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From the Executive Director: ...*Clarifying New Leave Policies*

On Thursday, December 9th, the Metropolitan Library Commission approved changes to MLS leave policies. These changes were made as a result of the Comp/Class/Benefits Study by the Singer Group.

The major changes included the elimination of doctor/dental leave and the earn rate for sick leave was reduced from 10 hours a month to 8 hours a month. These changes will go into effect on January 1, 2012.

survey (see full benefit report pages 32-33), which showed that MLS was the only institution to offer doctor/ dental leave and the 120 sick leave hours earned annually led the market. In addition, feedback to our consultants from the staff and supervisors via the focus groups, the project review committee, the employee hotline and the online employee survey, indicated staff concerns that this benefit was

being abused.

The Executive Director is ultimately tasked with making final decisions of

this nature. But it is important to note that feedback from staff took place throughout the entire length of the project as referenced above.

I made the decision to recommend this change to MLS leave benefits in light of the charge given to me by the commission and the discussions that have taken place over the past several years in commission meetings regarding commission perceptions that MLS provides staff very generous benefits.

While we told staff that no one would receive a salary cut as a result of the study, it was never stated or indicated that benefits would stay the same.

I hope this clarifies the process that was undertaken and better explains the decisions that were made.

Building a Reading City: Special Edition Chapter I

Every month we take a look at what is being read for pleasure by MLS staff members, and we sometimes come across a surprise or two.

But this month, we're doing something a little different. We sent out a system-wide email soliciting the titles of books that were favorite bedtime reading aloud for the children of staff, or for nieces and nephews, grandchildren, or even for the staffers themselves when they were little. (Hard as it may be to believe that some MLS staff was ever young.)

The response was overwhelming—it's great to know that so many of us enjoyed creating new readers by reading aloud—so much so, in fact, we'll have to split up our report over several months' worth of ShelfLifes. Here's the first wave of responses (the first 10), and thanks to everyone who responded.

J.R. Day (CON): I ate up all kinds of books with varying authors and topics, but the ones that REALLY stick out are all of the Matt Christopher books... *The Kid Who Only Hit Homers, Wild Pitch, Crackerjack Halfback*... for a little boy that loved sports like me, those books were where it was at. Also an honorable mention to just about everything Robert McCloskey wrote... *Homer Price* and *Centerburg Tales* were my favorites.

Janeal Walker (NW): My stepdaughter is quite the tomboy and loves anything super hero related. Batman, Spiderman, and the Hulk are just the ultimate to her. We also always liked the *Pout Pout Fish, Edwurd Fudwupper Fibbed Big*, and the Fancy Nancy series. Now that she can read, I miss reading to her. Actually, we still read together. She just usually likes to do the reading!

Jennifer Jones (CH): iMy kids loved the Pigeon books by Mo Willems. They laughed hysterically when I read those to them (even my older kid, who is now 13.) They also loved the Minnie and Moo series by Denys Cazet. Now that they are older, they are avid readers. My daughter, who just turned 9, is reading the Shadow Wolf series by Kathryn Lasky and my son reads EVERYTHING! He just finished the Inheritance series by Christopher Paolini for probably the 3rd time, which the exception of the newest installment of course. Our favorite books from the young childhood were *Where the Wild Things Are* (Maurice Sendak), *Guess How Much I Love You* (Sam MCBrantney), *Go, Dog, Go* (P.D. Eastman) and *Snug House Bug House* (Susan Schade).

Rondia Banks (NWS)My two children always loved to hear *Love Your Forever* by Robert Munsch.

Kasandra Dewbrie-Burrows (HUM): Some of my favorites from childhood include The Bunnicula series by James Howe, *The Best Little Monkeys in the World* by Natalie Standiford, *Alice's Adventures in Wonderland and Through the Looking-Glass* by Lewis Carroll, and *The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe* by C.S. Lewis. My husband and I joke that we only want children so we'll have someone new to share our favorite books with!

Karen Litteral (WA): My son enjoyed *The Three Little Pigs, Swiss Family Robinson*, and a Bible story of Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego.

Teen Read Month Winner From SO

October was Teen Read Month, the time Oklahoma teens see how many pages they can read in 30 days. Here are some facts and figures about participation in 2011:

• More than 60 schools and public libraries registered to participate

• 447 teens from 17 schools and libraries went the distance, turning in reading logs to compete in the contest

- This year's total beat 2009's previous record, which was 504,376 pages read.
- Total pages read for the three years of the program: almost 1.4 million pages
- Oklahoma teens who participated in 2011 Teen Read Month read 663,778 pages during the month of October, setting a record for the three-year-old program.
- Prizes were awarded to the top school and public library, and the top readers from the school and Public Library categories. Plus, two winners were selected by drawing.

This year's theme was comics and graphic novels, but teens ages 12 to 18 could read whatever they wanted during the month and track it on a reading log. The purpose of the program is to keep teens reading for pleasure during the school year, when much of their reading time is devoted to school work. "Reading just for the joy of it is the best way to develop a lifelong love of reading," according to Adrienne Butler, Youth Services Librarian at the Department of Libraries.

Cody Speegle was the winner of the ODL statewide reading contest. Cody read an incredible 39,325 pages.




