Gywnne The Comanches were the most feared Native American tribe in Texas and on the plains. This book, which chronicles the life of their great chief Quanah Parker, explains why. *Territorians to*

Boomers by Peter Pierce. The World Series is finished, but if you haven't gotten enough of baseball this book relates the story of professional baseball in Ardmore. Sounds crazy? Read it and see.

Dana Morrow OUT: *Under A Flaming Sky: The Great Hinckley Firestorm of 1894* by Daniel James Brown. Hinckley, Minn. was besieged by not one but two forest fires that joined to create a firestorm of Old Testament proportions. Here is the story of the fire and its aftermath. *The Buddha in the Attic* by Julie Otsuka. A novel about the lives of Japanese women

who came to San Franciso as "picture brides"—who hadn't met their new husbands before their weddings. *Van Morrison:*

No Surrender by Johnny Rogan. A serious biography of the Irish singer who became an international star, written by the author who has been called "pops' most eccentric biographer."

Kimberley Ann Edwards, DN: *Assassin's Apprentice* by Robin Hobb. This is the first volume in a fantasy trilogy. It's a coming-ofage story, a political novel, and a magical adventure all wrapped


up in one package.

Revolting Librarians Redux: Radical Librarians Speak Out



On the Shelf: 020/R4547r

Ed. by Katia Roberto and Jessamyn West; introd. by Celeste West

Most library literature deals with the nuts and bolts of day-to-day librarianship; this book is different as it deals much more with philosophy. "Revolting librarians aren't defined by what they are, they are defined by what they do," say authors Roberto and West in the book's Preface. "In fact, it's not even what they do, but how they do it."


Topics in the book range from library education and librarianship as a profession to the more political and spiritual aspects of librarianship. The contributions include critiques of library and information science programs, firsthand accounts of work experiences, and original fiction, poetry and art. There are also informative sections on jobs, career and other librarianship issues, and on individual librarians and their experiences.

One reviewer on Amazon.com wrote: "I have to admit that if I'd read Redux before I'd applied to library school, I might have not been so gung-ho about applying (or attending). But that's the beauty of this book. You need to know what you're getting into, and this book provides that. There's an essay on 'What Library Schools Still Aren't Teaching Us' (a lot), and there's a list (sarcastic, of course) of 'What I Really Learned in Library School.""

Another wrote: "After I began my first job ever in a library I [read this book and] discovered that many other librarians and library staff had exactly the same feelings I did."

This may be just the book you need if you're currently in a mid-job crisis.
