How do you prepare yourself? You know there are dozens, if not hundreds of books out there with advice, good, bad, and ugly, each one discussing one or more aspects of the skills needed to be an effective manager. But is there one that addresses all the basic problems of management? Yes, there is a book called *Managing For Dummies* (shelf number: 658/N424m2) but reading it in public might send the wrong message.

How about turning to *The Manager's Handbook: The Indispensable Tool for Supervising People* by Glenn Shepard? Amazon.com says that "each module is jam packed with enough information to create a separate seminar."

Individual sections discuss "Legal Principles Every Manager Needs to Know," "Supervisory Skills You Must Master in Order to Succeed. "How to Eliminate Unacceptable Behavior," and "Sample Policy Manual with Sample Policies."

New Zealand, Canada, and Ireland in places 2-4. The most generous nation in the world? Australia. It's a very g' day, mate.

The Oklahoman Every Day Since 1901

There are still people in the world who get their news from sources other than Jon Stewart and Rush Limbaugh. Did you know that you and our customers can look at *The Oklahoman*, every page of every issue dating back to September 25, 1901? And that includes the current date as well. It's all online and free.

Go to the Database file on our website and click on the Oklahoman Electronic Archives link. On the left side of the page, click on Browse Archive. This brings up a calendar and a way to select whatever date you want to look at. The Active Paper Archives contain over 2.2 million pages in 37,000 issues. Recent issues are full-color. The contents of all issues are fully text searchable and reflect the full context and layout of each page.

In playing with this service to write this article, I decided to find out what movies I could go see near my birth date. Let's see, *The Man From Colorado* and *Yellow Sky* open tomorrow. Hey, so does *Unknown Island* at the Warner, and that ad contains a picture of a dinosaur. Bingo. But today, at the Will Rogers, I can catch a bill with *10 Big Cartoons*, a western featurette, and an Andy Clyde comedy short. Looks like I'll be calling in sick today.

Seriously, this is a valuable resource for local history. Check it out so you can recommend it to your customers.




