

Religion on Trial in Oklahoma!







In case you missed his email, Employee Development Coordinator **Stacy Schrank** has been flooded with calls regarding signing into the Metro U LMS.



He explained that the user name is the first part of your MLS e-mail address prior to the @metrolibrary. org part and your password should be eight characters and include a capitol letter and a numerical character (i.e. Training1). If you have not changed your password from the initial password you were assigned it should be Abcd123! (note the capital A and the explanation mark).

You can have the LMS send you your password if you have forgotten it, but if you enter in the incorrect one more than a couple of times it will lock you out, at which point Planning will have to re-set your password.

We have changed the parameters on the password, so you can now have it the same as your MLSHRPay if you wish. Just pick something you can remember.


Memorial Half-Marathon on May 1.

THE MAINTENANCE CONNECTION

Maintenance. Take advantage of the Maintenance Connection. It's a new way to turn in Maintenance requests, quickly online.

To check it out and get acquainted with how it works, here's what you do:

- 1. In your Internet Explorer web browser, navigate to http://www.maintenanceconnection.com/mcv18/.
- 2. Click on the "Sign Up for the First Time" or "Want to Sign Up?" link at the bottom of the page.
- 3. Specify "I am not a member of Maintenance Connection." and then click the OK button.
- 4. When prompted for a connection key, you should enter: METROL

- 5. Fill out the member profile information page, and click the OK button.
- 6. Once you finish the signup process, you will receive an email stating that you need approval.
- You will receive an email when your new account is approved and you can then begin submitting maintenance requests electronically.


