service that provides many same day newspapers (national and international) in the original published format. Notice the title tab at the top right. You can search for newspapers by country, language, or alphabetically. Same day *Dallas Morning News* and *Tulsa World* are a couple of papers included. You'll need to play with it a little to get the hang of it. Notice the green slider bar on the right and click on the tool bar at the bottom in order to reveal the lower green slider bar; these are helpful navigational tools. They allow you move up and down and side to side.
