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Kindle Lending Comes to MLS


Good news, Kindle users! It has been "confirmed" that we WILL have Kindle compatible eBooks sometime. While Kindle & OverDrive, our eBook provider, have announced a launch date of later this year, we do not yet have a definite date.

Our existing collection of downloadable eBooks will be available to Kindle customers. As we add new eBooks to our collection, those titles will also be available for lending to Kindle and Kindle reading apps.

Just like our other eBooks, customers will be able to browse for titles on any

desktop or mobile operating system, check out a title with a library card, and then select Kindle as the delivery destination. The borrowed title can then be enjoyed using any Kindle device and all of Amazon's free Kindle reading apps.

The Kindle eBook titles borrowed from a library will carry the same rules and policies as all our other eBooks. Yeah!!


"Now that's what it is all about," said Director of Outreach Services **Dana Morrow**, "the marriage of programming and literature! Well done Village staff!"

Data Base Trials

We currently have a trial to another couple of databases that Materials Selector **Susan Ryan** would like for you to take a look at so you can let her know whether or not you think they would be worth a regular subscription. One is to Newsbank's product, America's Newspapers. The only subscription we currently have with Newsbank is the Oklahoman. The second trial is to Standard & Poor's NetAdvantage.

To access America's Newspapers, go to our list of databases and scroll down to Newsbank—Daily Oklahoman. Clicking on this will lead you to the first option of "America's Newsapers."

"I hope library staff will take a close look at this trial," Susan wrote. "I'd like them to look at this product in comparison with the existing newspaper database we have from Proquest called Proquest—Newspapers. Please email me with any questions, concerns, or comments."

As for NetAdvantage, Susan said, "The writing is on the wall—S&P is slowly discontinuing its print products in favor of their online product. As of now, they have discontinued the Daily Stock Record in print for the Daily Price Record on NetAdvantage. I hope the libraries that still have print subscriptions to S&P products will take a close look at this database. We can subscribe to the Daily Price Record by itself for now, but in the future it appears that access to their other products will only be through NetAdvantage. Maybe we have existing resources that cover this kind of information sufficiently now, and S&P is no longer needed? Please email me your thoughts."

Standard & Poor's says of their new database, "With NetAdvantage, you have ready access to our most popular research products including *Industry Surveys, Stock Reports, Mutual Fund/ETF Reports, Bond Reports, Corporation Records, The Register of Corporations, Directors and Executives,* and *The Outlook*, among others. Your trial begins immediately. To begin using the service, go to the NetAdvantage website at http://www.netadvantage.standardandpoors.com. Please be sure to bookmark this page for easy future access."

Library Lit: Books to Help with Professional Growth Great Displays For Your Library: Step By Step

Lisewhere in this issue you can see some snapshots of a display at The Village Library created in support of a program, the performance of Shakespeare's A Midsummer Night's Dream. The Artistic Director of the theatre company presenting the play was delighted with what VI staff came up with.

Putting displays together may seem like pretty basic stuff, but eventually everyone runs out of ideas and a little creative help is appreciated. That's where a book like this one comes in handy. Here's how *Booklist* described it:

This is one book that lives up to its title. Phillips gives ideas for 123 displays, of which 46 are divided into 11 topical sections (authors, genres, holidays, etc.) and described in detail. The lively text offers sound advice on constructing inexpensive but effective displays using readily available materials. All of the 46 focus displays are treated identically. Beginning with an introduction to the subject, Phillips gives background on the genesis of the idea, the information included in the display and its source, and step-by-step instructions for creating the display and customizing it to available space. Graphics, balance, use of color, and targeted age range are also discussed. Some 77 more displays are described briefly in a section entitled "Month-by-Month Display Ideas." Appendixes include construction techniques, useful Web sites, a lengthy and detailed bibliography, and an accurate index. This has "used until dog-eared" potential for public libraries.

MLS has three copies so put it on reserve and thumb through it. You never know what you may see that sparks your imagination and earns you a pat on the back from a customer—or the boss.

A Message from Karen Marriott on Project Gutenberg Titles



Any of you know about Project Gutenberg, which offers thousands of free public domain eBooks for download from their own website but with many different formats and varying quality. To make it easier for our customers, we are now a gateway to over 15,000 free public domain titles from the Project Gutenberg collection. These books have already been filtered and selected by OverDrive (our eMedia provider) to include quality EPUB files only, the same format as our purchased titles.

The collection includes many popular classic titles that the library owns in standard book and CD formats. It also includes some titles that we do not own in standard formats due to their availability or to their esoteric or scholarly nature. Subject and genre headings are assigned by Project Gutenberg and cannot be changed to meet our guidelines.

This collection is available from the MLS eMedia page by either clicking on the "Additional eBooks Always Available" box or by selecting "Public Domain eBooks" from the list of eCollections.

These books, which never expire, are always available and do not go against a customer's checkout limits. Since these books are available on Project Gutenberg, non-MLS library cardholders are also able to check out these titles. Over-Drive will track the circulation of Project Gutenberg titles so we will know how they are being used by our customers.
